Northwest States Due \$2,549,623.28 In BLM Payments

Portland - Four Pacific Northwest states and Alaska will receive \$2,549,623.28 as their shares of the \$19,742,378.10 which Secretary of Interior Fred A. Seaton announced is being distributed to 26 states as their portions of resource receipts from Federal lands. United States treasury checks are being presented by bureau of land management officials to the states as their shares in the resource development earnings.

These states will receive \$2,339,595.63 from mineral lease revenues received during the six-month period ended June 30, and \$209,966.47 from grazing leases, timber sales (other than OAC timber sales) and other resource sales during the 1960 fiscal year. Oregon, Washington, Montana, Idaho and Alaska previously had received \$2,310,136 in mineral payments for the first six months of the 1960 fiscal year and Oregon counties had received \$15,356,578 from OAC timber sales. The mineral payments represent 37 1/2 per cent of total receipts for the period, except for Alaska which now receives 80 per cent of the mineral leasing revenues under terms of a 1957 law. The revenues come from leases covering oil, gas, oil shale, potash, sodium, sulphur, coal and phosphate. Total payments from mineral leases for last fiscal year were \$34,863,961, while in the states' shares of land revenues from other sources were \$782,100.

Alaska Gets Most - Alaska was the greatest beneficiary among Northwest states in the current payments, receiving \$1,338,882.07, including \$1,366,404.39 from mineral leases and \$24,477.68 from other sources. Montana will receive \$941,364.71, with \$894,813.45 from mineral leases and \$46,551.26 from other sources. Oregon's current payments are \$119,592.05, with \$45,107.63 from minerals and \$74,384.42 from other sources. Idaho receives \$79,125.02, with \$33,150.16 from minerals and \$45,974.86 from other sources. Washington receives \$18,618.43 from grazing leases, land and timber sales and \$30 from mineral leases. Wyoming receives \$6,876,782.82, the most of any of the 26 states sharing in the fund. New Mexico was in second place with \$4,694,223.10. Other states receiving more than \$1,000,000 are Colorado, with \$1,842,476.11; Utah, \$1,714,093; and California, \$1,514,120.04.

New Plan Announced by State Welfare Group

A new five-step plan for monthly allocations of general assistance funds for county public welfare commissions was established by the state public welfare commission at its August meeting. The county court has been notified.

Average case costs will be established monthly on a statewide basis. Each county welfare administrator will be required to submit to the state welfare commission estimated general assistance caseload figures prior to the next month's allocation, and the 15th of the preceding month, the commission said.

A preliminary allocation will be made for each county based on a multiplication of the estimated caseload by average case costs established for the county.

So county public welfare commissions will remain within the approved budget, they will be allowed to vary the range of food standards figured in allocations from 100 per cent to a minimum of 85 per cent for resident general assistance cases, and 65 per cent to 85 per cent for state non-resident general assistance cases, the commission said.

An effect general assistance allocation will be made automatically to offset any general assistance funds expended for funeral costs.

Minimum Diet - James Pullman, Jackson county public welfare administrator, explained that a minimum adequate diet and the costs of food to supply that diet are estimated each year for such case classifications as aid to dependent children and aid to dependents. Food allowances under the new system will be figured from 85 to 100 per cent of that minimum for resident GA cases, and 65 per cent to 85 per cent for non-residents.

Pullman said he has already written the state commission protesting this new order. This is like a former plan in which the state commission allowed a set amount for food for general assistance cases based on the monthly estimate of caseload, he said. Those people who came in the door first were the best off, he added. However, the 85 per cent minimum does set a safeguard, he said.

"General assistance case loads vary greatly. People may need assistance for a day or a few months," the public welfare administrator said. "It's much better to consider the needs of each case. This is too mathematical."

A resident GA case is defined as a family which has lived in Oregon for at least three years.

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Former Secretary James F. Byrnes To Vote for Nixon

Columbia, S.C. - (AP) - Former Secretary of State James F. Byrnes, "assistant president" under Democrat Franklin D. Roosevelt, has announced he will vote for Republican Richard M. Nixon for president in November.

Byrnes said he was contacted by many citizens and from representatives of the South Carolina Democrats for his vote in the approaching election, he said.

"My answer is that I shall vote for Richard M. Nixon and Henry Cabot Lodge," Byrnes said in a statement.

A Democrat throughout his half century political career, which ended a four year term as governor of South Carolina in 1954, the announcement marked the second time Byrnes has supported a Republican presidential candidate.

He backed the independent "South Carolinians for Eisenhower" in 1952 and introduced Eisenhower when he spoke from the South Carolina capitol steps during that campaign. There has been speculation that Byrnes will introduce Nixon when he speaks here.

Dangerous Program - In 1956, Byrnes supported the South Carolina independent electors pledged to Sen. Harry Byrd of Virginia.

"If in the Democratic platform there was no mention of civil rights, I still would regard it as the most dangerous program ever adopted by a political party," Byrnes said. "It constitutes a threat to our system of free enterprise and a threat to what is left of local government."

Wreck Survivor Returns To School - Seattle - (AP) - Barbara Jean Hill, 21, whose trip to the Rose Bowl was marred by a tragic auto accident near Eugene, Ore., last December, returns to her classes at the University of Washington next Monday.

She was the lone survivor of an accident last Dec. 20 in which four of her friends were killed. The accident occurred when their station wagon and a tank truck collided.

Barbara Jean, who was hospitalized for nearly nine months after the accident, said she hoped to pick up the "strings of my life."

"I can hardly wait to get back to everything," she said. She is a senior in zoology.

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
