

Red Raiders Oppose Chico At Ashland Saturday Night

Ashland - "Your going to see a different team from the one last week," exclaimed Southern Oregon college football coach Al Akins in reference to the game against Chico State tomorrow at 8 p.m. on Fuller field here.

"We have been whipping the team into shape all week and even added an extra session Wednesday night," added the SOC mentor. However, the Raiders will not be in top shape so far as having all personnel ready for the game is concerned.

Gordy Carrigan is a doubtful and will probably see action at the quarterback slot only if the need arises. Dave Hughes will fill the split end for the ailing Carrigan.

Howard Hartman appears to be ready but no decision will be advanced before game time. Eldon Francis is definitely sidelined.

Changes have been made throughout the week in the defensive and offensive units, but the main one was in the offensive line. Ashland frosh George Moses has been shifted to right tackle in an exchange with Neil Green. The 240 pound Green will take over the center slot.

Speedster Del Brood has been giving Kerm Bennett a big battle for the slotback vacated by Francis' injury. Bennett may get the call while Brood will handle the punt returns, his specialty.

Doyle Branson will handle the other slotback and fullback Al Barnes with quarterback John Buck will fill out the backfield.

In the event Hartman is not ready, Ron (Duke) Ellington or Harold Haugen will start at the right split-end. Ellington is the .09.5 century sprinter while Haugen is the frosh from Bend who has been showing well.

Hanover's Bullet Cops Pacer Race

Delaware, Ohio - (UPI) - It was on to Lexington, Ky., and its famed Big Red Mile today for Bullet Hanover, Countess Adios and Muncy Hanover for what could be one of the greatest pacer races of all time when they meet next week.

Bullet Hanover, of the Hanover Farms in Pennsylvania, posted his name among the all-time great harness horses with a record setting victory in the Little Brown Jug here Thursday.

His victory set the stage for a showdown with Countess Adios for 3-year-old pacers.

Not Eligible
Ironically, the veteran trainer, Del Miller failed to keep Countess Adios eligible for the Jug and no filly has ever won the Grand Circuit classic. She gained a measure of distinction by setting a handful of world records here Monday, running the mile in 1:59.1-5.

The Bullet and Muncy shattered those records in the Jug, with The Bullet, after breaking his stride in the first heat, coming back to win two exciting heats and the Jug. Both went the mile on the half-mile track in 1:58.3-5, a world record for age and gait.

There are a few hunters somewhat upset by the fact that they are no longer permitted to drive into the gravel pit off Agate road for the purpose of sighting in their rifles for the coming deer hunting season. This has been a yearly custom for quite some time and they can see no outstanding reason why they should be denied the right to do so as custom has permitted for many years.

AGE OF THE SLOB
What these hunters have not noticed is that there has been an increase of slob-types the past few years to the point that they are spoiling many things for the sportsmen of the area. These people, using the term loosely, are the garbage dumpers, bird poachers, vandals and thieves that are in the minority but who constitute a danger because most of the decent people think what they do is the business of the police. The slobs are the reason why the gravel pit is closed to cars.

THE WHYS
The slobs are those who park their cars so that others cannot get into the pit. Slobs shoot at bottles, signs put up for safety, and any animal or bird within range. In order for the public to enjoy lasting use of the area it must be managed with this in mind. To open a gate for the benefit of the few who wish to drive to within a few feet of where they wish to shoot and at the same time allow the slobs easy ingress for their activities is not good management. The pit is open for use by those who are willing to walk less than 100 yards.

I've said it before and will say it again: The game law violator is a thief who is

THE OPTIMIST'S CORNER

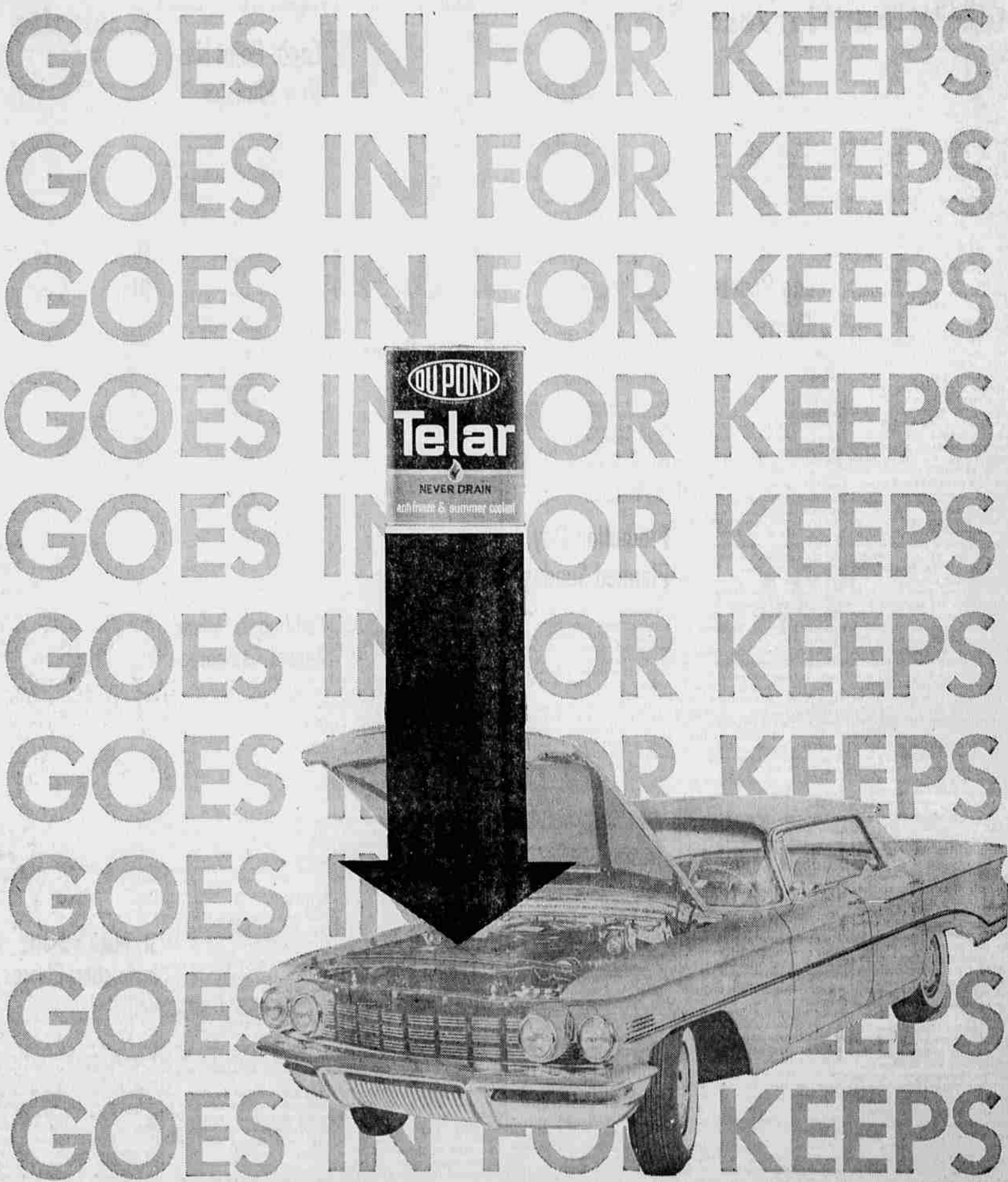
