Washington—UPI—The Navy said today five men from the Pacific Northwest, including one from Eugene, Ore., were among the 29 aboard a Marine Corps R3B transport which crashed in the Pacific Thursday en route from Japan to the Philippines.

There were no known survivors.

The other Northwest men were from Washington. They included Aviation Mechanic 2.C. R. D. Bortler and Aviation Mechanic 3.C. R. J. Bortler, both of Alderwood Manor; Photographer's Mate E. C. R. B. Red, Walla Walla, and a crew member, Staff Sgt. Ralph Thomas Perrin, 26, Yakima.

District Governor Speaks at Rotary

William H. Lush, governor of District 511 of Rotary International, discussed world fellowship and service at the Medford Rotary meeting last week.

Lush was making his annual "official" visit to each of the 26 Rotary clubs in central and southern Oregon. A member and past president of the Eugene Rotary club, he was elected as a district governor of Rotary International for the 1960-61 fiscal year last June. He is one of 267 district governors supervising the activities of more than 10,000 clubs with a membership of nearly 500,000 business and professional executives in 116 countries.

The speaker pointed out the world-wide clubs are "united" in these difficult times of international tensions in an endeavor to promote understanding, good will, and peace.

Award Grants
In addition to the activities of the clubs within their communities, he continued, the Rotary has awarded grants of more than \$3,300,000 in the past 13 years through its program of student fellowships. The program enables outstanding college graduates to study for one year in countries other than their own as Rotary ambassadors of good will.

Lush reminded local members to attend the district conference next April in Medford, and to make plans for the club to be represented at the 52nd annual convention of Rotary International in Tokyo, Japan, next May.

In reviewing the achievements of the Medford Rotary group, the governor recalled its annual suit sale to sponsor a foreign-exchange student at Medford High school. Also mentioned was the presentation of a \$500 check to the city parks and recreation commission for improvement of city parks and the adding of playground facilities.

Dr. Earl Lawson, Mrs. Jack James, Mrs. Odell, Floyd Eastwood and Dr. Robert Turner were selected as delegates to represent Jackson county unit at the division annual meeting and the district meeting in Grants Pass.

Dr. Eaton appointed as committee chairmen for the year Reese Alexander, crusader; Dr. Abner Clark, Dr. Dwayne Nelson and Mrs. James, public education; Dr. Turner and Dr. Schwan, professional education; Mrs. Ray Frisbie, service; Johnson, publicity; Mrs. Walter Garner, cancer prevention study; and Dr. Buck, nominating and by-laws.

Principal speaker for the evening was Dr. Brian Stringer, who told of the necessity for caring for cancer patients and other elderly invalids in the home. He emphasized the need for love and understanding and stated that in most instances these patients should be the concern of relatives and not public service or health agencies.

Dr. Buck reported on the advances through research toward finding a cancer cure. Based on the strides made during the past 15 years, he is optimistic that a cure for some types of cancer is not far away. Dr. Buck told the group.

Dellenback Talks Of Three Points

John R. Dellenback, Medford attorney and Republican candidate for the state legislature, presented three points of "fundamental importance" last week at a Republican women's luncheon.

First, he said, the basic issue facing the voters in the election is the issue of what and how much "we want the government to do for us."

Dellenback declared the choice was up to the voters. However, he said it should be kept in mind the more things the government is called to do, the more the taxpayers must be prepared to pay in taxes.

He spoke secondly of the probable importance of the two Jackson county seats in the state House of Representatives, since they may determine which party will organize the House and make the important committee assignments. He called for the election of two Republicans to those seats.

He also reminded the group of the importance of resisting the attempts of the other party to capture the role as the "party of progress." He suggested that Republicans point out it is the Republican party which "really most effectively" serves the long-range interests of "all the people" of the county.

The meeting, held at the Red Cross building in Medford, drew some 75 persons.

New Schedules Listed by PAL

With the shift from daylight saving to standard time today in California, Pacific Air Lines will put new schedules into effect that will provide daily commuter flights between Medford and San Francisco as well as one-plane service to Los Angeles.

According to R. E. Costello, Pacific's vice president-traffic, the commuter service will be provided with Pacific's newly acquired, pressurized and air conditioned Martinliner 404's.

The new schedules will have Flight 451 departing Medford at 6:15 a.m. and arriving in San Francisco at 8:58 a.m. with stops at Redding, Chico, Marysville and Sacramento. This flight continues to Los Angeles arriving at 11:59 a.m.

The new service will permit Medford passengers to spend a full day in San Francisco, returning in the evening on Flight 426 that leaves San Francisco International Airport at 8:30 p.m. and arrives in Medford at 11:13 p.m.

Savings in fares can also be effected by passengers flying to Los Angeles. The Sacramento-Los Angeles portion of this flight is coach and a substantial saving over first class fares can be achieved, Costello said.

Dependent Children Get Cared for Through UMC

Through the United Methodist Crusade, dependent children received services at the Boys and Girls Aid Society and Albertina Kerr homes in Portland.

Last year more than 8,400 days of care were given to children from Jackson county in these two agencies.

Some of the problems the agencies have are cases of neglect and mistreatment of children, abandoned children, broken homes, and providing corrective surgery for children so they can be placed for adoption.

Adoptive placements by the Boys and Girls Aid Society of Oregon have been increasing steadily during the past six years. The serious problems faced by adoption agencies are found in a case history of a three-year-old girl whose mother had deserted the family and the father was too confused to care for the child. Her vision was seriously impaired and she had to wear thick lensed glasses.

During the search for an adoptive home she was cared for in a certified foster home and her board and room paid by the Boys and Girls Aid Society. The foster parents helped the child learn to use her glasses, learn to live in a normal family situation and become less afraid.

Now she has permanent adoptive parents who love her and are making use of the skilled services of the agency to help raise the child. Children from Jackson county can receive such help through donations to the United Methodist Crusade.

Another instance cited from the Albertina Kerr homes was of a three-day-old baby deserted in a tavern and brought to the home by a policeman.

The child had nine separate operations to correct a cleft palate and has been adopted through the agency by a fine family and is living a normal happy life. This same child today is employed as a supervisor of children at the same nursery where she received such long and successful care.
