The magic numbers which will produce the first New York-Pittsburgh World Series in 33 years were reduced today to seven for the Yankees and six for the Pirates. In other words, it will be all over in the American league if the Yankees win seven of their remaining 11 games and the race will end in the National league if the Pirates win six of their last 11.

The countdown which will wipe out the last mathematical hopes of the Baltimore Orioles, Chicago White Sox, St. Louis Cardinals and Milwaukee Braves began in earnest Sunday when the Yankees and Pirates swept double-headers. The Yankees whipped the Orioles, 7-3 and 2-0, to complete a crushing four-game sweep of the vital head-to-head series while the Pirates beat the Cincinnati Reds, 5-3 and 1-0, with Vern Law winning his 20th game.

Lead By Four
As a result, the Yankees opened up a four-game AL lead over both the Orioles and White Sox and the Pirates zoomed six games ahead of the Cardinals and 6½ ahead of the Braves.

The White Sox won their opener, 8-4, but then suffered a jolting 7-6 loss that left them five games behind the Yankees in the loss column. The Cleveland Indians beat the Kansas City Athletics, 9-2, after a 3-2 loss and the Boston Red Sox defeated the Washington Senators, 3-1, in other AL games.

The Cardinals edged the San Francisco Giants, 4-3, the Braves whipped the Philadelphia Phillies, 7-1, and the Chicago Cubs beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 5-2, in other NL action.

A crowd of 53,876 at Yankee Stadium saw the Yankees win the big one as they have done so often over the years. Tony Kubek's homer and a two-run double by Yogi Berra were the big blows of the opener in which Art Ditmar received credit for his 15th victory. Ralph Terry pitched a no-hitter for seven innings and wound up with a two-hitter in the second game with Kubek and Berra driving in the Yankees' runs with sacrifice flies.

Dick Stuart and Don Hook each hit a double and homer in the Pirates' opener as Law raised his season record to 20-8. Late-inning homers by Willie Jones and Frank Robinson produced Cincinnati's runs off Law who yielded nine hits. Vinegar Bend Mizell pitched a three-hitter in the second game. The Pirates scoring their run in the seventh on doubles by Hook and Dick Schofield.

The Tigers rallied for two runs on three singles and a sacrifice fly in the seventh inning of their second game to overtake Turk Lown and the White Sox. The White Sox romped in the opener behind a 15-hit attack that included three hits each by Nelson Fox and Jim Landis and brought Frank Baumann his 12th triumph.

Ernie Broglio pitched a four-hitter to win his 20th game for the Cardinals, who took the lead with a three-run sixth-inning rally featured by Ken Boyer's double and a two-run single by Stan Musial. Broglio, who has won 15 of his last 18 decisions, struck out eight in raising his record to 20-7.

Hurls Four-Hitter
Joey Jay pitched a four-hitter and Bill Bruton and Joe Adcock homered for the Braves as Art Mahaffey lost his third straight game. Jay struck out 10 and walked only two to win his ninth victory. Adcock had a triple and a single in addition to his 24th homer.

Dick Williams' two-run homer enabled the Athletics to beat Cleveland in their first game but the Indians

came back with a 14-hit attack in the nightcap. Walt Bond drove in three runs with a homer and a double and Red Wilson weighed in with a homer for the Indians.

Lu Clinton's two-run single in the sixth inning enabled the Red Sox' Bill Monbouquette to win his 14th game with relief help from Mike Fornieles, while Don Zimmer, Rookie Ron Santo and George Altman homered in a five-run sixth-inning rally for the Cubs.

OSC Fans Jubilant Over Win
Oregon State College, Corvallis — What can you say now about Tommy Prothro's inspired Oregon State Beavers, fresh from a 14-0 victory over Southern California's mighty Trojans, their national title hopes shattered by the Beavers' hot rod offense, and catering defense?

While Prothro and his happy staff began rapid preparations for Saturday's intercollegiate with Iowa at Iowa City, northwest football fans, especially around the OSC campus still reeled with the ecstasy they experienced after the Beavers pulled off the first victory over a Southern California team in Los Angeles in 25 years, and the first Coliseum victory for an OSC grid squad since the Beavers turned the trick in 1948 against UCLA.

While Prothro's new innovations in the time-honored single wing with balanced line attack to which he is devoted will certainly come in for special scrutiny by the Hawkeyes and other future OSC opponents, that interest must be shared by the Orangemen's one-two tail-back punch in the swiftness of running of Don (The Kid) Kasso, and the left-handed passing of young Terry Baker, who played in his first OSC football game last Friday night, and pitched the Beavers to their second touchdown, after Kasso ripped off a 16-yard scamper for the first.

