

Russian Premier's End Man To Attend Meeting of United Nations

Vienna — (UPI) — After the Hungarian revolt of 1956, Janos Kadar could hardly set foot outside his Budapest headquarters without a task force of bodyguards. Today the grim chief of Hungary's Communist party dares undertake a public visit to America.

Such is the turning of history, which this week will witness the first flaunting of power in the West by at least four leaders of the Eastern European satellites.

Kadar, who double-crossed the revolutionary government of the late Imre Nagy, was a vital partner of Russia's Nikita Khrushchev when Soviet might put down the freedom regime in Budapest. Now he is billed as one of Khrushchev's end men in the rump summit planned at the fall General Assembly session of the United Nations.

Also expected are Wladyslaw Gomulka of Poland, Antonin Novotny of Czechoslovakia, Gheorghe Gheorghiu-Dej of Romania, Todor Zhivkov of Bulgaria, and Mehmet Shehu of Albania.

Believed Firmly Installed
Here, in brief, are the lives of the puppet leaders whom Khrushchev believes so firmly installed that he can show them before the United Nations:

Kadar, 48, of peasant lineage, at the age of 19 became the leader of an illegal Hungarian youth group.

During World War II while Hungary's main leaders Imre Nagy, Ernő Geroe, Joseph Reval and Zoltan Vas lived comfortably in Moscow, Kadar remained in Hungary working for the party underground.

He was captured by the Nazis, but escaped in time and met the Soviet army advancing to Budapest. He became a politbureau member after Hungary's occupation by the Red Army and was made deputy police chief. During the trial of Josef Cardinal Mindszenty in 1948, he was minister of interior.

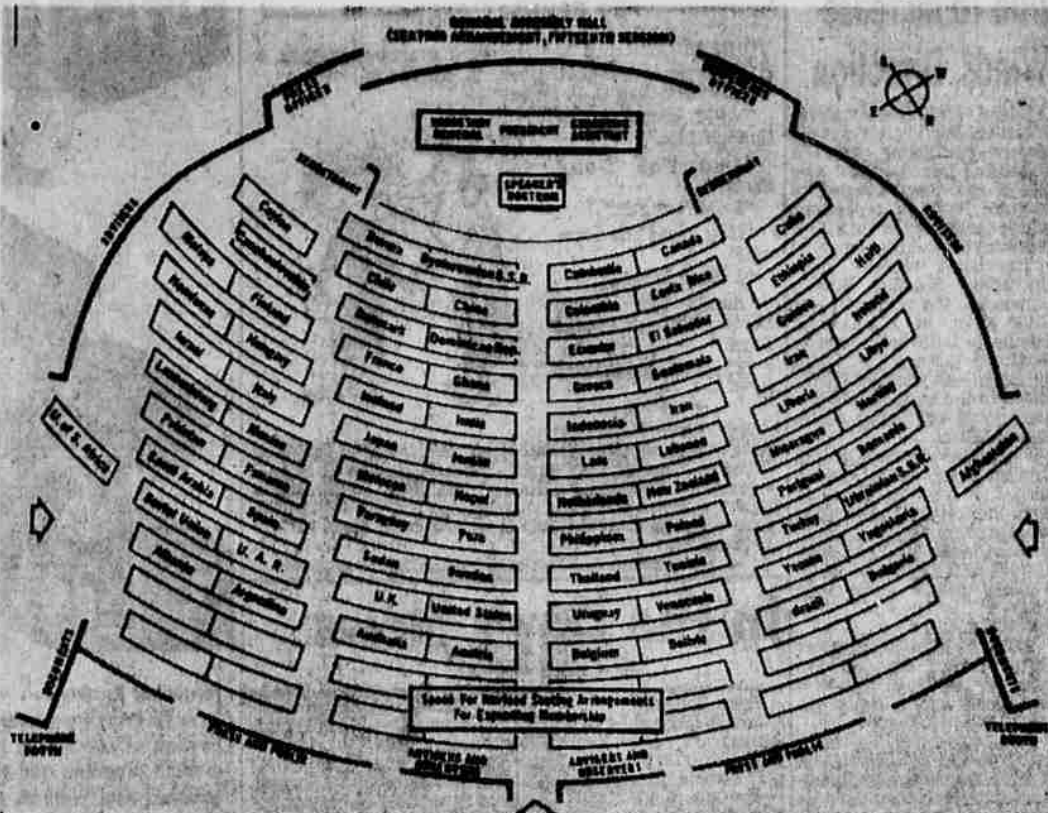
During the anti-Tito campaign he was arrested and resisted intense torture including the fingernail treatment, applied by police chiefs Gabor Peter and Vladimir Farakas.

