National Guard To Hold Meeting In City Saturday

An estimated 500 Oregon Army and Air National Guard officers and their wives are expected in Medford Saturday for the 33rd annual conference of the National Guard association of Oregon.

Hosting the off-duty conference is the Medford unit of the National Guard. Activities will take place at the Armory and will climax Saturday night with a dinner-dance for military personnel and their wives.

The conference will attract guest generals from California and Georgia in addition to officers representing nearly every National Guard unit in Oregon.

Addressing the conference will be Maj. Gen. Gilman C. Mudgett of the 6th Army, San Francisco, and Maj. Gen. Chester E. McCarthy, commander of the 3rd Air Force Reserve region at Robins Air Force Base, Georgia.

Col. Donald N. Anderson, Portland, secretary-treasurer of the association and chief of staff, 41st Infantry division, said the purpose of the group and the conference is to promote national security and better the National Guard in Oregon.

In charge of local arrangements is Capt. Donald M. Ivy, commanding officer of Company E, 2nd Battle group, 186th Infantry.

Other speakers will include Oregon Adjutant General Alfred E. Hintz and Warner Nunn, executive assistant to Gov. Mark Hatfield.

UO Fraternity House Damaged by Flames
Eugene—UPI—An explosion and fire caused an estimated \$5,000 damage to the Phi Kappa Psi fraternity house on the University of Oregon campus here early today.

Cause of the explosion was not immediately determined. There were no injuries. About 55 fraternity members were sleeping in the house at the time of the blast.

4,400 Children Hear Safety Talks in Area

Nearly 4,400 Jackson county students have heard safety talks this month given by the Medford city police and Jackson county sheriff's officers.

In their annual talks to the children in the nine Medford elementary public schools, the Medford city police spoke to 3,425 students in the first six grades.

The safety talks at St. Mary's school will be scheduled later.

The talks, which cover topics relating to safety of pedestrians and bicycling, included a new field this year, gun safety. The talk included the safe handling of BB, pellet, and shotguns and pistols.

'Go-Slow' Approach To Air Pollution Noted at Meeting

The first in a series of "get-acquainted" meetings on the problem of air pollution in the Rogue valley was held Thursday, with speakers advocating a "go-slow" approach to the problem.

Attending the meeting, held at the Rogue Valley Country club, were Medford city officials and representatives of the Medford Chamber of Commerce.

The meeting, called by the city council, was the first to be held following the release last spring of a state sanitary authority report which said that Medford has severe air pollution problems during certain periods of the year.

Medford City Manager Robert A. Duff said meetings will be held with all interested and affected groups in order to gather as many facts and obtain as many opinions as possible.

Mayor John W. Snider emphasized the go-slow approach when he said: "We don't want to do anything quickly that will hurt industry or any particular group."

The end result of all the meetings and study of the problem will be a Medford city ordinance that will attempt to prevent and control air pollution within the city limits.

Other agencies, such as the state and county, would be encouraged to work with the city in effectively curbing air pollution in the rest of the valley.

Main speaker at yesterday's meeting was State Sanitary Engineer Ted Gerow who explained some of the practical problems and more technical aspects of preparing an effective air pollution ordinance.

He said the pollution here is now more of a nuisance than a health hazard.

John Pletsch, representing the Chamber, said the Governmental Operations committee of that organization, recognizes that "an air pollution problem does exist and that some orderly procedure should be taken to attempt to improve the situation."

The committee has recommended, Pletsch said, that the county as well as the city make the necessary study because many of the industries are outside the city. He added that the respective planning commissions or local air pollution committee should make a further study setting up definite plans before further funds be spent for additional surveys.

Pletsch cautioned, however, that there is "just as much hazard of overly controlling air pollution as there is lack of control." Too much control, he said, can result in the elimination of industries already in the area due to the small margin of profit now being experienced by the various industries.

He said the committee also advocates the establishment of a 10-20 year development plan by both the city and county planning commissions that would include the problem of air pollution.

Duff said two of the major contributors to the local air pollution problems are "leaf burners" and industry, principally sawmills.

The contribution of leaf burners to the air pollution problem was also pointed out by Chamber President Jerry Latham. He said if a city ordinance should prohibit leaf-burning in the city then the city would have to find some other means of disposing of this waste.

Gerow told the group that one step that will have to be taken prior to preparation of an effective ordinance will be the determination of the "background value" particle fallout, which means, he said, the normal amount of particle fallout in the area. A ordinance, then, would prohibit fallout at a certain point above the normal fallout, he noted.

