Tito Tells of
Desire To Help
Ease TensionsYugoslav, Albania
Leaders Arrive

New York—(UPI)—A smiling Marshal Tito arrived today for the United Nations General Assembly session and said Yugoslavia wanted to help "alleviate the tensions of the world."

Tito arrived aboard the liner Queen Elizabeth, along with Albanian Communist leader Premier Mehmet Shehu, and was greeted by a small crowd of 20 to 30 Yugoslav and Albanian officials.

To Explain Views

"We come to the United Nations in order to explain our views on the main problems and we wish to contribute in the best way we can in alleviating the tensions of the world," Tito said after debarking.

More than 500 New York City policemen, government and Yugoslav security agents surrounded Pier 90 on the Hudson river, where the huge liner docked.

It was more than two hours late in arriving because of fog and mist which hung over the harbor.

Whisked To Quarters

Twenty mounted policemen were outside the pier to keep traffic moving and crowds from congregating. Tito and his party, including Ambassador Marko Nikezic, were whisked to their midtown quarters at the Yugoslav delegation to the U.N. located less than five blocks from where Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev is staying.

Albanian Premier Shehu also made a brief statement when he got off the ship and left for his delegation's residence. He is confined to Manhattan Island during his visit, along with Khrushchev, Cuban Premier Fidel Castro, and Janos Kadar of Hungary.

Crime School Is
Planned in City

A "major case" crime school will be held Monday and Tuesday, Sept. 26 and 27, by the federal bureau of investigation for the Medford Police department.

The two-day school will be held at the U.S. Army Reserve Center, Columbus ave. and West Jackson st.

According to Chief of Police Charles P. Champlin, the school will give training in major case investigation and in searching for and preserving evidence. Law enforcement officers with departments in nearby cities and counties have been invited to attend.

Two FBI agents from the Portland office, Max Taylor and Harry Welch, will instruct the school. Medford police officers who are assisting in setting up the school are Capt. Clyde C. Fichtner, Lt. Orlo W. McGee and Lt. Jack E. McMillan.

District Court Judge Roy Bashaw will preside at the moot court Tuesday afternoon with Gerald J. Scannell, chief deputy district attorney, prosecuting attorney, William V. Deatherage, Medford lawyer, will be the attorney for the defense.

County Home Rule
Group Holds 1st
Working Meeting

The first working session of the Jackson county home rule committee yesterday afternoon discussed the possible effects and need for home rule.

The Jackson county court will be asked to explain at next Monday afternoon's meeting how home rule might improve the efficiency of county government operations. The committee will continue its research into the benefits and liabilities of home rule, particularly what powers are permitted county government under home rule charter.

The committee was in general agreement that the major problems in present county government as related by Committee Member P. G. Humphreys are:

- (1) It is unwieldy to refer to state legislative problems which could be settled at home;
- (2) It is desirable to keep government close to the people;
- (3) That it is necessary that the county find a method of handling expanding communities' problems.

His main point was how could a county charter help Jackson county. To try to find these answers, the committee will query the county court on actual problems which must be referred the state legislature, and ways in which Jackson county administration might be made more efficient.

Manor Residents
To Start Moving
In on January 30

Residents will start moving into Rogue Valley Manor, the big new retirement apartment on Barneburg hill, next Jan. 30.

The date was announced Monday evening at a meeting of the board of trustees and Manor members at the First Presbyterian church.

Walter M. Higgins, executive director, said that between six and ten weeks would be needed to move all members into the building.

The schedule calls for the first three floors to be occupied between Jan. 30 and Feb. 8; floors 4 and 5, Feb. 9 to 22; floors 6 and 7, Feb. 23 to March 8, and floors 8, 9 and 10, March 9 to 23.

Delay Explained

M. M. Hogan, president of the board of directors, explained that the delay in the completion of the building was due to an unexpected amount of rock at the Manor site, an unusually high number of nights last winter with frost, when cement work had to be stopped, and a shortage of plasterers. It was explained that 40 feet of solid rock had to be excavated for the foundation and basement.

Originally, opening was expected in November.

Higgins said that the Manor staff would be hired and start work as demand increased with the moving in of the members.

He said that no public open house is planned as the Manor is a "private home."

Answer Questions

Higgins, who called the Manor "grandchild proof," answered questions of members prior to the close of the meeting. They included queries about telephone service, garages, garden space, bus service, a house committee, and guest rooms.

It was noted that the Manor is on 17½ acres of land and that paving will start today in the parking area. Hogan said that of the 257 apartments only 75 have not been sold.

