Quarterback John Hadl ran 52 and 16 yards for touchdowns in Kansas' victory over Texas Christian. Halfback Bert Coan ran 28 yards for the Jayhawks' second score which produced a 14-0 lead in the opening period.

Tulane exhibited an alert defense in containing the California attack. After the Golden Bears had gone ahead on a 23-yard field goal by Jim Ferguson in the opening period, Tulane scored its winning touchdown on a 73-yard march just before the half ended. Phil Nugent passed seven yards to Tommy Mason for the score.

Chiefs Tip Canyonville

U.S. Olympians Working Way Across Europe

U.S. stars John Thomas and Wilma Rudolph demonstrated outstanding form in separate track and field meets Friday as Uncle Sam's Olympians continued to "work their way" around Europe before returning home.

Thomas, a disappointment in the Olympics but the world record holder from Cambridge, Mass. won his specialty at Helsinki, Finland with a high jump of seven feet.

Miss Rudolph, a three gold medal winner in the Rome games, anchored the U.S. 100-meter relay women's team to victory in 44.8 seconds and also won the 200-meter sprint in 11.6 seconds in a meet at Cologne, Germany.

At Cologne, Olympic champion Otis Davis of Los Angeles and the University of Oregon and Carl Kaufman of Germany ran a dead heat in the 400-meter dash.
