

Stage Setting Near Perfect For Orioles-Yankees Series

Those Kansas City "cousins" turned out to be anything but kinsin' kin.

As far as the disillusioned New York Yankees are concerned, the Athletics acted more like unwelcome relatives who always show up at precisely the wrong time.

Pushovers for the Yankees all year long the last-place A's rose up and beat the Bronx Bombers for the second straight time Wednesday night 2-1.

Kansas City's victory—which was only the seventh in 22 games with New York this season—coupled with Baltimore's 11-10 triumph over Detroit, shaved the Yankees' lead over the Orioles to one percentage point and created a near-perfect setting for a four-game series between the two clubs starting Friday night.

Homer Wins Game
What hurt the Yanks most perhaps, was that one of their "own" delivered the coup de grace Wednesday night. Ex-Yankee Andy Carey led off the bottom of the ninth with his 12th homer of the year and that was the ball game.

Carey's blow came off Art Ditmar, who went the route, yielded eight hits and suffered his ninth defeat against 14 victories.

Ray Herbert was in constant trouble as the Yankees put men on base in every inning except one, but he bore down, left 12 men stranded and turned in an eight-hitter for his 11th victory compared with 15 defeats.

The Washington Senators ended the Chicago White Sox's six-game winning streak with a 6-1 victory and the Cleveland Indians defeated the Boston Red Sox, 11-7, in other AL games.

In the National league, Los Angeles downed Pittsburgh, 5-2. St. Louis moved to within 5½ games of first place with a 6-4 win over Cincinnati. Milwaukee crushed Chicago, 10-2, and Philadelphia beat San Francisco, 5-1.

Blow Big Lead
The Orioles blew a five-run lead before they finally won their game from the Tigers. Brooks Robinson's two-run triple featured a three-run rally in the ninth that brought

Baltimore from behind. Oriole Manager Paul Richards used eight pitchers and the fifth one, Chuck Estrada, was credited with his 17th victory. Hank Aguirre, victim of Robinson's blow, was the loser.

Earl Battey's two-run homer against his former White Sox teammates helped rookie Jack Kralick of the Senators register his eighth win. Battey belted his homer off loser Herb Score in the second inning and Washington added three more runs off Turk Lown in the sixth. Roy Sievers hit his 27th homer.

Home runs by Mike De La Hoz, Vic Power and Tito Francona carried the Indians to their victory over the Red Sox. Barry Latman was the winner and Frank Sullivan the loser.

Stan Williams struck out 13 batters and Wally Moon drove in three runs for the Dodgers against the Pirates. It marked the second straight game in which 13 Pirates struck out—Mike McCormick of the Giants fanned 13 Tuesday night—and the two-game total of 26 established a NL record.

Law Fails Again
Williams 14-8 lost his shut-out when Bill Mazeroski homered with one on in the eighth. Vern Law tried for the third time to nail down his 20th victory but wound up with his eighth defeat instead.

Daryl Spencer won a ball game for the Cardinals for the second straight night when he hit a two-run homer off Jim Brosnan of the Reds in the eighth inning. Spencer also tripled home the winning run in Tuesday night's 11-inning 6-5 victory over the Braves.

Bob Miller was the winner for the Cards with help from Lindy McDaniel. Roy McMillan and Vada Pinson homered for the Reds.

Joey Jay of the Braves held the Cubs to six hits in bringing his record to 8-7. Eddie Mathews got the Braves started with his 37th homer in the first inning off loser Don Cardwell and before the game was over, Hank Aaron drove in three more runs with three hits.

Robin Roberts set the Giants down on five hits to win his 10th game for the Phillies. The Phils routed starter Billy O'Dell with a four-run rally in the sixth inning. Rookie Jim Woods' two-run single was the key blow.

More Giant Action Off Field Than On

Philadelphia —UPI—The San Francisco Giants were so busy denying rumors and levying and not levying fines today that they appeared unable to find the time to win a ball game or two.

The Philadelphia Phils breezed past the Giants, 5-1, Wednesday night in a day that produced far more Giant fireworks off the field than on.

For a while, it was touch-and-go whether Willie Mays would play centerfield for the Giants Wednesday night.

Tuesday night in Pittsburgh, Mays asked permission to travel to see his wife and two children in New Rochelle, N. Y. Mays was permitted to see his family, but was denied a requested 48-hour visit for business reasons. Manager Tom Sheehan told him to be ready for the Phils.

Wednesday, Mrs. Mays phoned Sheehan and said Willie was ill and would not be able to play. Sheehan told her to have Willie call him. When Mays phoned Sheehan told him to show up or face a fine, Mays made it.

Elsewhere, the club announced that Jack Sanford, Giants' pitcher, had been slapped with a \$200 fine by Sheehan for walking off the mound in Milwaukee last Friday as the manager went out to yank him.

In other developments, the club has issued its monthly denial of never-say-die rumors that Leo Durocher would be offered the managerial reins of the Giants next year.

"There is not a word of truth to the story," said Edgar

P. Feeley, attorney and treasurer of the club who was supposed to have been the source of the report.

"If you offered me a million dollars to tell you who would be offered the Giants' managerial job, I couldn't answer you," continued Feeley. "All I know is that Tom Sheehan is the manager now and has been told that he will continue as manager for the remainder of the season."

Pittsburgh Announces Ticket Plan

Pittsburgh —UPI—Pittsburgh Pirates baseball fans, hopeful of watching their first World Series here since 1927, may begin applying for tickets to the 1960 classic Friday.

Club officials announced Wednesday night they would begin accepting mail order ticket requests postmarked after 5 p.m. (EDT) Friday.

The Pirates said tickets would be sold two to a customer on a single-game basis only. Orders will be filled on a "chance basis" with the applicants not able to choose the game they want to attend.

All seats will be reserved. No box seats will be available since they already have been claimed by season ticket holders and baseball personnel.

The following prices will be in effect: single grandstand reserved, \$8.70; two grandstand reserved, \$16.40; single bleacher reserved, \$3.20; two bleacher reserved, \$5.40.

The Series opens Oct. 5 in the National league city, barring pennant playoffs, with games one, two, six and seven to be played in the NL park. Should the final two games not be necessary, refunds on tickets will be made at offices of the Mellon National Bank and Trust Co.

Applications for reserved grandstand tickets are to be addressed to the Pittsburgh Baseball Club, Post Office Box 770, Pittsburgh 30, Pa. Orders for bleacher seats should be mailed to the Pittsburgh Baseball Club, Post Office Box 220, Pittsburgh 30. The Pirates said orders mailed to Forbes Field would not be accepted.
