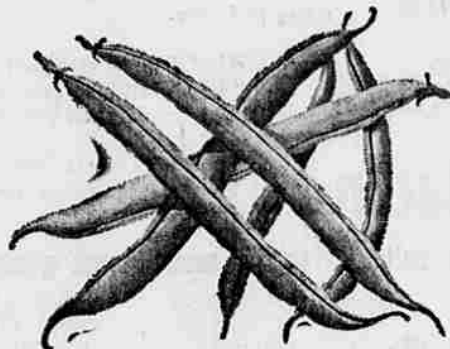

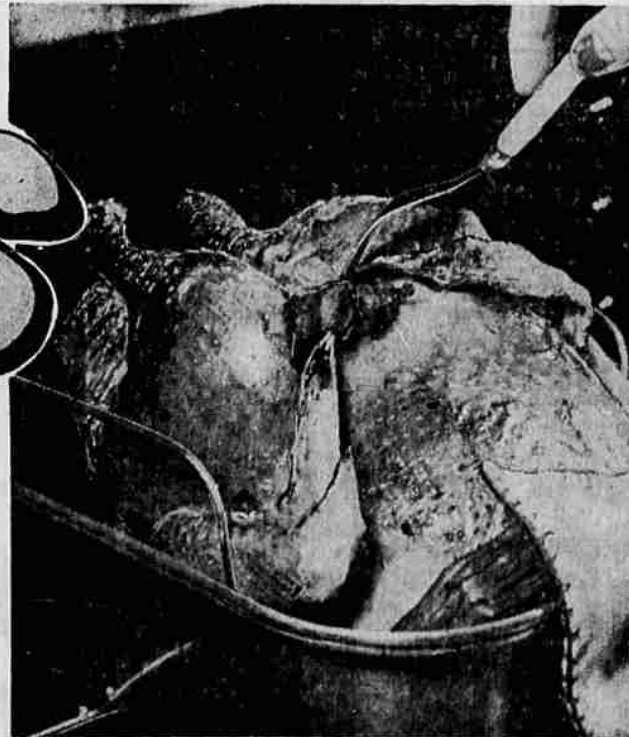

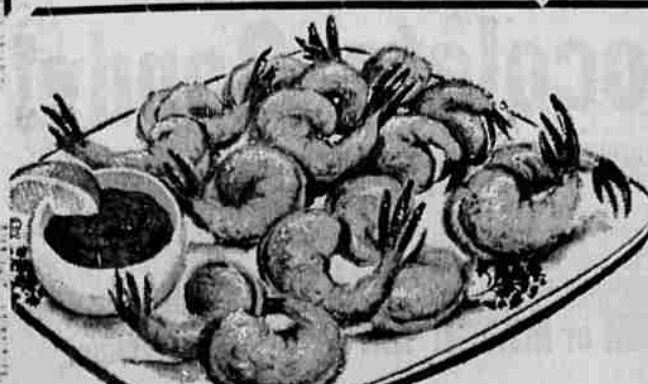

Price Cutting in Major Industries Seen Buying Key

Washington—(UPI)—Top government financial officials said today that price cuts in major industries would persuade consumers to loosen up on their pocketbooks and spend more.

A buying spurge, even a modest one, would pump new life into the economy. It would dispel some of the grey economic clouds that most economists say suggest the possibility of a recession.

The experts aren't predicting a recession. The most common view among them is that business has been going through "a rolling adjustment" at record levels of spending, production, income and employment.

The sticky question is whether the plateau quality of the last few months—the absence of expansion—has paved the way for a new upturn or is the prelude to a downturn.

Price cutting in key lines, top officials said, could entice consumers to step up and put their money on the counter. That would perk up businessmen's spirits and probably their orders and inventories, too.

The view that price reductions are in order and would have a healthy effect on business was expressed last January by President Eisenhower.

It has long been the view of such high government officials as Raymond J. Saulnier, the President's chief economic adviser, and William McChesney Martin, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, favored by officials.

Price cuts are favored by government officials for such basic lines as steel, autos and new houses. Lower prices on steel might have a chain reaction on costs and prices of other goods made with steel.

Officials believe that despite the recent leveling off, the business situation is basically sound and consumers generally are in good shape financially. Although virtually all officials deplore the level of unemployment—3.8 million in August—they think the sustained high level of personal income is more significant.

