Marine Board Check Received by County

County Judge Earl Miller noted Wednesday that the state marine board has sent \$4,257 as a second payment for the county's share of boat registration and license fees. The county received its first payment last spring, about \$3,000, Miller said.

The state marine board also asked the county court to write explaining what it did with the money. This is possibly a preliminary step toward new legislation requiring all counties to earmark the funds for enforcement of state boating regulations or water recreation facilities.

The current law which created the state marine board and set the boating regulations merely suggests such a use for funds.