Plumley Bolsters
The loss, for several weeks, of fullback Hank Rivera will cause problems in the immediate planning of the Beavers, although Chuck Marshall performed more than adequately running up the middle, and powered over the second score. The formidable single wing reverse, returned in force with increased effectiveness with the running of Art Gilmore.

The Oregon State defense, bolstered by Mike Kline, Neil Plumley and linebacker Dick DeBischop, plus the sterling work of safety Grimm Mason, with a pair of timely interceptions, surpassed highest expectations, but not to the extent that Prothro's now-unveiled offense reached. Using the secretiveness of a locked stadium and canvas hung practice field, the Southern gentleman poured his charges through vigorous sessions installing the unbalances, men in motion, belly and option series which baffled the Trojans, and opened up the defenses set to stop the normal single-wing attack.

In Iowa, the Beavers' 1957 Rose Bowl opponent, the Orangemen will face another fast, rugged squad, although not of the nation acclaim showered on USC. In 1958 Oregon State dropped a narrow 14-13 setback to the Hawkeyes, and then absorbed a 33-19 defeat in the Rose Bowl to climax the same season.

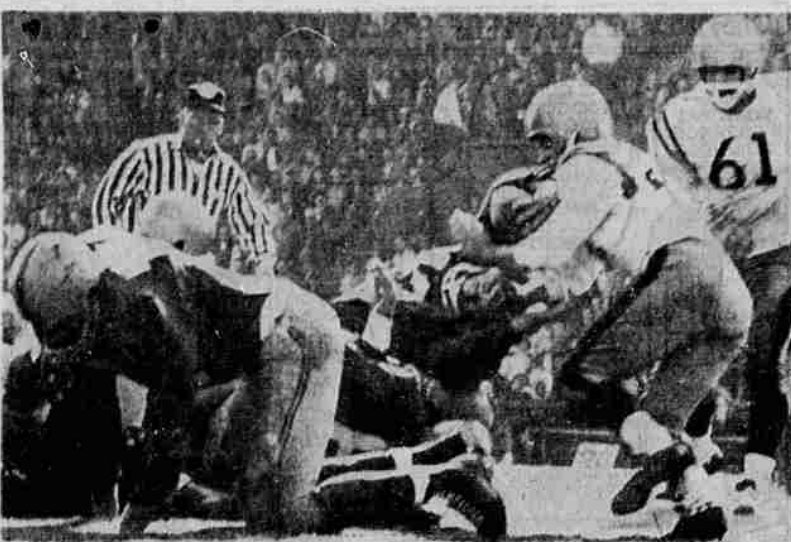

Darlene Hard Captures Singles Crown

Stagg received so many letters as a result of publicity on his 98th birthday that he said he and his wife, Stella, spent all their time these days answering mail.

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Activities Association Suspends West Linn High

Portland — (UPI) — The Oregon School Activities association has announced that West Linn high school had been suspended indefinitely. Ed Ryan, assistant secretary-treasurer of the OSAA, said the suspension stemmed from a second OSAA rule violation by the West Linn school.

The suspension takes place immediately and prohibits West Linn from competing interscholastically in any sport. It canceled the West Linn-McMinnville game scheduled Friday night.

Ryan said the OSAA Board of Control acted after West Linn, in a letter from West Linn Public School Superintendent Chester Tennell and Dan Rollins, coach at West Linn, was suspended from further coaching duties.

The OSAA board of control will meet Tuesday at 10 a.m. to determine the final action to be taken against West Linn. No action had been taken against Sandy.

Laver, Hard Favorites

Los Angeles — (UPI) — Play in the singles bracket begins today at the 34th annual Pacific Southwest International Tennis Championships with Rod Laver of Australia and newly-crowned Women's National champ Darlene Hard favored to triumph.

In Sunday's mixed doubles finals, youngsters Karen Hantze and Rafael Osuna upset the favored veteran team of England's Ann Haydon and Robert Mark of Australia, 9-7, 15-13, in a two-hour-plus match that ended under the lights.

Osuna, 21, a member of Mexico's Davis Cup team, and the 17-year-old San Diego miss moved into the finals by beating Christine Truman of England and Ramsey Earnhart, 18, Ventura, Calif., 6-2, 6-3.

The Haydon - Mark team missed the finals with an 18-16, 6-3 triumph over Kathy Chabot of San Diego and Donald Dell of Bethesda, Md.
