Kennedy Raps Nixon's Dealings With Nikita

"It Only Hurts When I Laugh..."



Demo Candidate Ends Whirlwind N. Carolina Tour

Raleigh, N. C. — (UPI) — Democratic presidential candidate John F. Kennedy Saturday night sharply criticized the tactics of Vice President Richard M. Nixon in dealing with Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

The Soviet leader arrives in New York today to head the Soviet delegation to the United Nations General Assembly.

Winding up a whirlwind one-day campaign tour of North Carolina, Kennedy said "kitchen arguments" offered no method for maintaining peace or keeping the United States strong in the world.

This was a reference to the spirited debate between Nixon and Khrushchev when the vice president visited Moscow in 1959 and argued heatedly with the Soviet premier in a kitchen exhibit at the American exposition.

Willing To Meet 'K'

After his speech and while being questioned by the audience, the Democratic candidate said that while he would be willing to meet Khrushchev if Nixon also were invited to talk with the Russian, he thought that basic decisions involving the Khrushchev visit and American reaction to it should be governed by President Eisenhower.

The Massachusetts senator also said he thought Khrushchev was coming to this country to try to build his position of world leadership with the governments of new countries of Africa and the Far East, but that Khrushchev if he wanted, could make his visit eventful by making realistic disarmament proposals.

Kennedy spoke before an audience of about 8,000 persons at the North Carolina State college coliseum in Raleigh. The crowd was estimated by coliseum officials who said the seating capacity of the building was 12,400. The Democratic candidate's speech also was carried regionally by television.

Kennedy as he delivered his speech was not aware that Nixon earlier in the evening at St. Paul, Minn., had charged the Democrat with using Khrushchev's visit for political purposes.

Some of the loudest applause of the evening in Raleigh came when Kennedy, a Catholic, was questioned by a member of the audience about his religion.

The candidate was standing in front of a large red and white banner that proclaimed "Sou. Baptists for Kennedy." Asked if he regarded his religion as a handicap in the campaign, he answered that with such great issues before the country as maintenance of world peace and economic stability, he thought these would interest the people of North Carolina far more than where he was going to church tomorrow morning.

Tiniest Railroad Calls It Quits

Troy, Mo. — (UPI) — The St. Louis and Troy Railroad, believed to be the world's shortest standard gauge railroad, is going out of business Sept. 30. C. H. Kemper, president, said Saturday.

The railroad has five miles of track, three employees and one locomotive.

Kemper said increased competition from trucks has cut the line's revenue 25 per cent in the last four years.

The line was built in 1878 as part of the St. Louis and Hannibal railroad, which was once owned by circus magnate John Ringling North.

Conveyor Belt Takes Man to Death in Burner

A 25-year-old Central Point man was burned alive Saturday when he fell from a conveyor belt into a large scrap burner at the Rogue Forest Products company, Rogue River.

Dead is David Leon Snook, 3245 Freeland rd. Snook, an employee at the plant, was found to be missing at 2 p.m., and after an exhaustive search of the premises, lasting nearly a 1/2 hour, plant employees found his body at the bottom of the burner.

Sheriff's deputies who investigated the accident surmised that Snook apparently fell unnoticed onto the conveyor belt which then dumped him into the burner.

Deputies said death apparently was instantaneous. Snook is survived by his wife, one daughter and his parents.

Ike OK's Panama Flag for Canal

Washington — (UPI) — President Eisenhower ruled Saturday that the Panamanian flag can be flown over the U.S.-controlled Panama Canal Zone.

An angry congressman, Rep. Daniel J. Flood (D-Pa.), declared Eisenhower has committed "the most shocking violation of the presidential prerogative in the history of this nation."

In a separate interview with Mutual Broadcasting System, Flood demanded that Secretary of State Christian A. Herter resign immediately. He also declared: "Impeachments of presidents have been urged for far less."

Flood termed the President's decision a victory for Communism and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev. He said the action by Eisenhower is a "further appalling example of American diplomatic appeasement, loss of leadership and weakened integrity in the eyes of the world."

(In Panama City, United States Ambassador Joseph S. Farland personally delivered news of the President's decision to Panamanian President Ernesto de la Guardia. Farland's statement to De la Guardia said that the decision reflected the "genuine friendship that exists" between the two nations.)

Eisenhower authorized the flying of the Panamanian flag at a specified site in the zone to symbolize the Central American republic's titular sovereignty over the area.

Ike Issues Appeal On Nikita's Visit

Thurmont, Md. — (UPI) — President Eisenhower appealed Saturday night to the American people to treat Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev with "traditional dignity" during the Red leader's attendance at the United Nations General Assembly session in New York City.

The Chief Executive did not mention Khrushchev by name. But he urged "calm and reasonable" treatment of all visiting heads of government during the special UN General Assembly session that begins Tuesday.

Eisenhower requested the American people not to interfere with the movements of the delegates and to avoid doing anything to impair their activities in connection with the UN meeting. Khrushchev arrives in New York by boat Monday.