Gerow pointed out that it would take cooperation among the cities, county and state to effectively control air pollution in the valley. The state, he said, would assist mainly with technical help.

Gerow said that after the first of next year a second sanitary engineer, in addition to himself, will be assigned to the Medford office of the state sanitary authority and then his agency will be able to spend more time on the air pollution problem here.

Eisenhower Gets Noisy Farewell From New Yorkers

Chief Executive Returns To Capitol

New York—UPI—President Eisenhower, given a cheering farewell by 500,000 New Yorkers, flew back to Washington today shortly before Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev began his lengthy address to the United Nations.

The crowds were larger and noisier than those which turned out Thursday morning to greet Eisenhower when he arrived here to give his "state of the world" message to the General Assembly. The President was in high humor when he reached the airport and he chatted animatedly with newsmen, police, and the crew of the press plane before he took off in an Air Force jetliner.

Met Dignitaries
The President later landed at Andrews Air Force Base, near Washington. He immediately boarded an Army helicopter and flew to the south lawn of the White House.

During his 27-hour visit in New York, the President conferred with 24 foreign dignitaries, either at lunch or in private talks in the Waldorf-Astoria suite, but he did not meet Khrushchev for even as much as a nodding greeting. Eisenhower wound up his talks this morning by discussing African and Asian affairs with Togo President Sylvanus Olympio and Afghanistan Foreign Minister Prince Mohammed Naim.

Eisenhower met Thursday with leaders from Ghana, Lebanon and Nepal in addition to his first meeting with Yugoslav President Tito.

Prospect Man Hurt In Highway Mishap

Orville Arnold Knodel, 34, Prospect, a bureau of public roads employee, was struck and injured by a car on a road construction site two miles west of Cascade Gorge yesterday morning state police said today.

Knodel was reported in fair condition this morning by Rogue Valley hospital attendants while being treated for head injuries. The driver, Magid Seifnia, 23, of Southern Oregon college, was not charged, officers said.

Knodel apparently was talking to another worker on an access road with his back to approaching traffic on the highway section under construction when the accident occurred, state police said.

The Seifnia car started to skid on a slick surface, the driver lost control and it skidded part way across the access road and hit Knodel. The section under construction had been watered recently to settle the dust, state police said.

The injured man was taken to Rogue Valley hospital by Medford Ambulance Service.

Selections Made By Textbook Group

Jackson county textbook committees made two selections following meetings this week in the county school superintendent's office, according to Dee Cox, county school administrative assistant.

The textbook study committee for 10th grade social studies selected a 10th grade level world history book from 17 volumes submitted by publishers.

The sixth grade committee for social studies selected a history and geography text of Latin America from seven books submitted.

The state sets the criteria for text selection, which include such points as general appearance, binding, quality of paper, print size and reading level. The content is judged on whether or not it matches state course requirements.

Cox explained that it is difficult to find a text on South America at the elementary level which covers recent trends in that area, such as modern architecture, mechanized farming, modern education and medicine.

Committee members are teachers representing general course and class levels.

Winnemucca Troupe Stops in Medford; Four Join Caravan

Four valley residents this morning joined the "Sea to Winnemucca" caravan on its way to Winnemucca, Nev.

One of them, Medford Chamber of Commerce President Jerry Latham, was "kidnapped" by the Crescent City "Arabs" to join the "pilgrimage to Mueca."

The caravan, which left Crescent City yesterday morning, remained overnight in Medford and continued toward Klamath Falls this morning. It included two chartered buses, a flatbed truck and a tank truck full of sea water.

The caravan was organized by the Del Norte County Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with chambers along the way to focus attention on the "Winnemucca to the Sea" highway, which is now becoming a reality.

Police Find Boy 'Collecting' Rocks

Construction has already started, or is planned, on parts of the highways which eventually will make the "Winnemucca to the Sea" highway.

One project is construction of a tunnel through Oregon mountain in northern California and straightening of Highway 199 along the Smith river.

Work in this area includes construction along the forest road between Brownboro to Lake of the Woods. A considerable amount of work has been done in Lake county, and in Nevada.

Moon Shot Said Ready at Canaveral
Cape Canaveral—UPI—A 98-foot Atlas-Able rocket stood gleaming in spotlights early today, ready for an attempt to send a "Paddlewheel" space station orbit around the moon.

The federal space agency plans to launch the three-stage rocket between today and Tuesday.

