Today Is First Day of Autumn

Washington (Science Service) — Regardless of when the leaves fall, the official fall began at 4 p.m. (PST) today.

The beginning of fall is an astronomical event, occurring at the moment the sun stands directly over the equator, on its apparent southward journey, began last June at summer solstice in the northern hemisphere. At the beginning of fall, the sun will stand directly over the equator at 163 degrees, seven minutes east, in the Pacific ocean northeast of the Solomon Islands. During this time of the year, the fall equinox in the northern hemisphere, day and night are of about equal length. Day and night are also equal at the beginning of spring.

\$100 Billion a Year for Food Predicted Before End of Decade

New York — (UPI) — Food for thought:

With disposable income expected to continue its steady rise the next 10 years, the public should spend in excess of \$100 billion a year for food before the end of this decade.

Factors that should promote continued growth of the food industry are the continued increase in population, improved standards of living throughout the world, increased popularity of convenience foods, and more and more emphasis on research and automation.

These are the findings of a special report published by Harris, Upham & Co., nationwide investment brokerage firm.

It also found that the food industry is going through a dramatic revolution as fast as the so-called convenience foods are concerned. Although the first canned food appeared 150 years ago, the report noted that it has been only in the past decade that sales of most other convenience foods have shown steady advances.

The growth rate of convenience items, according to the report, are: The "Instant" — coffee, tea and cocoa; ready-to-eat breakfast foods; prepared bakery mixes; seasoned corn and potato chips; instant puddings and desserts; condensed soups; and frozen foods.

This last group has experienced many ups and downs since they were pioneered more than 30 years by Clarence Birdseye. Harris, Upham noted that promotion by supermarket chains of their own brands, the limited store space available for product display, and drastic price cutting to meet competition from

private labels are typical problems confronted by the frozen food industry.

These problems cut the number of processors in the field by 25 per cent the last decade, and now more than 80 per cent of the industry's volume is accounted for by less than 100 firms.

The report said that the frozen food industry's trend currently is showing signs of starting upward at a rapid pace. And with the outlook for convenience foods quite impressive, the frozen variety should continue its rapid expansion.

Foreign Markets Produced

The brokerage firm also pointed out that many food companies are venturing into or are expanding existing facilities in the fast growing international markets where the greatest growth factor is the rapidly rising standards of living.

With more money in their pockets, people seek more nourishing and higher quality foods. Convenience foods also

are experiencing an increased demand abroad.

The food industry is spending more each year on research, automation, and modernization, and advertising expenditures are increasing as greater emphasis is being placed on brand names, the report said.

By 1963 the industry is expected to spend 44 per cent more on research than in 1959. Much basic research currently is being done in the

life sciences, such as genetics and enzymology, comparative new areas for the industry, and they should lead to valuable progress, according to the report.

It added that with the increasing population to consider, efforts also are being made to grow crops in more areas than now is possible, which should help cut the present high cost of storage and transportation.