Hogan will conduct a similar meeting tonight in Palo Alto, Calif., as a large percentage of Manor members live in that area.

Street Program
On Council Agenda

Ashland—Main item on the agenda for the Ashland city council meeting at 8 o'clock tonight will be a public hearing on a \$70,000 street improvement plan which calls for paving, curbing and guttering for 12 streets.

Plans were prepared by City Superintendent Elmer Biegel and were approved by the council at its last meeting. Work would be performed over a two-year period.

Streets included are Hillview dr. from Siskiyou blvd. to Peachy lane; Normal ave. from Highway 66 to the Southern Pacific right of way; Clark st. from Garden Way to Walker ave.; South Mountain ave. from Pleasant Way to Prospect ave.; Prospect from South Mountain to Elkader; Gresham st. from Fairview to Iowa sts.; Auburn st. from Iowa to Gresham; Wimer st. from Scenic dr. to Chestnut st.; Scenic dr. from Maple st. to the curve south of Manzanita; Rock st. from Coolidge to Maple sts.; Coolidge from Rock st. to Scenic dr., and Maple from North Main to Chestnut sts.

Russian Premier
Calls on Castro
In Harlem Hotel

New York—(UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev visited Cuba's Premier Fidel Castro in a Harlem hotel today and touched off such a wave of excitement that mounted police were used to force back a cheering, jeering crowd of Negroes.

There was no advance warning of the Khrushchev journey nearly six miles uptown in a motorcade of limousines, motorcycles and squad cars to see Castro, and pandemonium broke out in front of the hotel as he arrived.

Antonio Nunes-Jimenez, Cuba's agriculture reform institute minister, wearing green fatigues and flowing black beard, pushed past newsmen and security officers to fling his arms around the Russian in a bear hug.

Newsman Swept Aside

Startled policemen on the scene, Secret Service men, who had accompanied Khrushchev on the wild dash up Park ave., and aides flung newsmen out of the way as Khrushchev stepped from the black limousine and hustled through the double glass doors into the hotel lobby.

Khrushchev went to Castro's room and the men conferred for 30 minutes. Word spread rapidly of the visit and thousands of residents of the predominantly Negro area poured out to watch.

Khrushchev and Castro came down together, Castro towering over the chubby Khrushchev and with one green-clad arm draped across his shoulder. Both were bareheaded and they laughed, smiled, waved and posed for photographers at the hotel entrance.

\$60,000 Program
Recommended for
Two County Lakes

A \$60,000 construction program for further recreational facilities at Howard Prairie and Emigrant lakes this fiscal year will be recommended to the county court, the Jackson County Parks and Recreation commission decided last night.

Construction should be completed before opening of fishing season, the commission said.

The proposed facilities and their estimated cost at Howard Prairie include: store and coffee shop, \$30,000; widening of ramp for boat launching, \$5,000; initial portion of dock and moorage facilities, \$10,000; 25 kilowatt electric plant, \$1,750; electric wiring for present facilities, \$500; and contingencies at Howard Prairie, including architectural fees, \$5,000.

Emigrant Estimates

Emigrant lake estimated expenditures include: sanitary facilities, including two restrooms, \$4,000; water development, \$1,500; and contingencies, \$1,750.

These are preliminary estimates. City-County Parks and Recreation Director Robert L. Haworth said, "If the court is at all receptive to the plan, these developments must be started in rapid fire order due to inclement weather expected in about a month," he added.

A series of three sonic booms, all of them of about the same intensity in some areas of the valley, yesterday afternoon resulted in reports of "a couple of broken windshields" in automobiles in the valley.

A suspect in the investigation of the shooting of Mrs. Marion Stella Hamilton, Ashland rancher's wife, will not be given a lie-detector test until Wednesday afternoon, the Spokane county sheriff's office said today.

County Sheriff Joe Walsh and Deputy Lee Rice spent last week end investigating an airman at a Spokane, Wash., Air Force base regarding the fatal shooting March 15. Extensive questioning of the airman revealed he was in this area in March, but he could not be pinned down as to his exact whereabouts on March 15, Walsh said.

A 22 caliber pistol which the airman had while he was AWOL is being checked by the state crime laboratory, the sheriff said. Results of test firings are not yet known.

Russia Leads
Communists To
United Nations

United Nations, N.Y.—(UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, bobbing up from a solid diplomatic defeat in the United Nations this morning, led his Communist bloc admirers into the momentous 15th annual General Assembly session today.

In a seat near the front of the brilliantly lighted U.N. arena was Cuba's bearded Fidel Castro.

