Yesterday the Slessler's son, Larry W. Slessler, left for Eugene where he will be a senior at the university. He is majoring in history in the college of education.

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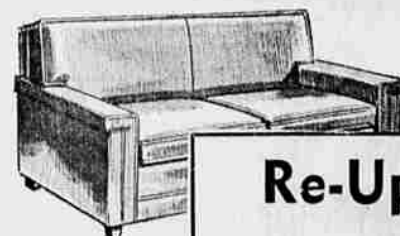
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
