Officer Bumped From Crashed Plane 'Luckiest Man in World'

Honolulu (UPI)—Army Chief warrant officer Jack Jaeger, 39, Davenport, Iowa, said Monday night he was "the luckiest man in the world" when he was "bumped" at Guam from the World Airways plane that crashed killing 79 of its 95 passengers and crew members.

Medford Man Gets 30-Day Sentence

Police arrested Kenneth Ray Shaw, 21, of 381 Haven st., Medford, Sunday, and charged him with carrying a concealed weapon after a fight at the Rogue restaurant, 42 South Central ave.

Shaw pleaded guilty to the charge in district court Monday and was sentenced to 30 days in the county jail.

Police were summoned to the restaurant at 2:50 a.m. Sunday on a report of a fight. They were told that Shaw pulled a razor blade and a knife during an argument and had threatened to use them.

Shaw was not in the restaurant when police arrived the second time, and they picked him up a short time later at the corner of Third and First. He was first arrested on a charge of drunk in public.

Police searched him and found a razor blade-type box opener and then arrested him on the concealed weapon charge.

Another survivor, Edgar W. Schwyer, 27, navigator on the plane, said the take off was normal and he was not aware of anything wrong.

Schwyer, originally from Lyon Station, Pa., but who now makes his home in San Leandro, Calif., said when the plane crashed he tried to break a window with his fist and "it just opened."

"When I got out and looked at the cabin area, it was in flames," he said. "I had crawled out the window and fell on the ground. Someone else fell on top. I tried to pull a man out, but I could not. There were several violent explosions. I think it was the oxygen."

Racetrack Bet Winners Target Of Tax Officials

Washington (UPI)—Uncle Sam has decided to exercise his "partnership rights" with the horse players who win big on daily doubles and pool betting.

Since all gambling winnings are taxable income, the Internal Revenue Service is taking steps to get its share.

It has instructed racetracks throughout the country to report the names and addresses of winners of \$600 or more in daily double and other pool betting.

Officials particularly have their eye on some of the gaudy, new multiple-race pools in which \$2 bettors occasionally have a nered up to \$12,000.

To comply with the reporting requirement, race tracks legitimately can demand that winners produce satisfactory identification of their names and addresses. Officials did not say so, but there was the possibility that tracks would not pay off to bettors who refused to produce satisfactory identification.

The revenue service sent the word to its regional offices Aug. 26 in a supplement to the field agents' manual. The offices informed the tracks.

Probably Loses Millions - Officials could not say how many dollars annually, probably in the millions, the treasury loses in unreported gambling winnings.

A revenue service spokesman said the agency was interested mainly in the big winners in pool betting, especially if they are only occasional bettors.

Habitual horse players are likely to have as much in tax deductible losses as in taxable winnings, he said. In any case, he added, keeping records and names and addresses on all winners would be an impossible administrative burden.
