Valuable Space Capsule Recovered From Ocean

Point Arguello, Calif. — (UPI) — The Navy today fired a 62-foot sounding rocket 1,200 miles into space and recovered an instrument capsule from the ocean.

The destroyer Rowan recovered the 83-pound capsule released by the NERV, nuclear emulsion recovery vehicle, about three hours after launching.

The destroyer radioed the instruments apparently were undamaged from the trip into space and that it would take the capsule to San Diego. From there, it will be taken to the Goddard Space Research Center for study by National Aeronautics and Space Administration scientists.

Point Arguello, Calif. — (UPI) — The Navy successfully fired a 62-foot NERV rocket into space today; its instrument capsule

splashing into the Pacific Ocean recovery area 1,200 miles down the missile range.

The four-stage solid fueled nuclear emulsion recovery vehicle (NERV) propelled its 83-pound capsule back to earth with information recovery vehicle (NERV) propelled its paths for man to follow through deadly radiation belts above the earth.

The slender rocket arched from the launch pad at this installation adjoining Vandenberg Air Force Base at 7:35 a.m. (p.s.t.).

The Navy said it needed only one success to complete the NERV program, but added recovery of the instrument capsule was imperative.

The payload dropped into the sea by parachute from the rocket contained emulsion plates much as a photographer uses. But these recorded the amount of radiation striking them.

Foreign Minister Offers Resolution

United Nations, N. Y. — (UPI) — Russia asked the General Assembly today to declare that Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld's Congo policy led to the overthrow of Patrice Lumumba's government.

Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin put a resolution before the assembly's emergency session demanding that it note that "nonimplementation" of a series of Security Council resolutions by Hammarskjöld and the U.N. Congo Command disrupted the Congo economy, incited its political situation and led to "the overthrow of the lawful government and parliament."

Zorin offered the resolution in opposition to a moderate, 17-nation Afro-Asian resolution affording support to Hammarskjöld's Congo policy.

The United States, while not entirely satisfied with sections of the Afro-Asian measure recognizing sovereignty of the "central government of the Congo" — which might be interpreted as recognition of Premier Patrice Lumumba's authority — decided not to offer amendments.

Zorin, who had accused the United States previously of seeking to take over the mineral-rich Congo behind its NATO allies, made no direct mention of Washington in his resolution.

Kennedy-Nixon Debate Times Told

Edward (Ted) Kennedy, youngest brother of Democratic Presidential Nominee John F. Kennedy, and Congresswoman Edith S. Green, Portland, will be in Medford Monday, Sept. 26.

They will participate in the formal opening of the "Citizens for Kennedy - Johnson" headquarters at 122 East Eighth st., and attend a no-host dinner at the Jackson hotel prior to the first nationally televised Kennedy-Nixon debate.

The dinner is open to the public and will start at 6 p.m. Television sets will be provided so the guests may view the debate on "Our Domestic Policy" which will be telecast from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. over KBES-TV.

The dates and times for the three other Kennedy-Nixon debates as announced by the local television station are Oct. 7, 6:30 to 7:30 p.m.; Oct. 13, 6:30 to 7:30 p.m., and Oct. 21, 9 to 10 p.m. The topic for the final debate will be "Foreign Policy."

The formal opening of the new headquarters will begin at 4:30 p.m., according to Henry Padgham, committee general chairman. Mrs. Hugh Friel is in charge of the headquarters which opened Sept. 15.

Kennedy, who is in charge of the Southwest region of the Kennedy-Johnson campaign, and Mrs. Green, who heads the Oregon campaign, will both address the dinner meeting.

Rainstorm, Tight Security Greet Premier

No Time Wasted In Job at Ike

New York — (UPI) — Premier Nikita Khrushchev arrived today in a drenching rainstorm for his "Red summit" at the United Nations and received the most dismal and aloof reception of his globe-circling travels.

The Soviet leader took a job at President Eisenhower as soon as he stepped onto American soil from the liner Baltika.

Khrushchev said he hoped Eisenhower would make more than a "fancy speech" at the U.N. Assembly and said his own purpose was to spare no effort until "even the thick-skulled" realize the necessity of general disarmament.

Standing bare-headed beneath the leaky roof of a dingy pier in the East river after arrival with a band of satellite chiefs, Khrushchev said he came with the "very best feelings" from his U.S. visit last year and was confident that Russo-American relations would improve.

But there was not a representative of the City of New York, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller or Eisenhower on hand to greet him.

Khrushchev arrived in a city tense with security preparations. Demonstrators Sunday night had almost overwhelmed police at the Soviet U.N. headquarters on Park ave. where he will stay during the sessions of the General Assembly.

The Communist leaders of Hungary, Bulgaria and Romania arrived with him on the Baltika. Waiting on the gloomy pier were the leaders of Communist Poland and Czechoslovakia.

His Coolest Reception

The only Americans of any prominence present were Cyrus Eaton, the Cleveland industrialist who won the Lenin Peace Prize last year, and his wife.

UPI Moscow correspondent Henry Shapiro reported this was the coolest reception Khrushchev had ever received.

"I have covered most of his trips, and I've never seen anything as dismal as this," Shapiro said.

Those who would disrupt relations got a setback from the rain today. It drowned out plans for harbor craft to picket the Baltika, and the wind swept away shouts from longshoremen who went out on a chartered excursion boat.

A handful of drenched demonstrators were barred by a cordon of police across the East river drive from the pier.

Candidate Invited To Meet President

Dr. Edwin R. Durno, Republican candidate for congress from the fourth district, will fly to Washington, D.C., tonight at the invitation of President Eisenhower.

Dr. Durno will meet with the President at the White House at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday to discuss his current campaign.

