A delegation attended the official visit of the grand officers at Friendship court, Klamath Falls, last week end. The next regular meeting will be held Thursday, October 20.

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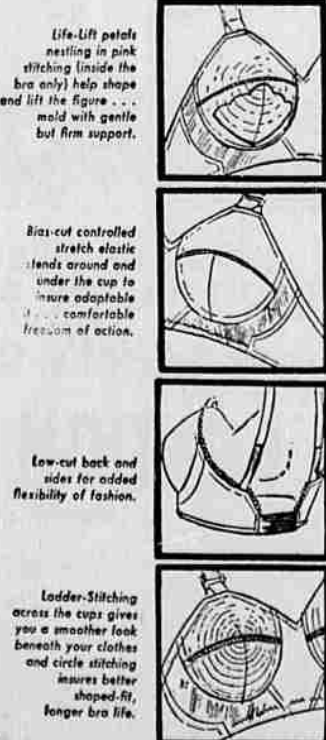
