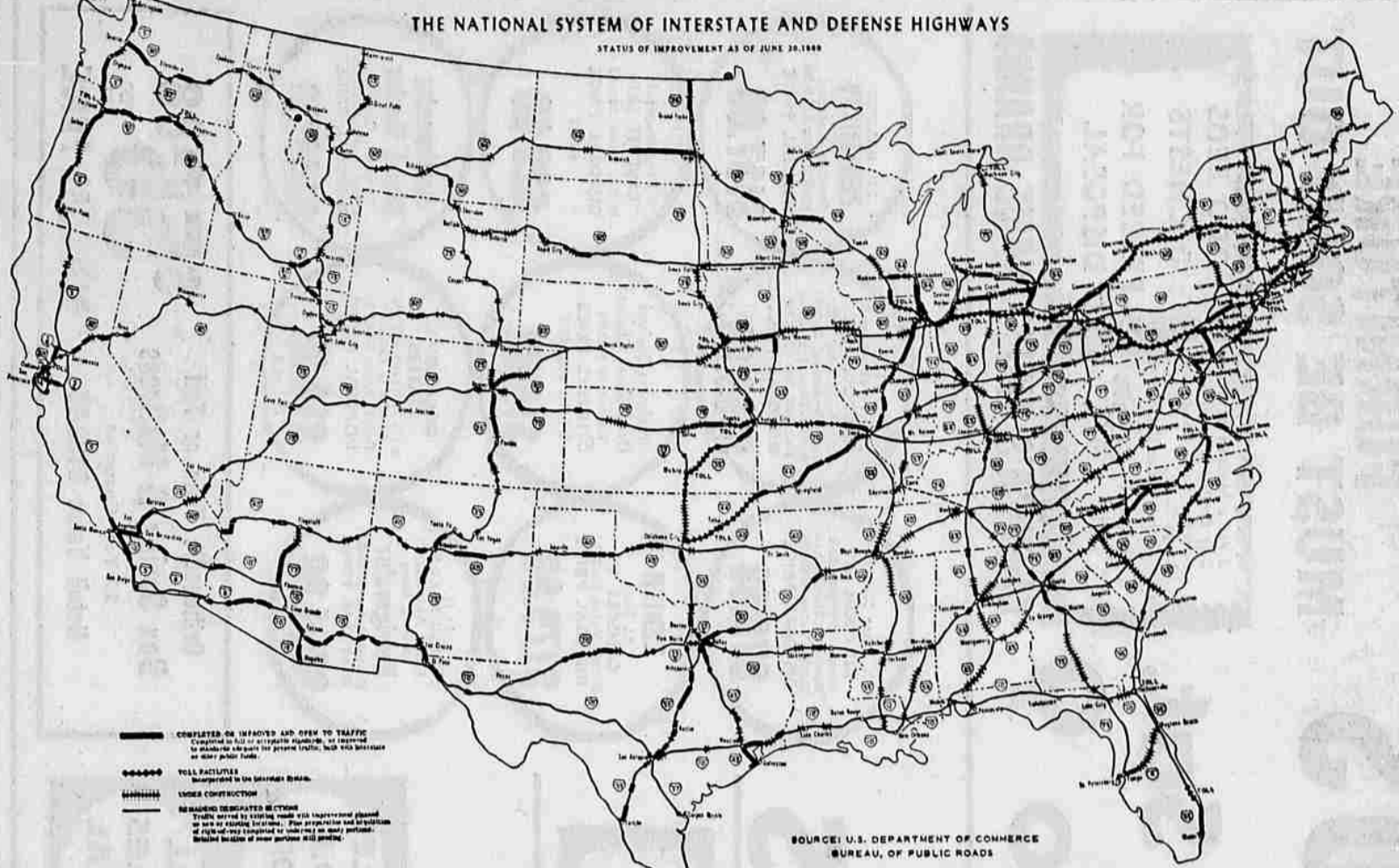

Penney Gasoline Tax Increase Likely To Pay for Roads

Washington - Candidates for Congress aren't talking much about it, but the chances are that motorists will be asked next year to pay another penny a gallon in federal gasoline tax. Object of the hike will be to rescue the 41,000-mile network of interstate highways from the financial troubles that have overtaken it in only four short years.

Public confidence in the program may be somewhat shaken when a special House public works subcommittee resumes hearings - probably after the election - on allegations of corruption, waste and mismanagement. Chairman John A. Blatnik (D-Minn.) has hinted that new disclosures will make past fault-finding seem "like a tea party."

Testimony given earlier this year brought out the fact that some overpasses on the new roads were built too low to allow passage of trucks carrying giant ballistic missiles. The subcommittee was told also about an alleged overpayment of \$524,889 to an Oklahoma contractor on a 13-mile stretch of the system near Tulsa. Intensive subcommittee investigations are now under way in at least six states.

Pushing a gas tax increase through Congress may not be easy after another round of hearings on what President Eisenhower once called "the greatest public works program in history." But federal and state officials assert that occasional cases of maladministration and skulduggery should not be allowed to hold up progress on a vast highway program of vital importance to the national economy.

Meanwhile, construction of the network of controlled-access superhighways is proceeding. A Bureau of Public Roads progress report shows that about 9,100 miles of the 41,000-mile system had been opened to traffic by July 1, and that another 4,700 miles were under construction. However, only 3,693 of the completed highway miles had been built to estimated traffic demands of 1975, and 2,274 miles consisted of bridges, tunnels and toll roads built by the states and simply incorporated into the interstate system.
