Newberry To Open Second Store Here

Plans to construct a large J. J. Newberry department store at the Medford Shopping Center were announced this week. The store will cost an estimated \$500,000.

Harley M. Williams, manager of the downtown Newberry's store, said groundbreaking ceremonies are planned for Thursday at 10 a.m. The store is scheduled for completion by June 1, 1961, he said.

Williams said the new store will be about "three times as big" as the downtown store and will handle high-priced merchandise, such as furniture, clothing and appliances. The downtown store will continue to do business making Newberry's the first retail mercantile company to have two Medford outlets.

600 Parking Spaces

The building will be located just north of the shopping center restaurant and will center on a 30 foot mall. Plans are to add an additional 600 parking spaces to the existing parking facilities at the center.

The Medford Shopping center will build the structure and lease it to the J. J. Newberry company. Williams said it will conform to the architectural style of the existing buildings.

The structure will have two floors and will be 175 by 200

Nikita's Speech Backfires; U.S. Rallies Africans

United Nations, N.Y. — (UPI) — The United States moved quickly Saturday to rally African support against Premier Nikita Khrushchev whose "declaration of war" on the United Nations Friday appeared to have boomeranged against him in the nations whose support he sought.

Secretary of State Christian A. Herter conferred with the French and British envoys here and then invited 13

new African states and Cyprus to a lunch today at the Waldorf-Astoria to pledge American support to their newly-found independence.

While the western powers held strategy talks on answering the Khrushchev speech they felt had reacted adversely against Russia in the cold war struggle for the uncommitted nations, Communist and neutralist leaders carried out a swirl of diplomatic activity of their own.

Tito, Nasser Meet

Premier Nikita Khrushchev sped through heavy weekend New York traffic to the Russian country estate at Glen Cove, Long Island, with the Red leaders of Czechoslovakia, Romania, Bulgaria, Byelorussia and the Ukraine.

President Tito of Yugoslavia, who hopes to organize a neutral nation "third force" to counter western and eastern leadership in world affairs, conferred at length yesterday with neutralist President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic.

Neither Nasser nor Tito would disclose what they talked about but when reporters asked them after the one-hour meeting if they had discussed formation of a neutralist bloc Tito replied, "Oh, no, no, no."

Nasser himself was seeing all factors—Prime Minister Saeb Salam of Lebanon, Tito, leftist President Kwame Nkrumah of Ghana and Khrushchev. He sees President Eisenhower on Monday.

Nehru Arrives Today

The neutralist nations receive a boost today when Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru arrives in New York. Also arriving tomorrow is British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan who is expected to give the western answer to Khrushchev in the UN Assembly.

Nehru meets Eisenhower Monday afternoon.

The United States and its French and British allies were convinced that Khrushchev had overplayed his hand in his blistering two-hour and 19 minute speech in which he attacked UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld and demanded that his post be abolished in favor of a three-man Communist-style presidency.

Latin American nations also expressed displeasure at Khrushchev's antics with the flamboyant Fidel Castro of Cuba.

Western officials said if their assessment was right it would mean a loss of sympathy for the Soviet Union among the very Asian and African nations the speech was supposed to impress.

The mistake, they said, was in the attack on Hammarskjöld.

Hammarskjöld is considered popular among the Asians and Africans because of his stern stand against Britain, France and Israel during the 1956 Suez invasion. Delegates believed there was little chance the Khrushchev proposal to abolish his post would carry.

The afternoon flag raising ceremony was held around the time that the bearded Cuban premier rose from his bed after a wee-hours party. Castro had breakfast in his room and then went back to sleep. He had no plans to leave the hotel.

The flag-raising ceremonies came after one of Castro's aides told the management of the Hotel Theresa he wanted to run up the Cuban flag on one of two poles outside the hotel.

Moscow—(UPI) — Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian Zorin has replaced Arkady Sobolev as the Soviet Union's permanent representative at the United Nations and in the UN Security Council, Tass announced Saturday.

Rocky Disagrees With Nixon Over Kennedy Talks

Republican Governor Speaks in Michigan

Detroit — (UPI) — New York's Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller disagreed Saturday with Vice President Richard M. Nixon's criticism of his Democratic rival John F. Kennedy, for talking of a slump in national strength while Communist leaders are in this country for the United Nations General Assembly.

Rockefeller, campaigning across Michigan for the Republican ticket headed by Nixon, told a news conference at Pontiac, in reply to a question about the Nixon criticism, that:

"I believe that all the issues should be discussed openly in the campaign. This is where the strength of this country lies."

He added that "it is good for the leaders of totalitarianism to see that we are not afraid to discuss the issues whatever they may be and that we are not prohibited from doing so."

Rockefeller gave a similar answer at Battle Creek when asked earlier in the day about Nixon criticisms of Kennedy for talking about a slump in national prestige and power while Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and other top Communist leaders are in New York for the UN meeting.

He said such discussion was "good evidence of Democracy" at work and that he was not concerned about it.

