Chairmen of committees will be introduced and explain their duties. Refreshments will be served under the chairmanship of Mrs. Delos Cullen.

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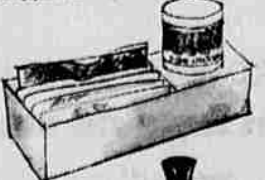
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
