### Excellent Food Buys Available for Shopper

(The following guide to the nation's plentiful food buys for the week ending Sept. 24 prepared for United Press International by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Interior.)

Washington - (UP) - Thrifty food shoppers will still be able to find some excellent values at their favorite markets this week end.

These will include many of their favorite red meats, such as budget-priced cuts of beef, pork, and lamb. In the poultry line, turkeys and broiler-fryers continue in plentiful supply as price tags remain favorable.

Medium-size eggs are plentiful right now, and continue excellent buys. Cheese and many dairy products also are favorably-priced.

Vegetable bins still offer a fairly wide assortment of popular items. These include cabbage, cauliflower, corn, cucumbers, lettuce and celery, also onions, green peppers, potatoes and sweet potatoes. Also snap beans, greens, carrots, eggplant, tomatoes and squash.

As for fresh fruits, grapes and pears are plentiful this week end; so are California oranges, watermelons, limes, cranberries and avocados. This year's fairly large apple crop is arriving in increasing supply at most markets, and prices are becoming more favorable. Some markets also are offering excellent supplies of bananas.

Housewives can still find such popular fish items as fresh and frozen shrimp, scallops, and canned tuna at their favorite markets.

Here is a detailed report on plentiful foods in this particular area:

West - Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming: Consumers will find slightly lower prices this week on some beef cuts and fryer chickens. Beef supplies are moderate to ample, and a number of cuts are 1 to 2 cents a pound lower. In the Northwest and San Francisco areas, fresh pork loins are 2 to 3 cents a pound higher, but smoked hams are down 1 to 2 cents a pound.

In the Los Angeles area, pork supplies are liberal, and fresh loins and spareribs are down 1 to 3 cents a pound. Lamb, calf and veal are in
