Northern Cities Pass Explosive Racial Period

New York — (UPI) — Northern cities generally have passed their most explosive period in integrating Negroes into white neighborhoods, a study financed by the Ford-financed Fund for the Republic shows.

The \$305,000 study, directed by the fund's commission on race and housing, was made by Chester Rapkin and William G. Grigsby, professors at the University of Pennsylvania's institute for urban studies.

Their findings were based mainly on a survey of attitudes toward race among home buyers in four Philadelphia neighborhoods. The study also drew on the work of scholars who have examined housing integration problems in other areas.

The report said the backlog of Negro demand for housing has been largely satisfied in northern cities because of a sharp drop in Negro migration from the south and the lowering of many housing barriers.

"Under these circumstances it is not likely that the transition period of the postwar decade will persist," the report said. "As potential purchasers observe mixed areas that have maintained this balance over a longer period of time, the anticipation of inundation will decline."

Not Disadvantaged
The survey concluded that many white persons will buy houses in mixed neighborhoods whether or not they object to Negro neighbors. Other points included:

- Negroes are not necessarily disadvantaged in mortgage negotiations, but may even receive better mortgage terms.
- Negroes are not necessarily compelled to pay more for housing than whites, but may pay less.

Missouri Senate Nominations Made

Jefferson City, Mo. — (UPI) — Lt. Gov. Edward V. Long Wednesday was nominated by the Missouri Democratic State committee for the U. S. Senate and Kansas City attorney Hilary A. Bush won the nomination for lieutenant governor.

Long defeated U. S. Rep. Charles Brown by a vote of 20 to 14 which later was made unanimous. Bush was the only candidate for lieutenant governor.

The senate seat was left vacant by the death Sept. 13 of Sen. Thomas C. Hennings Jr. Long had been a candidate for reelection as lieutenant governor.

Movie Folk See Clue to 'K' Plot

Hollywood — (UPI) — Movie folk nodded their heads knowingly Wednesday when photographers' cameras were searched for hidden guns before Premier Khrushchev's arrival at United Nations headquarters.

They'd seen it all in a 20-year-old movie.

Speculation ran high that the secret service search was motivated by a movie, "Foreign Correspondent," directed by Alfred Hitchcock and starring Joe McCrea, Laraine Day and George Sanders.

In the picture, produced by Walter Wanger, an assassin, posing as a new photographer, took a pot shot at a Dutch diplomat. He killed his man, but it turned out to be a double for the real Dutchman.

Heppner Paper Sold to Arizonians

Heppner — (UPI) — Sale of the Heppner Gazette-Times by Mr. and Mrs. Robert Penland to Mr. and Mrs. W. O. Wildman of Phoenix, Ariz., was announced today.

Penland said the Arizona couple would take over operation of the weekly newspaper Oct. 1.

Mr. and Mrs. Penland have owned the Gazette-Times since 1951. They came here from Lebanon where he was business manager of the Lebanon Express. Penland is a part president of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers association and the Oregon Ad-managers.

The Wildmans have been connected with daily and weekly newspapers in Arizona for several years.

The Penlands said they planned to reenter the newspaper business after a short vacation.
