

Ashlanders Spill Klamath Pelicans

Ashland — Ashland's High school's Grizzlies are challenging to be reckoned with in Southern Oregon conference football.

They served that notice Friday night. The unrated Grizzlies battered to a 20 to 12 upset win over the Klamath Falls Pelicans, who were ranked third in the state among Class A-1 schools. It was the only conference game played so far in the southern Oregon high school circuit.

Ashland went to a touch-down off the opening kick-off and led through the rest of the evening, as quarterback Jim Doster mixed the running of Bob Voris, Forrest Farmer and Ron Scholander with a few timely passing plays. It was 7 to 6 at the quarter, 13 to 6 at halftime and 13 to 12 after three periods of play.

The Lithia city team put over its insurance touchdown on the first play of the final stanza.

71-Yard Drive
For the opening score Ashland marched 71 yards from its own 29-yard line and Scholander slashed the last four yards to score. Farmer ran over the bonus. Klamath came right back after the kick-off and drove 69 yards to the goal. Kent Hunsaker passed to Dave Stippich for the final 11 yards. Gary Hancock's conversion kick was blocked.

The Ashlanders then continued the touchdown parade with a 79-yard sally and Scholander going over from three yards out.

The rest of the eleven leading the Journal coaches' poll, headed by defending state champion Medford, continued to win through a couple of them had close calls. Medford breezed by Red Bluff, Calif., 46-0.

South Eugene served notice it intends to move up from its No. 7 spot by rolling over Cottage Grove 40-7. Benson, No. 8, met Wilson of Portland in a Saturday game.

In other leading games 11th-ranked Roseburg walloped North Eugene 27-7, while 12th-ranked Pendleton lost to The Dalles 20-6. David Douglas, No. 13, poured it on Clackamas 50-18, and 14th-ranked Astoria won over Centennial 20-7.

The Pirate defense stood firm against a third quarter IV threat. Don Johnson of the Cougars packed the second half kick-off to the Phoenix 13 before Consruck overhauled him. Phoenix took possession on its 17 and drove its fifth score. Dave Johnson went the last 13 yards on a reverse. A reverse clicked again in the fourth quarter for

Phoenix's Johnson and he went 53 yards to the pay zone. Bob Jacobs threw a final block to open the way.

Consruck carried the ball 17 times for 154 yards, Moore 14 for 95 and Dave Johnson three for 83. Don Johnson was the IV workhorse.

Gerald Sloper, as blocking back, cleared the way for Pirate TDs and was a power on defense. Gay, John Kerns, Rick Richey, Dave Johnson and Jacobs up front and Monty Combs, Colfax and Consruck in the secondary joined Sloper's defensive effort. Pirate reserves played most of the second half.

Portland — The state game commission ordered the closure of all fishing in a triangular section of the Pacific Ocean north of the north jetty at the mouth of the Rogue River Friday.

Commission director Phil Schneider said the action was an emergency measure to protect a heavy concentration of salmon and steelhead destined for the Rogue river system.

Schneider said that jetty construction at the mouth of the Rogue has caused an unnatural block and delay to upstream migrating salmon and steelhead.

The host Red Devils of the coast area town drove from the Crater 47 to the goal in the first quarter. Frank Haffner went across from the one-yard line. His pass to Tom Head converted.

botham, from the Crater 30 to the Coquille 27-yard line, put the ball in position for a Comet third period tally. One play gained to the 17 and Wayne Martin ran the rest of the distance on an off-lackie slant. Glines threw to Higinbotham for the bonus counter.

Crater in the fourth quarter drove 55 yards to the goal with Glines crossing on a roll out from the two. The Comet quarterback was over the end zone on the conversion run but the try was ruled short. But Crater led by 13 to 7. A 65-yard run by Martin to the end zone was then called back when clipping was charged.

Coquille capitalized on a big opportunity to get its tying score. Glines, back to punt for Crater, fumbled the ball and the Devils took over on the Comet 19. A double reverse and a Haffner to Lynn Schrag pass got the TD. A conversion pass try failed.

The Red Devils threatened off the opening kick of the tussle but were delayed in their first TD. Their initial march took them to the Comet 10 but Gary Wald of Crater intercepted a pass. The Central Point team was forced to punt and Coquille came back to score.

Crater, which gambled on fourth down late in the second quarter to make first down from its own 14-yard line and its own 23, moved out with a good offensive after making a success of the second chance and promenaded to the Coquille 22.

Penalties hampered the Comets. They were assessed 82 yards for seven infractions while only one penalty for five yards, was stepped off against Coquille.

Crater had 319 net yards from scrimmage in the first half. Coquille netted 137 in the first half.