Jack Said Using 'K' Visit for Political Moves

St. Paul, Minn. — (UPI) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon Saturday night charged Sen. John F. Kennedy with using Soviet Premier Khrushchev's visit for political purposes, and said he felt both candidates should stop talking about it until President Eisenhower has spoken for the nation.

In the final analysis, the vice president told newsmen, it is "up to each candidate" to determine his own conduct. But he noted that Kennedy himself recently made a "very constructive" statement that this is no time to "allow Mr. Khrushchev to divide us."

Nixon said he agreed and said that both presidential candidates "should recognize that neither of us has been elected yet."

100,000 Turn Out

Nixon's blast at Kennedy was fired in the last speech of his five-state, 9,000 mile opening week of campaigning for the presidency. It came along with a smash welcome to the Minneapolis-St. Paul area, where an estimated 100,000 persons turned out in downtown Minneapolis to pay tribute to "Dick and Pat."

The demonstration was organized in detail by Young Republicans and volunteers for Nixon.

In the final analysis, Nixon insisted, "any statements with regard to Mr. Khrushchev, any position with regard to Mr. Khrushchev, must in the first instance be made by President Eisenhower."

In his news conference, Nixon also said:

"He does not think 'he has distorted' a Kennedy quotation to the effect that the Democrat was for everything labor favors and against everything labor opposes. Nixon said he read the quotes in several responsible newspapers and a magazine. He added that if Kennedy disagrees with some labor views, 'he should say so.'"

He has had letters from Quakers complaining that he is "not a pacifist" and also has other mail from non-Quakers complaining that he is. Nixon is a Quaker but attends a Methodist church in Washington with his family.

He felt the United States should never "take the initiative" in attacking birth control proposals as a condition to foreign aid or to get foreign countries to adopt population controls. But he recalled that he also had previously said the United States should not refuse to furnish birth control information to countries which request it in the first instance.

Woman Found Dead In Cave Junction

Cave Junction — (UPI) — Police Saturday were investigating the death of Rosella J. Lauder, about 40, whose body was found Saturday morning in a cabin in an auto court here.

The woman, identified as an Indian from Sprague River in Klamath county, may have been beaten, police said. Her husband, Ben Lauder, was being questioned.

He told officers he found his wife's body by the bed in the cabin about 5 a.m. Saturday.

Josephine County Coroner Virgil Hull said no cause of death would be disclosed pending an autopsy report.

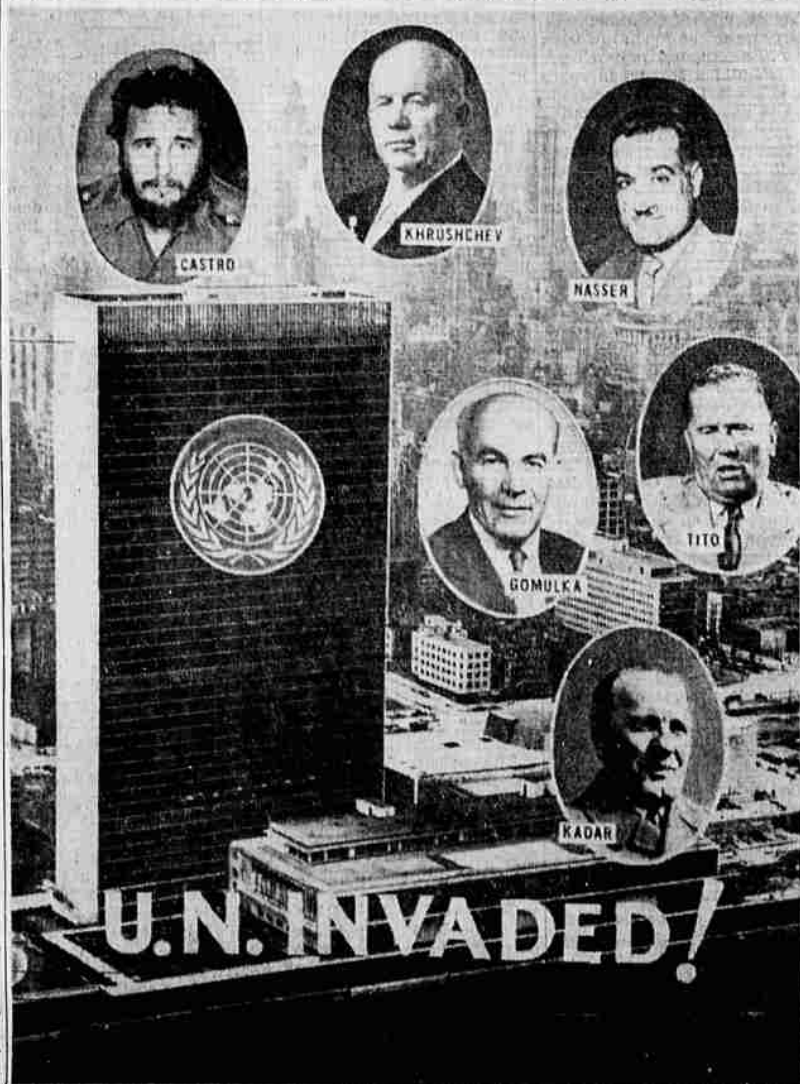

United Medford Crusade Drive Opens Tomorrow

The 1960 United Medford Crusade drive for a \$147,850 goal officially begins Monday.

