

# Tablets

Barn owls and some species of hawk feed on young rattlesnakes and field mice. Since most of these have been killed by careless, indifferent hunters, there is a surplus of rattlers and field mice.

Talking about rattlesnakes, the folks coming from the Midwest or South can tell you some snake stories that will put your hair on end. Ren Byrum, one time our neighbor, raised in North Carolina, told us that one day while plowing in the field a large hoop snake started after him, and was rolling so fast he threw the lines down and jumped behind a tree.

The snake made his rolling shot, driving the spike in the end of his tail deep into the hickory tree. The deadly poison caused the leaves to dry up and fall off in 15 minutes, according to Byrum. The team didn't take any chances, but kept going.
