Taylor Speaks on CW Observance

Dr. Arthur Taylor, head of the social science department at Southern Oregon college, addressed Medford Kiwanis club on Wednesday in a talk described as the "opening gun" of Civil War Centennial observance in southern Oregon.

The war between the states will be commemorated by events during the years 1961 through 1965.

Taylor's talk at the noon luncheon at Rogue Valley Country club gave sketches of Civil War generals who had tours of duty previous to the war in the Oregon country or in northern California.

Among those he mentioned were U. S. Grant, John Charles Fremont, Philip Kearney, George Pickett, Phil Sheridan, George Crook, John Hood, George B. McClellan, Joseph Hooker and Edward Ord.

Dr. Taylor reported that Grants Pass was named as the result of Grant's victory at Vicksburg. He said that Grant never stopped at Wolf Creek nor stayed overnight there although a room is shown at the inn where legend says he slept.

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Volga Boatmen Turning Pirate, Pravda Charges

Moscow — (UPI) — Yo ho ho and a bottle of vodka. Some of the Volga boatmen have turned pirate, the Soviet press charged today.

The youth newspaper Komsomolskaya Pravda and the Literary Gazette published details of the operations of the dashing boatmen whose fame spread around the world through the song about them.

Regular Battles

The pirates use knives, guns and hold regular battles afloat in quest of their goal — the black gold known as caviar — on the broad middle reaches of the Volga near Kuibishev.

The pirates are after tens of thousands of valuable fish, including quantities of sturgeon which bring a high price for themselves as well as for the fish roe that is sold as caviar.

The newspapers said attempts to smash the pirate rings have resulted in more than a dozen attempts this year on the lives of fish and game wardens.

They said the latest incident occurred last month when a group of wardens braved pistol fire from pirates on shore to grab boatmen fishing in a forbidden area with stolen nets.

Rammed Warden's Boat

Before draw the next day, apparently in retaliation, a fast pirate cutter bore down on a slower warden's boat, pinned it with a searchlight and rammed it. Then the pirate vessel criss-crossed the area, trying to run down wardens as they swam for their lives to shore.

The wardens finally were rescued by a boat sent out from a nearby factory on the shore, the papers said.

But not all wardens are devoted to duty. Some are in cahoots with the river pirates, the paper charged.

They complained that the poaching continues because of the laws which provide only a 200-ruble fine (\$50 at the official rate of exchange) on conviction. The poachers easily pay the fines from their illicit gains.

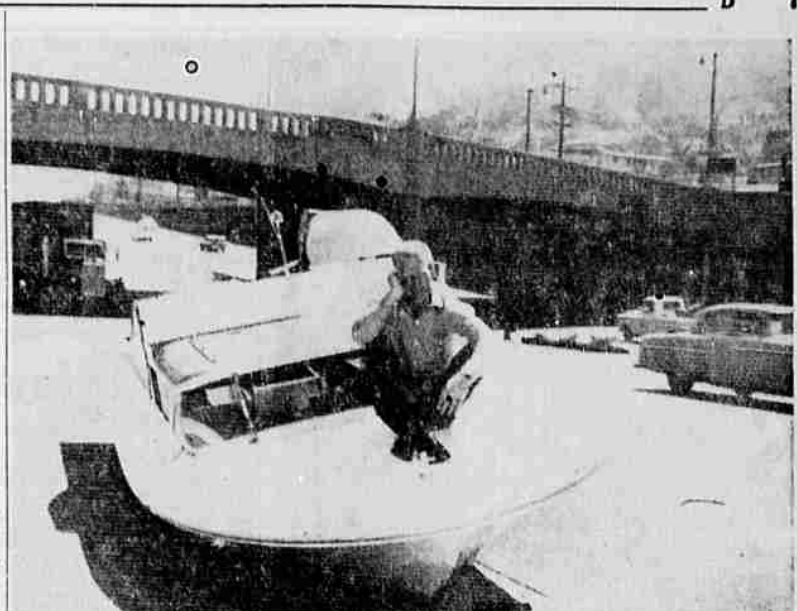
