The site — beautiful \$65 million Cobo Hall in Detroit, Mich. Spectators will find a semi-horseshoe area with seating capacity for about 3,500 people.

Two-Mile Relay Mark Shattered

London — (UPI) — The United States track and field team, not quite dead after its so-called collapse in the Olympic games, can boast of a world record clocking and a solid trouncing of a combined British Commonwealth squad today.

The Yanks won 16 of 23 events in the meet Wednesday before an enthusiastic turnout of 40,000 which crowded into White City Stadium despite a day-long heavy rain. The world mark was achieved in the two-mile relay with a time of 7:19.4, but strangely enough it was only good for second place as the United Kingdom team won in 7:18.

However, the winning time will not be officially recognized as a record since the team consisted of runners from different countries. The old record of 7:20.9 was set by a University of California quartet two years ago.

The Americans who took part in Wednesday's run were Ernie Cunliffe of Claremont, Calif., Tom Murphy of Brooklyn, N.Y., Jack Yerman of Woodland, Calif., and Jerry Siebert of Willits, Calif.

Other highlights included a 3:58.6 mile by Herb Elliott of Australia and the return to winning habits by John Thomas, Harold Connolly and Al Cantello, upset victims at Rome.

Thomas, a Boston University student, needed a seven-foot leap to win the high jump; Connolly, Santa Monica, Calif., won the hammer throw with 212 feet, 8 inches, and Cantello, of Norristown, Pa., threw the javelin 252 feet, 5 inches to capture that event.

Women came through for the Americans on three occasions, the most popular victory going to triple gold medal winner Wilma Rudolph of Clarksville, Tenn., in the 100-yard dash. Mrs. Earlene Brown of Los Angeles won the shot put and the women won the 440-yard relay.

Elliott had to overhaul Dyrrol Burleson of the University of Oregon to win the mile. Burleson had taken the lead at the midway point but fell behind and finished some distance back of the Australian.

Team May Represent High School

City Recreation Supervisor Ken Lyons told the parks and recreation commission at its meeting last night that members of the city's swimming team who are students at Medford High school may start swimming as a high school team.

This proposal has been well received by the school, Lyons said, and if it comes about it would mean that the high school will have a team to compete against other high schools and enter the state championship meet.

The entire team of about 40 persons is through swimming for the city for this season, Lyons said, and they have now transferred to the YMCA where they will train and swim for that institution in YMCA swim meets.

If the high school proposal is accepted, it would mean that the team would swim for three different organizations—the YMCA, the city and the high school.

Lyons noted that Wakefield Drapery, 1100 Crater Lake ave., has offered to donate three trophies to the city to be awarded to the top three finishers in the swimming teams current "300-mile swim to Portland." The distance is being swam by team members on their own time.

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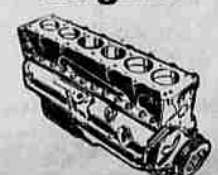

Complacency Worry Of Huskies' Coach

Seattle, Wash. — (UPI) — Washington's Huskies will field one of the country's most experienced college football teams this fall. But coach Jim Owens isn't too happy about that.

He's worried about complacency.

The Huskies open the 1960 season against College of Pacific with every starter from the victorious Rose Bowl team back on the job.

"But we have been looking too complacent in early practice," Owens told his squad. "Our players were less sharp on opening day of practice this year than they were the two previous years."

However, it is probable that the successful young coach will have the boys convinced by the time they take the field against the Tigers on Saturday. In fact, he already is starting to lose some of his pessimism.

22 Lettermen Return

"Our backs finally are showing some finesse in their running game and the linemen are operating as a unit for a change," he says.

The Huskies have 22 lettermen back from the squad which won 10, lost one and routed Wisconsin, 44-8, in the Rose Bowl on Jan. 1. The club is three-deep at the key quarterback position with triple-threat Bob Schloredt, Bob Hivner and Kermit Jorgensen.

The team also has great depth and experience at fullback where Joe Jones, Ray

Jackson and Dick Aguirre are ready for duty.

The starting halfbacks probably will be George Fleming and Don McKeta. But sophomores such as Charlie Mitchell and Bob Monroe will see considerable action behind the two veterans.
