Rudolph Fires 65 In Portland Open

Portland, Ore. (UPI)—Slight bespectacled Mason Rudolph set out today to protect a slender one-stroke lead in the \$27,500 Portland Open golf tournament.

The Clarksville, Tenn., shotmaker who finished fourth in this tournament last year came in Thursday with a sparkling 65, one stroke ahead of the year's top money-winner, Masters and U.S. Open champion Arnold Palmer.

Palmer, of Ligonier, Pa., had a workmanlike start on his campaign for the first place purse of \$2,800, which would push his 1960 earnings to a new record. He now has \$70,566 compared to Ted Kroll's 1956 figure of \$72,835.

Tied with Palmer in second place were Huston La Clair Jr., Birmingham, Ala., and long-hitting Paul Harney, Worcester, Mass.

Fifty-one golfers broke par on the first day on a course they regularly tear apart. The layout is in beautiful shape and seven of its 10 par-four holes are shorter than 400 yards.

Six 67s shot
Six players came in with five-under-par 67s—Howie Johnson, Coghill, Ill.; Jimmy Clark, Saticum, Calif.; Dick Chase, Verona, Pa.; Tony Lema, San Leandro, Calif.; Charles Sifford, Los Angeles; and Don January, Dallas, Tex. Billy Casper Jr., of Apple Valley, Calif., led six players in with 68s. As defending

Oregon State has lost to Iowa twice in previous games, once in the Rose Bowl. Oregon dropped a 14-0 decision to Michigan in 1948 in their only previous meeting.

Ernie Vossler, Midland, Tex., winner of last week's Carling Open in Tacoma, tied with 11 others at 69.

All-America Plan Told
Chicago (UPI)—The American Football Coaches association 1960 All-America football team, selected by more than 500 coaches in a nationwide poll, will be announced exclusively by United Press International on Nov. 23.

The following day, Thanks giving day, the team will be featured in a half-hour film to be released for national distribution.

Coach Rip Engle, of Penn State, president of the association, said that famed coaches from all major gridiron sections also will take part in the film.

"Our photographers are covering key games every Saturday for action highlights on leading All-Americans," Engle said. "We're also filming background footage on the campus and practice field to give the sports fans a real inside look at the best in college football."

Standouts appear to be Terry Maxson, Barry Peterson and Don Coltrane in the interior line. Bill Houston and Bob Walker at the ends and Ron Edmonds, Bob Methwin, Cliff Roberts, Steve Toews and Mike Barnes in the backfield.

Coach Perkins has a new assistant this year in Vern Craft, from Grants Pass, who is working with the backs. Coach Ed Doran again is the line coach.

The Bulldogs spent the first week on conditioning drills, the second week on defense and this week on offense and polishing the offense.

The head mentor said that he and his staff "expect a successful season with this year's fine group of athletes."

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Syracuse Heads Grid Promenade

College football fans, their appetites whetted by an early sampling last week, get a full serving Saturday when national champion Syracuse university leads almost all big-name teams into the first heavy week end of the 1960 season.

Pennsylvania, Clemson, Oklahoma and Wisconsin are among the conference champions appearing in their season inaugurals, while Notre Dame, Ohio State and Michigan State also are among the top schools favored to launch successful campaigns.

Friday's agenda is sparse, with the leading games being Buffalo at VMI, Denver at Washington State, San Jose at Brigham Young and Mississippi Southern vs. Hardin-Simmons at Mobile, Ala.

Just a Breather
Syracuse, capping an undefeated 1959 season with a Cotton Bowl victory over Texas, is a five-touchdown favorite over Boston University.

The Orange have 23 returning lettermen to close the ranks of three graduating linemen and backfield star Ger Schwedes.

The Terriers of Boston U. lost, 20-0 to Penn State in their opener last week.

Penn gained the Ivy league title last season with Steve Sebo at the helm. The change-over to new coach John Stiegman's single wing formation may be strange at first, but Penn should have no trouble in making Lafayette its first victim.

Clemson, a 23-7 winner over Texas Christian in the Blue Bonnet Bowl, takes on Atlantic Coast Conference foe Wake Forest. The Tigers lost seven starters and will run into the strong passing arm of Norman Snead.

Aiming for 13th
Bud Wilkinson's Oklahoma Sooners, aiming for their 13th straight Big Eight crown, travel to Northwestern for an interconference contest with half of last year's 22 starters missing. Wilkinson will be counting heavily on halfback Mike McClellan for a victory over the Wildcats.

Wisconsin, humbled in the Rose Bowl, takes on another West Coast foe, Stanford, in its first game. The Big Ten kings have only two starters from the 1959 squad, Henry Darlath and Ron Perkins.

Notre Dame has been installed as an 18-point favorite to beat California, despite the 18 men who traded mole skins for sheepskins. Joe Kuharich is looking for a quarterback to replace George Izo and an outstanding flankman to take the place of end Monte Stickles.

Ohio State and Michigan State face Southern Methodist and Pittsburgh in two other outstanding clashes featuring Big Ten teams.

Coaches Asked Not To Abuse Substitute Rule

University Park, Pa. (UPI)—On the eve of the first full week end of the collegiate football season, Penn State's Rip Engle warned the nation's coaches today not to abuse the new wild card substitution rule.

Engle, the president of the American Football Coaches association, said that nothing would kill the rule faster than establishment of messenger systems for sending plays into the game.

The new rule permits one man to be substituted between plays at any time.

The intent of the rule, Engle said, "is not for messenger systems. It was devised to get specialists in the game."

"College coaches who use the messenger system will eliminate the rule," Engle said, "and that would put them right back where they were before we adopted it."

Miss Wright, Louise Suggs of Sea Island, Ga., and Betsy Rawls of Spartanburg, S.C., will be battling for the LPGA title.

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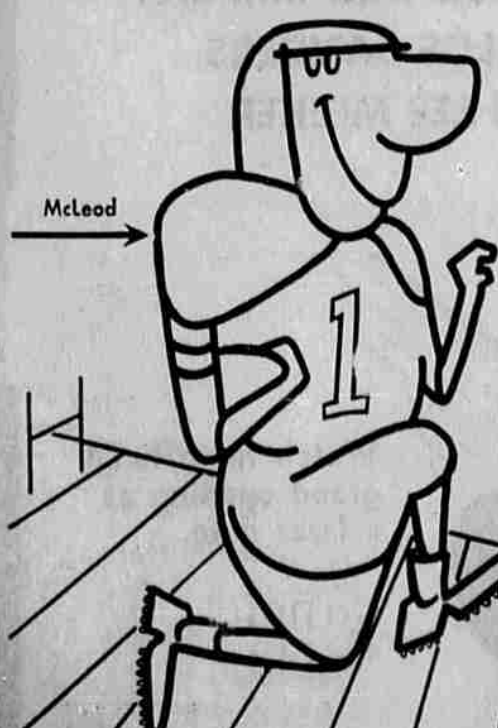
