

### Organ Concert Presented By Young Musician Sunday

About 150 music lovers were on hand at First Presbyterian church Sunday afternoon to hear a program of organ music played by K. Douglas Cummings, student musician. The young man,

who has been substitute organist at the church this summer, returns to Oregon State college tomorrow to enroll for the fall term.

Following tradition, the young musician opened his program with two Bach numbers, competently played. Handel's "Suite for a Musical Clock," which followed, provided contrast for the solid Bach music. This Handel composition is highly descriptive with its light and airy "Voluntary on a Flight of Angels," the Sonata for bells and the quick "Gigue."

This listener enjoyed most of all young Cummings' playing of Cesar Franck's "Piece Heroique." The selection was unfamiliar to us, and we know not what the composer intended to convey, but we had the impression of a crisis passed and trouble overcome.

Olivier Messiaen's "Apparition de L'Eglise Eternelle" is expressive but harsh to the ears, and we enjoyed more the following number, Richard Purvis' "Communion."

The musician closed the program with the beautiful "Carillon de Westminster" by Louis Vierne.

Listening to this young man bring forth fine music, we pondered again over the question raised recently by a group of educators: why do so many students who are talented in music, art and drama instead choose science, business, law or medicine as a career, thus impoverishing the arts on which the nation's culture depends. This is a pertinent question here, for young Cummings is majoring in mathematics, and his music must therefore be a secondary interest.