One government agency head who thinks price cuts would boost business described the introduction of compact cars as a form of price trimming. "The compacts were the salvation of the auto industry this year," he added.

This high official also suggested that home builders might evoke more interest in new houses—where demand is suspected to be weakish—by lowering prices.

In his economic report last January, the President said "price reductions warranted by especially rapid productivity gains must be a normal and frequent feature of our economy." White House aides explained that the President particularly had autos and steel in mind.

Child Killed in Battle Between Castro Factions

New York—(UPI)—A child too young to know anything about politics and ideologies died early today because she happened to be caught in the middle of a raging battle between followers and enemies of Cuban Premier Fidel Castro.

Nine-year-old Magdalena Urdaneta, shot in the back Wednesday when 14 pro-Castro demonstrators in a West Side bar and grill, died in St. Clare's Hospital at 8 a.m.

It was the first death resulting from demonstrations in connection with the United Nations General Assembly session.

Innocent Bystander
All night long doctors had fought to keep the little girl alive. She had been an innocent bystander in the El Prado restaurant riot Wednesday afternoon.

Police said the anti-Castro picketers came into the restaurant where the child and her parents, who came here a few days ago from Venezuela, were eating, to buy sandwiches for fellow demonstrators.

The pro-Castro forces, led by a man who wore a hood to replace his amputated right hand, entered and started to fight with the anti-Castro elements. The battlers used beer bottles, chairs and clubs.

At one point, someone drew a gun and fired several times, wounding the little girl and anti-Castroite Louis Rodriguez, 22, who said he came here from Miami to demonstrate against the Cuban revolutionary government.

Western Miners To Form Union

Oroville, Calif.—(UPI)—About 1,700 tunnel and rock workers in six western states will form a new union, it was announced here Wednesday.

Richard L. Andreoff, head of the new group, said that the workers will stop paying dues to the International Hod Carriers, Building and General Laborers Union after Oct. 20.

He said the newly formed union hopes to expand to the east soon. The tunnel and rock workers group will stay in the AFL-CIO.

Andreoff said the split was being made because tunnel workers felt their own craft had not been fairly represented by the parent union. But he said the splinter group hoped to remain on a friendly basis with the larger union.

More than 90 per cent of the 1,700 workers covered have already agreed to switch affiliation as of Oct. 20, he said.

The six western states included were Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, New Mexico and Arizona.

Finch Cellmate Called To Stand

Los Angeles—(UPI)—A former cellmate of Dr. R. Bernard Finch was called by the defense today to support the surgeon's claim that he believed his wife's slaying accidental.

John Richard Dubos was summoned as a witness at the second murder trial of Finch, 43, and Carole Tregoff, 23, after the prosecution charged the graying physician did not claim innocence when arrested.

Dubos, now serving a burglary term at a California honor farm, was in a Las Vegas jail cell when Finch was arrested at Carole's Las Vegas apartment July 19, 1959.

Grant B. Cooper, Finch's attorney, said that when the surgeon heard a broadcast of the gunshot death of his wife the night before, he turned to Dubos and said, "That's not the way it happened—it was an accident."

Cooper made the announcement that he had located Dubos Wednesday.

DEMOCRATIC SYSTEM

New York—(UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev boasted Wednesday "there is no more democratic system than ours." Asked how many votes he received in the last election, Khrushchev replied: "Ninety-nine point nine per cent."

Discipline Topic Of Bar Meeting

Gearhart, Ore.—(UPI)—The Oregon State Bar opened its 26th annual meeting today with plans to tighten up on discipline.

Herbert C. Hardy, chairman of the bar's disciplinary committee, planned to recommend that more disciplinary procedures be handled at the local level, rather than through the Board of Governors. He said this would shorten time for action on complaints which now require three or four months.

Another recommendation would bring immediate suspension of an attorney convicted of a felony or a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude, rather than allow him to practice law through all appeals procedures. Hardy said there was some feeling this violated constitutional rights of lawyers but "the constitutional rights of citizens comes ahead of the constitutional rights of lawyers."

The committee on standards and admissions has proposed that a law school student be required to have three years of college work toward a bachelor's degree instead of the current two years.