The Republican candidate received the President's invitation last Friday and immediately changed his campaign plans to make the Washington trip possible.

After conferring with the President and congressional leaders on Tuesday, Dr. Durno will fly back Wednesday to resume his campaign throughout the fourth district. He has a major speeches scheduled Thursday in Coquille and Friday in Eugene.

Woman Gets Call After Sending Letter

A woman who wrote a letter to the communications section of the Mail Tribune recently was the recipient of an obscene telephone call during the week end, according to city police.

Police said they were told by the woman that a man called and asked her if she had written a certain letter. When she said she had, the man then muttered some obscenities and she hung up on him.

Police advised the woman to be sure to report any other such calls. A person making an obscene call is subject to a charge of disorderly conduct, with a penalty of a fine of \$100 and 60 days in jail, police said.

Laos Said Invaded by Forces Of Communist Viet Minh Army

Bangkok, Thailand — (UPI) — Rival military factions in Laos announced today that the country had been invaded by Communists. One side called on the Free World for help.

The Red threat increased the possibility that the South-east Asia Treaty Organization would send aid to the tiny land-locked kingdom. A U.S. aircraft carrier and combat-ready Marines are on maneuvers in the South China Sea and presumably would be available in an emergency.

News of the invasion was broadcast by the "neutralist" government of Prince Souvanna Phouma, for Vientiane — the country's administrative capital — and by a pro-Western revolutionary regime established in Savannakhet by Prince Boon Oum and Gen. Phoumi Nosavan.

Radio Vientiane appealed to Boon Oum and Phoumi to join forces with Phouma to combat the Red invasion.

Phouma was reported to have sent word to Boon Oum asking him to fly to the royal capital in Luang Prabang to discuss the situation with King Savang Vatthana.

Boon Oum, who returned Sunday from Sam Neua Province, which borders on Communist North Viet Nam, said Laotian army outposts had been attacked by Communist Pathet Lao and Viet Minh troops.

"Our country has been invaded by Communists but we have not surrendered," Boon Oum said in a broadcast over Radio Savannakhet.

"Supported by Viet Minh battalions, the enemy is speeding its advance and has joined with subversive elements in the interior of Laos. Other Viet Minh battalions are continuing their march north of our frontier."

Porter's Assistant On Inspection Trip

At the request of Congressman Charles O. Porter, the U.S. Army corps of engineers has arranged an administrative trip for Porter's administrative assistant, Jack L. Billings, this week.

The trip will cover most of the active corps of engineer public works projects in the fourth congressional district of Oregon.

Tuesday Billings will fly over Lost creek, Elk creek, Big Butte creek, Meadows and Copper dam sites and return to Medford by the way of Bear creek. Wednesday morning he will drive up the Rogue river to Lost Creek dam site and visit the Elk Creek dam site on that creek before leaving for Grants Pass.

Failure To Confirm Lemon Criticized

Eugene — (UPI) — Chancellor John Richards of the state system of higher education today criticized a Senate committee's failure to confirm the appointment of Dean E. B. Lemon to head the State Scholarship Commission.

The governor's office earlier had protested the committee's action.

Results of Tests in Murder Case Expected This Week

The Jackson county sheriff's office is awaiting results of lie-detector and ballistics tests in the latest lead to the murder of an Ashland rancher's wife March 15.

Sheriff Joe Walsh and Deputy Lee Rice returned from Spokane Sunday after questioning an airman at the Fairchild Air Force base last week end.

Walsh said extensive questioning revealed the airman was in this area in March, but not in Ashland on the date of the shooting of Mrs. Marion Stella Hamilton, 48.

Voter Registration To Close Oct. 8

"The required length of residence in Oregon will prevent a number of newcomers to Jackson county from voting in the November election and there is nothing we can do about it," County Clerk Marvin Madden said today.

To legally register here for the November election, a citizen must have lived in the state for at least six months. Registration for the general election closes Oct. 8. How-

ever, if a person becomes 21 years of age after Oct. 8, but before Nov. 8 and, or, completes the six months residential requirement before Nov. 8, they may register now, Madden said.

The election rule which seems to bother a number of people is that, "if a person moves to another state, or to any of the territories, with the intention of making it his permanent home, he shall be considered to have lost his residence in this state."

The election laws also provide that "if a person goes from this state into any other state or territory and there exercises the right of suffrage, he shall be considered to have lost his residence in this state."

A measure has been proposed where a person living in Oregon less than six months may vote for the president and vice president. California has a similar law which allows a person to vote for the president and vice president if they have lived in California 54 days before applying for registration and have not applied for an absentee ballot.

If passed by the state legislature this regulation will mean establishing another file and considerably more paper work in the elections department, it was explained.

The county clerk said residents will be able to register until 8 p.m., Oct. 8. All registrars will be required to register people up to that deadline on Oct. 8, he said.

Voter registration figures compiled as of today show 16,766 Republicans registered, 17,093 Democrats and 791 Independents for a total of 34,750. The elections department has 700 more voter registration cards to process, it reported.

Precincts which will now have the dog control measure on their ballots besides the ones mentioned are Precincts 19, 21, 24, 27, 63, 66, 74, 81, 82 and 83.

77 Victims Listed In Crash of Plane

Agana, Guam — (UPI) — A four-engine transport plane exploded into flames shortly after takeoff at dawn today and smashed against a mountain killing scores of U.S. servicemen and civilians. A group in the tail section survived.

Officials here list 78 dead and 16 survivors but contradictory figures on the size of the crew indicated the death toll might be 77.

An eye witness said the plane, a DC6B chartered by the Military Air Transport Service from World Airways, was burning in the air before it hit Mt. Barrigada.
