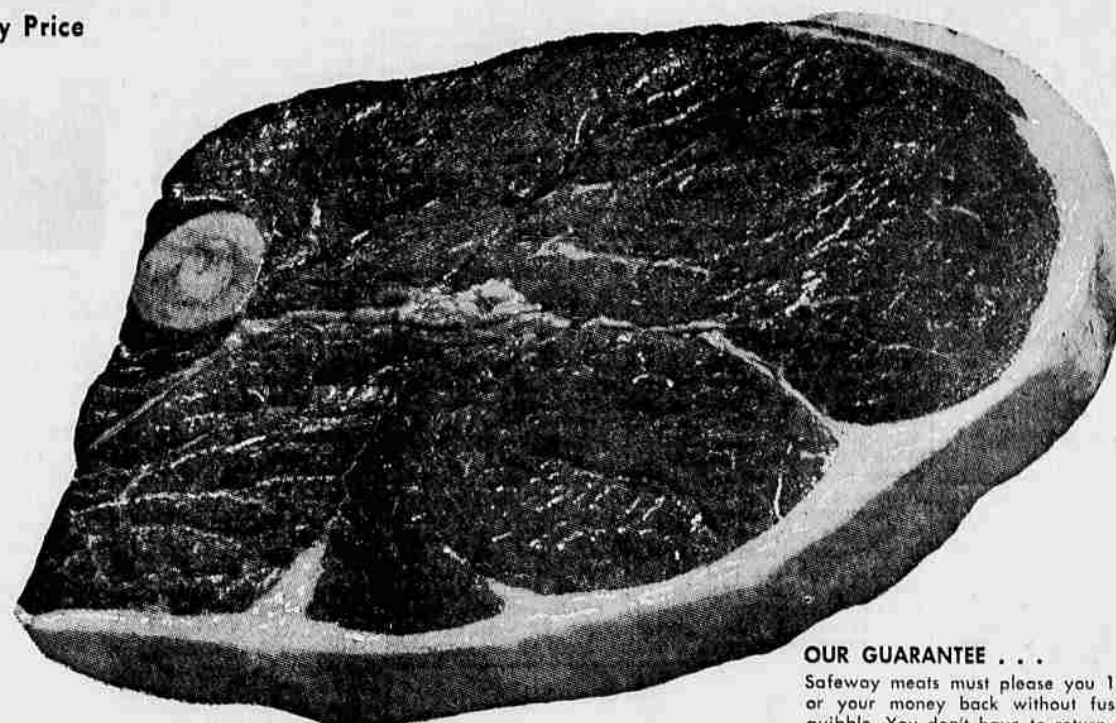

Is That Talking Bird Really Smart?

If you have been patient and a little experienced, your parakeet probably can talk.

At least it can repeat words and phrases, can even put words together in some order of semblance, and often in intelligent sequence.

The owner of the "talking bird," whether it be a parakeet, a parrot, myna or even a pet crow, will claim the bird is rational, articulate and has reasoned out the meaning of the words.

Only Rational Creature

The other and larger group of individuals maintain that man is the only rational creature on earth, and all the lower animals are non-rational. This group has the support of the psychologists who contend the bird is only a "copycat," an empty-headed "talker" that has no idea of what it says or what it means.

Some of these trained scientists go so far as to say that man also, is really an non-thinking animal; that anything he thinks he is doing is only a conditioned response to a particular stimulus. His efforts, or claim to thinking, being only the accumulation of heredity and environmental factors.

This is, of course, open to arguments, and is impossible to prove. Any of us can recall meeting people who evidently never think, or of observing birds that seem to know what they are talking about.

Anyone who has listened to the fluent or even the hesitant language of a trained parrot, or parakeet usually is intrigued by the bird's conversational response, especially if the bird comes up with the right answer to a question or for the very first time pulls off an expression no one ever heard it use before.

Serious students of bird-behavior have come up with some questionable conclusions. They say the bird that talks doesn't know what he is talking about; that it is only conditioned to respond in a specific way to a prescribed stimulus. By constant repetition a bird performs to a signal.

Voice or Other Sound

This signal may be a tone of voice, a word with a particular sound, or even some visual sign that triggers a particular response. The bird will say a certain thing in response to a certain signal. The bird's owner may not even know, or be conscious of the triggering effect that certain words or phrases have on his pet.

But the keener senses of the bird detects the signal, even though the cue word is buried in a welter of other words.

The devoted pet owner will

deny all the scientific facts, if they contradict what he sincerely believes. He will quote instances that seem to prove his pet can actually figure what to say, and knows what it means when he says it.

Looked at from several angles, I have arrived at about the same stage of conviction that was expressed by a pet parakeet, whose owner wanted me to "say something to the bird." The bird adequately expressed my own thought when he said, "I'm so confused."

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Machines Vying With Man's Brain Declared Possible

New York, N.Y. (Scientific American Feature)—Can machines listen, understand, and make decisions? The answer, according to Oliver G. Selfridge and Urie Neisser, respectively a mathematician at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a psychologist at Brandeis University, is "Yes." But before computers begin to compete with the human intellect, they add, the machines must somehow be fitted with facilities for perception.

"There is not much doubt that our computers can think," says Dr. Selfridge and Neisser. "But at present they are not well equipped to select from their environment the things or relations they are going to think about. In fact, they are sharply distinguished from intelligent living organisms. Every child learns to analyze speech into meaningful patterns long before he can prove any propositions."

Computers can find proofs, but they cannot understand the simplest spoken instructions. Except for their inability to recognize such patterns (either sounds or written marks) machines have now met most of the classic criteria of intelligence that skeptics have proposed. They can outperform their designers. The checker-playing program developed by Arthur L. Samuel at International Business Machines Corporation usually beats him. They are original.