A covey of satellite "heads of government" or Communist party chiefs and a scattering of neutralist premiers and heads of countries still uncommitted in the cold war heeded Khrushchev's appeal to come to New York for an unofficial summit session within the assembly.

Western Leaders Absent

Missing were the Western leaders stung by Khrushchev's arrogance and his insults to President Eisenhower and the United States when he wrecked the real summit conference at Paris last May. Present here and in New York City was the greatest collection of police and guards and the most elaborate security arrangements in New York history.

Eisenhower is scheduled to address the assembly Thursday morning, taking the spotlight a day ahead of Khrushchev's first turn on the rostrum of the assembly which by then may total 97 member nations. But the President planned to spend only two hours here and to ignore the flamboyant Russian as much as possible.

The Communist bloc has billed the session as the most important in U.N. history and Khrushchev has hinted at a new disarmament plan he will unfold before the group. The West already was suspicious.

In the background was a turbulent situation in The Congo, a fight for the uncommitted nations of the world, a search for real peace with honor and an end of world tensions. Khrushchev had lost ground in the pursuit of uncommitted nations when the 17-nation Afro-Asian bloc he has wooed voted against Russia in an emergency U.N. session early today.

A round of hurried conferences between Communist bloc leaders and by United States and other delegates were held before the afternoon General Assembly session.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter met with U.S. Ambassador James Wadsworth and his aides. Hungarian Foreign Minister Andre Sik conferred with Janos Kadar, the premier who betrayed the Hungarian Freedom Fighters in 1956.

UFO Reported in
Montague, Calif.,
Area in Evening

The third report of an unidentified flying object within the month reached the Mail Tribune news room today.

The report came from the Montague, Calif., area, where several residents during the past few days have reported seeing a silver, dome-shaped object.

About 7 p.m. each day for the past several days, some Montague residents have seen "the object" in the Bald mountain area, about seven miles northeast of Montague.

It rises slowly from the vicinity of the mountain, hovers and later disappears in about the same area, residents reported.

The object, according to witnesses, has red, green and white flashing lights, and usually is comparatively close to the ground.

Seen Three Nights

The object was seen by Mrs. Ardith Piper and her two sons, route 1, box 162B, Montague, Friday and Saturday evenings, and by Louis Rockwell and his family Sunday night.

Rockwell said the Sunday evening sighting was over the Yreka area, where the object hovered over a mountain in the vicinity, and disappeared in about the same location where it rose.

Last week, several residents of the Hills area reported sighting two unidentified flying objects. An unidentified flying object was reported in Medford that same evening, and previous to that, a Rogue River couple reported seeing an object in the Rogue River area.

Ashland—Total enrollment at Ashland's six public schools is 2,539. School District 5 superintendent's office reported today.

Appling Says Sweetland Wrong on Rule
Covering Eligible Oregon Voting Age

Salem—(UPI)—Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. said today that State Sen. Monroe Sweetland (D-Milwaukie) is wrong about persons whose 21st birthday falls on Nov. 9 being able to vote in the general election Nov. 8.

He added that "such people are prevented from voting, not by me, but by an Oregon law my opponent helped pass in 1957."

Appling, a Republican, and Sweetland, a Democrat, are candidates for secretary of state.

Political Deception

Appling declared that a letter Sweetland sent to county clerks last Friday advising them to accept the registrations "to accept general opinion" "slippery-tongued political deception."

"I assume that his (Sweetland's) present crocodile tears are cleverly designed to show

compassion for those born on Nov. 9, 1939, who are not now permitted to vote. The fact is that, as a member of the Oregon Legislature, he helped to pass the very law which bars them from voting," Appling said.

Appling also took issue with Sweetland concerning the opinion.

Only Personal Letter

"What my opponent brazenly represents as an official attorney general's opinion is in reality nothing more than a personal letter he solicited from one of the many assistants in the department of justice," Appling said. "Even this letter falls to support the irresponsible position from which he is attempting to bamboozle the county clerks and the voters for his personal political gain."

John J. Tyner Jr., an assistant attorney general, said he sent Sweetland the information

"in the form of a letter."

Appling said: "The letter does not state that a person reaching his 21st birthday on Nov. 9 can vote in the Nov. 8 election, as Sweetland would have the public believe. In its own words, it states that the attorney general 'has not had occasion to write an opinion on the question.'"

Rule Said Outlined

"Then, after what the letter describes as a 'rapid look' at case law in other states, it outlines a rule which is entirely consistent with that which we set out in our voter's manual many months ago," he added.

Appling challenged Sweetland to "try to explain to the voters the shocking discrepancy between his campaign statements concerning laws he says he would not enforce and the documented fact that he helped pass these very same laws."