leader at the Grivita railway workshop on the outskirts of Bucharest. The strike was suppressed and Gheorghiu, for his role as organizer, was sentenced to 12 years imprisonment.

In 1944 he escaped from prison and after the end of World War II he emerged as Gheorghiu-Dej. The hyphenated "Dej" he adopted from the name of one of the towns in which he had been imprisoned.

In the coalition government which preceded the Communist takeover in 1948, he held various cabinet posts. In 1945 he became Politbureau member and secretary general of the party, attended the 1948 Paris peace conference and in 1948, after being named first deputy premier, he attended the historic Cominform session which met to expel Tito's Yugoslavia.

Gheorghiu-Dej became premier in 1952 after the expulsion of the Ana Pauker-Vasile Luca faction of the party secretary.

With the return to "collective leadership" in the Eastern bloc, he resigned in 1954 as first party secretary. In 1955 he switched jobs again, resigning as premier and taking over the post as first secretary.

Todor Zhivkov, 59, was born in the village of Provets near Sofia, Bulgaria, descendant of a poor peasant family. He attended a few years of elementary school in his native village and later joined an art school in Sofia. At the age of 19, in 1930, he joined the underground Communist Youth Organization.

Zhivkov held a number of key posts in the Sofia party organization. In 1950 he was elected as a party secretary and candidate member of the Politbureau in 1950. One year later he was elected as a full member of the Politbureau.

Minister of Albania
Albanian Prime Minister Mehmet Shehu is labelled the "butcher of Albania" because during his term as minister of the interior all anti-Communist elements were purged.

Shehu, son of a Moslem priest, was born in 1918 in Corush. He won a scholarship at the military academy, but was suspended after three months for anti-government activities.

Shehu spent the thirties in Italy and Spain, fighting for the Republicans in Spain. After the victory of the Franco troops, he went to France in 1939, and was imprisoned there for three years.

After his return to Albania Shehu worked to overthrow the government. In 1946 he was appointed chief of staff of the people's army. Two years later he was appointed minister of interior. He took over as prime minister in July 1954.

Shehu is married. His wife Eyrete is one of the leading women in the Albanian party organization. She is vice president of the people's assembly.

Big Networks To Shun Khrushchev

New York — (UPI) — The three major TV networks indicated Sunday they will keep Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev off their big interview programs.

The Mutual Broadcasting System, a radio network, said however it was not contacted by the State Department and had already invited Khrushchev to appear. Khrushchev has not replied, Mutual said. William S. B. Lacy, State Department special assistant for East-West contacts, spoke with officials of the NBC, CBS, and ABC TV networks informally and expressed the "hope" that they would limit themselves to covering Khrushchev's activities as head of the Soviet U.N. delegation, it was revealed Saturday night. Lacy said he felt that inviting Khrushchev to appear on special shows would merely give him a propaganda platform.

Spokesmen for the networks said they already had decided not to ask Khrushchev to appear. An ABC spokesman said one reason was that Khrushchev in the past insisted on selecting the questions he was to be asked and using his own interpreter.

The networks said however, they certainly would cover Khrushchev's U.N. activities, including his speech to the General Assembly, scheduled for Friday.