This is the "ideal" launching period, when the problems of sending a payload over 240,000 miles of space are simplified slightly by a comparatively close approach of the moon to earth.

PREMIER WANTS UN MOVED FROM UNITED STATES

United Nations, N.Y.—UPI—Premier Nikita Khrushchev demanded today in an angry, arms-waving speech that U.N. Secretary-general Dag Hammarskjöld be fired and the United Nations be moved out of the United States.

The Soviet premier condemned American U2 spy flights as risking a third world war; offered a reshuffle of his immediate and total disarmament plans, and demanded that colonialism end, and all the persons of the world be freed.

Khrushchev was obviously angry at the Soviet defeat in The Congo and the action of the General Assembly which met in emergency session earlier this week and gave Hammarskjöld a 70-0 vote of confidence in a move that indirectly rebuked Russia military intervention in The Congo.

Khrushchev demanded that Hammarskjöld's post be abolished and that it be replaced by a Soviet-type presidium of three persons. This would give Russia a veto in the executive branch of the U.N. as well as in the Security Council.

Mood Changes
Khrushchev's mood changed throughout his speech which was so long and rambling that many spectators left the galleries.

His voice grew loud and indignant when he demanded the United Nations discuss the U2 incident. Once he departed from his text to extol the merits of communism. He waved his fists wildly and the East European and Cuban delegations thundered their applause.

Khrushchev denounced U.N. policies in The Congo. He followed President Kwame Nkrumah of Ghana in demanding the United Nations give its full support to Patrice Lumumba, the pro-Soviet premier who was deposed by a Congolese army strongman.

Appeals for Disarmament
Khrushchev renewed Russia's appeal for the destruction of all means of delivering nuclear weapons—planes, rockets and submarines—and outlined a peace program that would ban all foreign bases within 18 months.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter sat as silent today as the Russians did Thursday when President Eisenhower was speaking. Cuba's Fidel Castro sat glued to his earphones. The Russian satellite leaders listened attentively.

Much of his speech was devoted to attacks on colonialism in an obvious effort to woo the new African nations and to offset the effect of the Eisenhower speech Thursday outlining a massive economic aid program under U.N. supervision.

Western officials immediately described the Russian's speech as a major propaganda effort to stem the tide running against the Red bloc in the world organization.

Khrushchev railed at Hammarskjöld and he criticized the New York police department for the strict security regulations which have kept him "jailed" in his Park ave. headquarters. He also complained of State Department rules restricting him to Manhattan Island and the Russian estate on Long Island.

Wants U.N. Moved
In his attack on the U.N. location, Khrushchev said, "it would seem that the United States of America, which calls itself a free democratic country, should do its utmost to facilitate the work of the United Nations." Instead, he said, there are "inconveniences" which U.N. members now are experiencing.

Of all his proposals, the one which astounded diplomats was his proposal to abolish Hammarskjöld's job and set up a three-man presidium. This would involve rewriting the U.N. Charter.

Khrushchev has criticized Hammarskjöld's handling of the Congo crisis. He accused the forceful secretary-general of aiding such colonial powers as Belgium, and he condemned him for failing to give full support to Lumumba.

Khrushchev, in essence, laid down a three-point program of demands for the world parliament.

The Soviet premier derided President Eisenhower's remarks on disarmament and aid to Africa in which he found "nothing new."

"If Africa gets what the President offers, it would not be enough to supply breakfast to the Africans," Khrushchev said.

Portland Jobs Reach New Record
Portland—UPI—Employment in the Portland metropolitan area increased 8,200 to reach a new record of 338,200 in mid-August, employment officials said today.

Oregon Fair Commission Under Blistering Attack

Salem—UPI—A Portland advertising man today delivered a blistering attack on the Oregon Fair commission. He said it awarded the 1961 State Fair publicity contract to another man without considering other offers.

Flagrant Disregard
In a nine-page statement, George W. McMurphy charged the commission with "flagrant and arrogant disregard for fair and sound procedure."

Two weeks ago Jack Matlack, Portland, who handled publicity for this year's fair, was hired for the 1961 fair.

McMurphy said the commission did this while refusing to hear his offer. McMurphy's agency handled advertising for the 1952 state fair, and both advertising and publicity for the State Fairs in 1953, 1954, 1955 and 1956.

Attendance Said Less
McMurphy noted that the 1956 advertising and publicity budget was \$17,975, and that it was \$4,000 higher this year even though attendance was less than 1956. The eight-day fair attendance in 1956 was 315,370, he said, while this year it was 301,000 for nine days.