Rockefeller spent the whole day campaigning in Michigan telling Negro and labor voters, who have helped elect a Democratic governor here for six straight terms, that they have more to gain in prosperity and civil rights by voting for the Republicans this year.

Rockefeller wound up a full day of campaigning for the state and national Republican tickets by speaking at a "nationalities rally" in Detroit's civic center last night.

was a passenger in the car driven by Daniel R. Brooks, Jr., 19, also of Grants Pass. Brooks suffered shock.

Separate one-car accidents Friday morning claimed the lives of Robert M. Sienko, 21, Astoria, and William W. Eaton, 37, Corvallis.

Sienko died in a one-car accident near Astoria and Eaton died when his truck hit a tree near Corvallis.

John L. James, 28, Veneta, and Orville Wendell Holmes, 24, Elmira, were killed near Eugene Friday afternoon when their station wagon was struck by a panel truck. Arthur R. Stein, 48, Eugene, driver of the panel truck, was booked on a charge of negligent homicide and failure to stop at the scene of an accident involving a death.

Reverend Maurice E. McMahon, 47, was killed late Thursday night in a two-car collision in Portland.

7 Dead in Oregon Traffic Accidents

At least seven persons have been killed in Oregon traffic accidents since late Thursday night.

Two one-car accidents near Roseburg Saturday claimed the lives of two persons. Four Oregonians were killed in Friday mishaps and a Catholic priest died in a two-car accident Thursday night.

State police in Roseburg identified the two Saturday victims as Delvis Reese Batiste, 21, Riddle, and Margaret L. Leffler, Grants Pass.

Batiste was killed when his southbound car failed to negotiate a curve on U. S. Highway 99 business route and sideswiped a steel bridge on the South Umpqua river about 11 miles south of Roseburg. Three occupants of the car escaped serious injury.

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7,959 Students Enrolled In Medford Schools

A total of 7,959 students were registered in Medford public schools Sept. 20, the first permanent enrollments this school year, school district officials have announced.

The total is 127 more than the number of students enrolled on the first day of school Sept. 12. Last year, a total of 7,721 students were registered on the first permanent enrollment date.

There are 1,507 enrolled in Medford High school, an increase of six students over last year. In the two junior high schools, a total of 2,049 are enrolled, 167 more than last year.

In the district's 14 elementary schools, there are 4,403 students this year, compared to 4,309 last year at the first permanent enrollment.

One of Largest

McLoughlin Junior high with 1,150 students is one of the largest junior high schools in the state, school officials noted.

The first permanent enrollment figures by school:

Griffin Creek, 256; Hoover, 329; Howard, 294; Jackson, 470; Jacksonville, 243; Jefferson, 395; Lincoln, 287; Lone Pine, 210; Oak Grove, 266; Roosevelt, 531; Ruch, 98; Washington, 604; West Side, 115; Wilson, 355; McLoughlin Junior High, 1,150; Hedrick Junior High, 899; and Medford High school, 1,507.

"Now imagine we come to an agreement on disarmament," he went on, gesturing rapidly while Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko stood in the doorway behind him, "and then we embark on the creation of international armed forces. The question will arise, who is to command the forces."

"Any international forces if created now will be governed by Hammarskjöld, and what will happen then we see from experience of The Congo," Khrushchev said.

He insisted he had no complaint against U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld personally, but he said Hammarskjöld "sympathizes with the United States and in actual fact he represents those countries headed by the United States."

He proposed that there be three Secretary - Generals, representing the capitalist, socialist and neutral blocs.

Khrushchev said that he would not object to the United States naming Hammarskjöld as one of the three Secretary-Generals if the other two posts were held by representatives of the Communist and neutral blocs.

"If we solve this question, then we will be able to solve the disarmament question," Khrushchev said.

He explained that when a disarmament agreement is reached any "international armed forces under the command of the U.N." would be under the command of Hammarskjöld. He charged that Hammarskjöld represents "the most imperialistic and capitalist countries."

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Russian Premier Accuses Critics of Distorting Truth

Seeks Three-Man Committee Rule

Glen Cove, N.Y. — (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev last night threatened to block world disarmament unless the West yields to his demand that UN Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld be replaced by a three-member committee.

Khrushchev said he had no objection to Hammarskjöld representing the capitalist countries on the committee if the other two posts were held by Communist and neutral bloc representatives.

The alternative to committee rule at the United Nations, he indicated, would be a continuation of the arms race.

Khrushchev delivered his reply to sharp American and British reaction over his U.N. speech Friday in a 45-minute twilight news conference in front of the gray stone Long Island mansion where he arrived earlier from Manhattan. Wants to Clarify Point

He told reporters that he wanted to "clarify" one point in his speech that U.S. Secretary of State Christian Herter said was a declaration of war on the U.N.

Khrushchev said his western critics were "distorting the truth" and he added: "I would like to ask you to be accurate."

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
