25 Sandwich Breads To Choose From

There's no possible excuse for sandwich bread monotony. Your baker and grocer have at least 25 different breads and rolls for the making of interesting sandwiches. There's enriched white, egg, French, French sour, Italian, high protein, potato, pullman (the square loaf), oatmeal, pumpernickel, raisin, rye in both plain and fancy shapes and styles, salty rye, icebox rye, Vienna, 100 per cent whole wheat, wheat and cracked wheat.

Besides hamburger and frankfurter buns, you have your choice of corn muffins, bran muffins, whole wheat muffins, English muffins. There are onion rolls, plain hard rolls, hard rolls with sesame or poppy seeds. There are biscuit and roll mixes for baking your own.

Bread comes in cans, too. Have you tried Boston brown bread, date-nut bread or orange-date bread for sandwiches? Just try a sandwich filling of Philadelphia cream cheese and marmalade in date-nut or orange-date bread.

Sandwich Freezing Tips
School and work lunches are ready to pack up and go on short notice if you've beforehand stocked the freezer. Here are three sandwich

freezer points to keep in mind:

For tastiest freezer sandwiches, remember some varieties freeze better than others. Freezer "hardies" include sliced or ground meats, fish, chicken, peanut butter and cheese. Sliced or chopped olives or dill or sweet pickles may be added to any of these.

To prevent filling from soaking bread, spread all bread slices generously with butter or margarine. Do not freeze mayonnaise, salad dressing or crisp vegetables. The mayonnaise and dressing will separate and the vegetables lose crispness and change flavor. Add vegetables to thawed sandwiches just before serving.

Fancy Cucumbers

For cucumber wheels, run the times of a fork down the length of an unpeeled cucumber on all sides. Slice in thin slices and chill in ice water. For cucumber sticks, slice peeled or unpeeled cucumbers into thin, lengthwise sections or slices. Chill in ice water.

Fancy Carrots

For carrot curls, cut paper thin lengthwise slices from scraped carrots, slicing away from you. A double edged peeler is ideal for this. Roll each slice into a curl, secure with a toothpick and crisp in ice water.

For carrot zigzags, spear the paper thin slices on toothpicks, accordion style.

For carrot fans, cut carrots in thin lengthwise slices; make parallel slits from one end almost to the other end of each slice. Chill in ice water.

Fancy Celery

Fancy ways for fixing celery for relish trays and decorative effects are these: Break a head of celery into its individual stalks. Trim, leaving only the most attractive leaves at the top of each stalk. Cut each stalk into 3-inch lengths.

For sticks, keep cold and crisp until serving time. These can be served plain or stuffed with cheese or other favored dunks.

For celery curls, make parallel cuts forming narrow strips almost to the end. Or cut both ends of celery almost to center of each piece. Crisp in ice water and slit ends will curl.

Zippy Dip

For a zippy dip for enjoying with celery, cucumber, carrot, or beet sticks; with cauliflowerettes and other vegetable appetizers, try this: Combine one cup mayonnaise, two tablespoons milk, one tablespoon lemon juice, two tablespoons horseradish,

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Eugene Gets Federal Sewer Plant Grant

Washington--UPI--The office of Sen. Hall S. Lusk, (D-Ore.), has been advised of a federal grant of \$190,500 for additions to the Eugene sewage treatment plant.

The grant comes from the Public Health Service. Total estimated cost of the project is \$635,000.

Treasury Offers Exchange Plan on Certain Type Bonds

Washington--UPI--The Treasury is trying a new kind of bond swap that would give some investors a higher return but tie up their money for additional years.

The Treasury has offered to issue new, long-term 3 1/2 per cent bonds in return for certain outstanding 2 1/2 per cent bonds.

The chief aim is to stretch out the maturity of the national debt by pushing some maturity dates into the more distant future. This will make it easier and cheaper, according to the Treasury, to refinance securities as they come due.

Some liberal Democrats, opposed to the higher return for investors who agree to the

swap, have denounced this type of financing as "a raid on the Treasury."

The 2 1/2 per cent bonds eligible for the exchange are scheduled to mature in 1967, 1968 and 1969. The 3 1/2 per cent bonds offered in return would mature in 1980, 1990 and 1998.

The Treasury set a combined limit of \$4.1 billion on the amount of the 1990 and 1998 bonds it will issue. It will accept all offers for the 1980 bonds.

The 2 1/2 per cent bonds involved in the swap were sold during World War II. These bonds and the long-term bonds offered in exchange are accepted by the Treasury as

payment of estate taxes when the owner dies.

About \$1.7 billion of the 2 1/2 per cent bonds is held by Federal Reserve banks and government investment accounts, \$10.7 billion by the public and about \$8.5 billion by banks and insurance companies.

Exchange Offers

The Treasury said that with the 2 1/2 per cent bonds selling at a discount on the market, the true investment return on the new 3 1/2 per cent issues would range from 3.92 per cent to 3.99 per cent.

Treasury subscription books will be open for exchange offers to Sept. 20.

To explain the refunding to investors, the Treasury scheduled public meetings next week at the Federal Reserve banks in New York City, Chicago and San Francisco. Treasury officials from Washington will be on hand to answer questions.

Oregon Laborer Increase Seen

Portland - UPI - Oregon will see a 20 per cent increase in the number of laborers in the next 10 years.

Ray A. Ziegler, director of the senior workers division of the Oregon Bureau of Labor made that prediction Thursday at the annual staff conference of the bureau.

He said there will be more women available for jobs and more older workers.

Ziegler headed the opening panel of the two-day session. The discussions touched on problems of minority groups and physically and vocationally handicapped persons.

He also predicted a 25 per cent increase in the living standard if the labor force can be trained to cope with the demands of a 15 per cent increase in the state's population.

Wall Street Chatter

New York - UPI - Eldon A. Grimm of Walston & Co. feels that 1960 is almost certain to be a very big "tax loss" switching year.

Starting immediately, he says, large numbers of holders of depressed issues will switch into other stocks which are way down in order to establish "tax losses" and save large sums on income tax payments.

Grimm says there already seems to have been tax switching in many groups--such as textiles, steels, rails, rubbers, motors, farm implements, machinery shares, auto parts and building materials.

Bache & Co. reports that El Paso Natural Gas is in the process of building a substantial base formation. It also thinks the shares of Interstate Department Stores look "cheap."

Martin Gilbert of Van Alstyne, Noel & Co. "firmly believes" there will be no breakthrough of the 1960 lows that have been tested three times already this year.

Business Reports, Inc., recommends First Charter Financial for the young investor seeking long term growth. Kratter Corp. for the middle-aged seeking high-income security, and Allied Mills, Inc. for the retired or soon-to-be retired.
