

Great Books Groups Being Organized in City; Start Soon

Two Great Books discussion groups are being planned in Medford this year, according to Omar Bacon, librarian.

The organizational meeting for one group will be held at 7:45 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 28, and the first meeting for the other group will be at 7:45 p.m. Thursday, Sept. 29. Both meetings will be in the public meeting room at the Public Library of Medford and Jackson County.

Bacon said persons interested in participating in the program may indicate their desire to take part in the discussions by signing up at the library, where there is now on display material on the Great Books discussion program.

The groups will meet for about two hours every other week to discuss a book, or a

selection from a book. Discussions, Bacon noted, are informal, and each selection or book is short enough for a person to finish during the period between meetings.

Reading material ranges from selections from the Bible to Shakespeare plays and more contemporary popular novelists and writers. The Great Books Foundation, a non-profit corporation which sponsors the groups in cooperation with local groups, pointed out that the "first thing about the so-called Great Books is their readability."

Most of the authors of selections in the program, the Foundation noted, "wrote, not primarily for scholars, but for an intelligent audience of laymen."

The books are discussed, not for a group to reach a decision, but for enjoyment and learning, Bacon noted.

The Great Books Foundation, which has headquarters in Chicago, is financed by grants from organizations, by the sale of its reprints, and by contributions from persons who join the Annual Membership plan.

Cab Firm Owner Feels Justified In Seeking Hike

Carl Kellenberger, owner of the Yellow Cab company, said he was justified in asking the Medford city council for a partial raise in taxi-cab fares because the company has not had a rate increase in the past 17 years.

The council Thursday night approved the rate hike which reduced the size of the 50-cent zone, and replaced the reduced portion with a 65-cent zone. All other zones and rates remain the same.

The rate hike will not be effective until after Mayor John Snider has signed the ordinance, which, if it is to go into effect at all he must do within 10 days of its passage.

Because the increase was made in only part of one zone and was not general, the overall percentage increase is small, according to Kellenberger.

Against Increase

Councilman Ed Hall had stated at the council meeting that he was voting against the request because it was a 30 per cent increase, which he felt was too large.

While taxi fares have remained the same for the past 17 years, Kellenberger said, costs have risen. He cited several examples of these rising costs, which included, cost of cars, up 91.7 per cent; cost of parts, up 50 per cent; mechanics wages, up 120 per cent; social security and unemployment for drivers, up 100 per cent; cost of dispatchers, up 35 cents per hour; cost of gasoline, up six cents per gallon; and gasoline taxes, up five cents per gallon.

John Hill, owner of the Courtesy Cab company who made the joint request for the raise in rates with Kellenberger, said that the cost of some of his runs use up 95 per cent of the fare. His company has been in operation only since the first of the year.