This goal is 6.5 per cent above last year, said Campaign Chairman Hal Gardner, Medford.

The School of Hope for mentally retarded children and the Mental Health association are included in the drive for the first time. The Oregon Medical Research Foundation of Oregon was included last year. The money allocated to it was used for a variety of research projects such as heart, cancer and muscular dystrophy.

'Open Door Policy'

"The United Medford Crusade maintains an open door policy for all qualified agencies," Gardner said. "This means those agencies which are charities, can offer proof that the community has supported them before, are tax exempt."

The annual campaign will start with a kick-off breakfast at 6:45 a.m. Monday at the Medford Elks temple.

Over 300 volunteer workers will start their work Monday, Gardner said. The regular solicitation will start tomorrow and the Home Crusade, a door to door canvass, will start later, he added.

Over 300 volunteer workers are enrolled in the program, the UMC chairman said.

"With the help of everyone we hope to have the campaign concluded on Oct. 27," Gardner said.

Each Accuses Other of Trying To Take Over

Wadsworth, Zorin Swap Angry Charges

United Nations, N.Y., Sunday — (UPI) — The United States and Russia clashed today in an emergency session of the General Assembly, each accusing the other of seeking to take over the Congo.

U.S. Ambassador James J. Wadsworth declared that "the future freedom of Africa and even the peace of the world" depended upon the United Nations effort to restore peace and order in the young African republic.

Russia's attempt to infiltrate the country, Wadsworth said, "made it necessary to act without delay."

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin accused the United States of heading a plot against the government of ousted leftist Premier Patrice Lumumba to maintain control of the rich uranium deposits of Katanga province, the secession of which was the first step in Lumumba's downfall.

"In this," Zorin said, "the United States is not merely cooperating with the other NATO countries but is the initiator and organizer of the subversive activities. How could it be otherwise, considering that the real boss of NATO is the United States?"

"This aggressive bloc is today mainly as a tool of the aggressive policy of the United States. Its other members are merely helpers of the United States."

Zorin said the United States delayed security council action while awaiting developments in the Congo. He did not mention the action of Col. Joseph Mobutu, the new Congolese strongman, in taking over from both Lumumba and President Joseph Kasavubu and forcing Russia to pull up stakes and get its diplomatic personnel out of the country Saturday.

'Fine Success'

The Russian, however, remarked sarcastically that the UN effort to restore order in the Congo "had fine success indeed if it is impossible to find the lawful prime minister and if officials are unable to get into the legislative building."

Lumumba fled the protection of the UN force Saturday and his fate was unknown.

Wadsworth was the first speaker in the Congo debate. "The Soviet Union," he said, "asserted a unilateral right to introduce personnel and material into the Congo in defiance of the security council and in total disregard of the consequences. The issue was clearly joined."

California Man, Daughter Killed In Highway Crash

Two California people were killed almost instantly in an automobile logging truck accident about 4:30 p.m. Friday on Highway 234 near Rock Point bridge just north of Gold Hill.

Killed were Bernard Raymond Masters, 68, of Santa Ana, Calif., and his daughter, Helen Catherine Bixel, 36, also of Santa Ana.

They were in a car which was traveling east on the River rd. toward Highway 234 near Rock Point bridge, state police said.

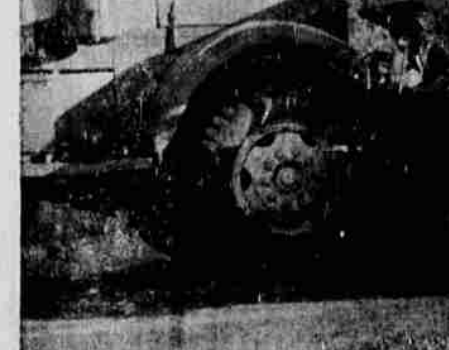
Trucker Injured

The logging truck, which contained 16 logs, was traveling west on Highway 234. It was operated by Ralph Edward Bloom, 58, of Gold Hill. Bloom was not injured, police said.

State police said the car skidded 120 feet through a stop sign onto Highway 234 into the path of the logging truck, which skidded some 72 feet before the point of impact.

Bloom attempted to avoid the accident by swerving into the approaching lane of traffic, police said. Highway 234 curves onto Rock Point bridge at the scene of the accident.

The fatalities were the 12th and 13th in Jackson county this year.
