### Discoverer XV Capsule Lost in Stormy Pacific

Honolulu — (UPI) — The found-again, lost-again capsule ejected Wednesday from the Discoverer XV satellite has disappeared in stormy seas in the Pacific, leaving little chance for its recovery.

A small search party of three airplanes and a ship combed the turbulent area around Christmas Island today, but chances were it might already have sunk.

The Air Force declined to speculate on the 300-pound capsule's fate, saying only that it was made to float at least 48 hours.

Last reception of the capsule's light beacon and radio homing signal was made at noon Thursday after surging seas earlier prevented a circling amphibious plane from landing and plucking it from the water.

**Blow To Air Force**  
Loss of contact with the capsule loaded with instruments was a bitter blow to the Air Force which had hoped to snag it for the third straight recovery of a Discoverer capsule.

The capsule's ejection Wednesday from orbiting Discoverer XV was successful, but a waiting flotilla of ships and planes near here failed to sight it parachuting to earth and it was feared lost.

# Congressional Probe on Defectors Has Emphasis on Personal Habits

Washington — (UPI) — A second congressional investigation into the defection to Russia of two U.S. code clerks opens today with heavy emphasis on the question of whether one of the turncoats is a homosexual.

The House Committee on Un-American Activities called to a closed-door hearing three of the 12 witnesses who testified Thursday at the first inquiry into the defection of Bernon F. Mitchell, 31, and William H. Martin, 29.

The witnesses are J. Vincent Burke Jr., Defense Department general counsel; Dr. Louis W. Tordella, deputy director of the super-secret National Security Agency where the turncoats worked, and Maurice H. Klein, NSA personnel director.

The first investigation, by a special house armed services subcommittee, turned to general intelligence activities of the Army, Navy and Air Force.

Burke testified Thursday that interviews, tests and investigations failed to reveal any homosexual tendencies or acts on the part of the two long-time bachelor friends.

Chairman Francis E. Walter (D-Pa.) of the Committee on Un-American Activities said the Defense Department's conclusion about the sexual activities of Mitchell "just is not true."

He said a psychiatrist whom Mitchell consulted before his defection told the committee "there is no question about Mitchell being a homosexual."

Walter said the psychiatrist, Dr. Clarence Schilt of nearby Silver Springs, Md., told the committee that Mitchell did not regard himself as a homosexual, but as a bi-sexual. Schilt said Mitchell reported having had affairs with both men and women, according to Walter.

Burke testified that neither lie detector tests nor security checks had disclosed any derogatory information which would have barred Mitchell or Martin from employment by the NSA. Both men, he said, passed lie detector tests, which included questions regarding undetected crimes, alcoholism and "sexual proclivities."

He testified that Mitchell volunteered that he had experimented in abnormal sexual practices in his teens. But Burke added that lie detector tests indicated Mitchell "had not indulged in such practices for more than nine years prior to his employment."

At the heart of the discussion of homosexuality was the possibility that a sex deviate doing secret government work might be open to blackmail by the Russians.

Burke and NSA officials told the subcommittee that Mitchell and Martin could not have given the Russians any information that endangered the security of U.S. codes.

But Burke said the defectors might be able to help the Russians make their codes harder to crack.

**Briefing Notes Missing**  
The Pentagon official reported that some handwritten briefing notes that Martin had seen are missing. He said the memos were not very important. He said it was not known whether the author of the notes destroyed them or the defectors took them.

Mitchell, Eureka, Calif., and Martin, Ellensburg, Wash., disappeared June 24 after telling friends they planned to spend a vacation on the West Coast. They turned up at a Moscow news conference Sept. 6 to denounce the United States and announce they were becoming Soviet citizens.

### Switchmen's Strike Averted

Chicago — (UPI) — Court action today averted a switchmen's union strike against 17 western railroads at least until next week.

Judge John O. Henderson, of the U.S. District Court in Buffalo, N.Y., issued a restraining order against the union, saying "they have not bargained in good faith."

The restraining order was issued until Sept. 26.

The primary issue in the dispute is wages.

Judge Henderson said he would hear arguments in the case and then either "dismiss the case or issue another restraining order."

The union had threatened to call a strike at 6 a.m. Monday. Talks opened Monday and were attended by a representative of the U.S. Mediation Service.

### SP To Withdraw Agent at Brooks

Salem, Ore. — (UPI) — Public Utility Commissioner Jonel C. Hill today gave Southern Pacific company a go-ahead for withdrawing its agent at Brooks during the off-season.

The withdrawal will go into effect April 1, 1961 to last through Sept. 30.

The agency season begins Oct. 1 each year and runs through March 31, when movement of onions is heavy.

The SP said that in the on-season in 1958 it took in \$105,892 in gross revenue compared to \$9,747 for the off-season period. Figures for 1959 were \$102,313 and \$9,739, the railroad said.

The SP's Salem agency will handle Brooks business during the off-season beginning next year. A hearing was held here April 20 and no objections were made.

### Blue Iodine Qualities High

Washington — (Science Service) — The bactericidal qualities of blue iodine, iodine in combination with polyvinyl alcohol, are many times higher than those of common iodine, according to the Soviet Journal Science and Life published in Moscow.

In experiments with the blue iodine at a monkey nursery in Sukhum in the USSR, blue iodine was used after dilution to one in 80,000 parts. The experiments showed that diluted blue iodine can successfully treat and cure gastric and intestinal diseases.

Pure iodine is a dark gray crystalline substance with a metallic luster. To the non-chemist, it is familiar as a brown liquid in an alcoholic solution. When heated to moderate temperatures, iodine sublimates, forming a violet vapor that rapidly condenses to crystals on a cold surface. When added to a solution of starch, iodine produces an intense blue color. This reaction is frequently used as a test for detecting the presence of iodine.

Polyvinyl alcohol is a polymer prepared from polyvinyl acetate by the replacement of acetate groups with hydroxyl groups.
