

VA Notes Problem Of Mail from Vets

Far too many of the 200 million pieces of mail that flow through the Veterans administration each year cannot be properly identified, S. T. Brannock, contact representative, VA Domiciliary, White City, said Saturday.

Too many veterans and their dependents merely sign their names to correspondence, and names are not enough.

Almost all of the 30 million names in VA's master index file are duplicated. As might be expected, there are more than 300,000 Smiths and almost 200,000 Johnsons, but most other names are duplicated scores of times, Brannock said.

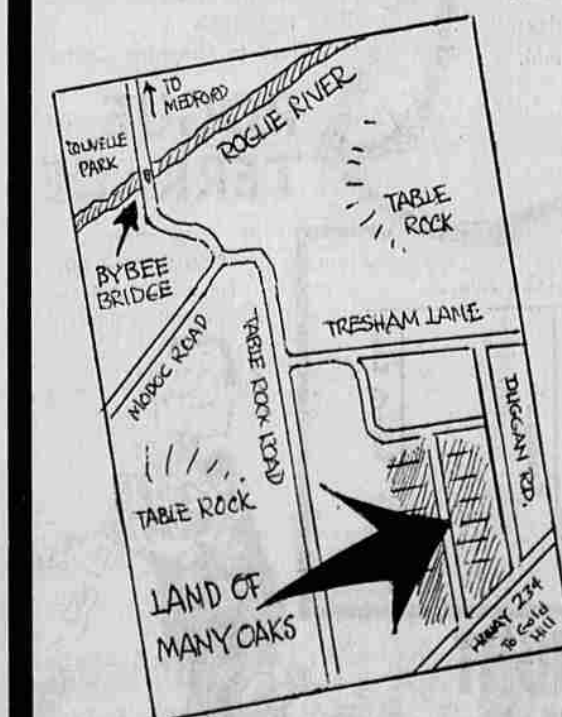
The veteran's claim number or "C-number" and his insurance number are his alone, Brannock pointed out. Inclusion of these numbers in correspondence will insure prompt and efficient service, and save the time and cost of additional correspondence.

Small Worlds Around Us

Wild Creatures Are on the Wane-Wake Up America!

Time was when millions of canvasbacks, redheads and ruddy ducks traveled the invisible flyways, when every pond and lake was dotted with feeding or resting wild ducks. Now the skies are nearly empty and what few ponds and lakes are left are sparsely inhabited. The great flocks are gone.

With the draining of every marsh and every wetland, the shortage becomes more acute. Only about one-fifth of the wetlands are still left. Twenty years ago there were upwards of 120 million acres in America.

Hunters On Increase

With the tremendous decrease in suitable waters for wildfowl, down to around 30 million acres, there is an enormous increase in the number of men and women who want to hunt. Last year around 35 million hunting and fishing licenses were issued. With every passing year the number of hunters and fishermen will increase. This creates a terrible imbalance. Practically all game animals in America are on the decrease and in short supply.

Everyone interested in the beauty of America and the

welfare and protection of her natural resources should awaken to the disturbing fact that our wild areas are being destroyed. Progress and pollution takes a terrible toll.

Lakes, ponds and rivers, where once fish, small animals and varied forms of wildlife abounded, are now poisoned by chemicals, mud and wastes. Too generous a use of insecticides and powerful herbicides has proved fatal to many, if not most, of the small creatures.

More Wetlands Needed

To only partly assure a few waterfowl for the immediate future, America needs at least twice the wetlands now available, and those must be free of pollution. Sort of pitiful that children yet to be born cannot enjoy what we have destroyed.

Future generations deserve the opportunity of spending a day afield in an unspoiled wilderness, or an afternoon on the bank of an unpolluted stream. But we will have to change our ways and our thinking. The "retreat" of America's wildlife is already at a headlong gallop. Wake up, my friends, this is your America — let's try to save a little.

Oregon Journal Supports Nixon For Presidency

Portland — (UPI) — The Oregon Journal, an independent newspaper which supported Democrat Adlai Stevenson in 1952 and President Eisenhower in 1956, has endorsed Vice President Richard M. Nixon for Richard.

In an editorial appearing in the Journal's Sunday edition, the newspaper said:

"The Journal supports Nixon for the presidency for several reasons. Foremost is the belief that he and his able running mate, Henry Cabot Lodge, are the stronger team, from the standpoint of both experience and capacity, to meet and overcome the challenge of communism and to keep the peace, with honor and justice."

Coolness, Courage

The editorial also said Nixon has exhibited "coolness and courage under fire," and that he "would go into the presidency better trained, better prepared and better informed than any man previously to hold that office."

On the issue of Kennedy's Roman Catholic religion, the Journal said: "Sen. Kennedy's religious faith has not been a factor in this decision. The Journal has consistently condemned religious bigotry. It does not, however, label as bigots all those who have raised the Roman Catholic church on certain public issues."

Special Education Classes Are Being Held in Districts

Special education classes for the mentally retarded school youngsters in Jackson county are being continued mostly on a district level, it was reported at a meeting of the county rural school board last week.

The only county special education class is now being held in Central Point. Eagle Point is conducting its own special education class under Annie Briggs, former primary class instructor in the county classes. The Ashland district is expected to start such classes soon, it was reported.

Special education classes

The county level was reorganized after Karl Hayes, former director-leader in the county program, resigned to take a position in the Gresham school district. Kay Blakeman, intermediate class teacher in the program, had resigned to continue her education in a New York university.

New Assistant

Dee Cox, former Evans Valley elementary principal and new county administrative assistant, has been devoting about 25 per cent of his time to reorganizing the special education program.

The rural board also reviewed the teachers' in-service training which is required by state law for at least one day during the school year.

The board complimented James McDonald, director of the county curriculum materials center, on the visual aids program held as part of the in-service training. This consisted of a mobile unit of 10 booths displayed in each of the districts.

'Good Old Days' To Be Available In Medford Store

A book edited and compiled by R. J. McGinnis, former editor of the Farm Quarterly and now of Gold Hill, will be published by Harper and Brothers Oct. 6. It will be on sale at Swem's Book and Gift store in Medford.

The book, entitled "The Good Old Days," recalls the toil and hardships, the rewards and pleasures of threshing time, the harvest, rabbit hunting, bringing in the cows, summer chores, stocking the winter woodpile, spring planting and stream fishing.

McGinnis recently retired as editor of the national farm magazine published in Cincinnati, Ohio, and moved to Gold Hill. However, he is still chairman of the editorial board of the publication with a circulation of 500,000.

Press Writer

McGinnis also has been head of the journalism department of Miami university and an Associated Press writer. He will also have another book published by Harper called "The Good Old Days in the West." The former editor still writes for the Farm Quarterly, Reader's Digest and other publications.

"The Good Old Days" brings back such institutions and events of rural life as the springhouse and root cellar, the village with its country store, smithy, livery and feed store, county fair with its balloon ascension, the Fourth of July parade, the traveling medicine and store wagon, the one-room school, McGuffey reader, dirt roads and covered bridges, courtship, marriage and the family cemetery.

"This book describes life on the old-time farm, fading into memory and never to return," according to the introduction. "It is the history of ordinary people as they once lived in their self-sufficiency and spurious freedom of isolation."
