For the first time, a theater party from the Domiciliary saw the Footlighters in their latest production and were greatly impressed with the performance Thursday night.

Transportation was provided by the Red Cross station wagon.

Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Winslow, Mrs. Frank Glomming, Mrs. Rita Holmes, and Chief Librarian Enid Holmes accompanied the Writers' club who were special guests of the Footlighters.

One of the highlights of the evening was the invitation to come on stage after the final curtain to chat with the cast. The little theater movement in general was discussed.

Outstanding Group

Practice, practice and again practice has made the Footlighters at the fairgrounds an outstanding group of entertainers. Especially was this true of their latest production, "Suds in Your Eye."

It had the largest cast the little playhouse has ever had, which lasted for five days, Tuesday through Saturday.

The playhouse itself has an intimacy of old barn dances. Walls of knotty pine gave the old-time friendliness and a feeling of warmth, untouched by modern trends.

There were many guesses in the group as to the color of the curtains. Many noted the old-fashioned upright piano, and the ceiling fans of a type once used in the old music halls. At last it was agreed that the curtains were of cedar rose.

The theater was crowded, and while people were waiting for curtain time the lights went off.

The curtain rose on a junk yard.

Women Talking

Chinaman and Irish woman talking. Tax assessor came. Another woman comes in with a suitcase in her hand, and looks over the scene with lorgnette. Later this woman faints on numerous occasions.

In the background a long row of flowers hold the eye. It turns out there are three leading ladies. These three stars in desperation drink beer together in Act Two. Such expressions as "flea bags," "beer," and "sober" fill the air.

The audience begins to collapse in merriment.

The Chinaman attends faithfully and is forever with the elderly female stars. The little group go in partnership in rent and taxes on the house. Tax man comes. The three leading ladies decide to put a new wing on the house.

The audience cannot bear it any longer.

Stars Are Fined

In the Third Act, the three stars are fined. Two cops come in. Trouble grows and grows. One of the leading ladies has a family and friends. Chinaman is in seat where Indian sat. Somebody stole the Indian. One of the women faints.

from the police. Again they send for beer.

Sometimes the audience holds its breath, as the play progresses.

Ruth Kilbourn, the incomparable star and leading lady, who plays the part of Mrs. Feeley, once worked in the Pasadena Playhouse. Now she lives in Medford.

Mrs. Rasmussen in real life is Mrs. John Lusk, Medford. Mrs. Tinkham who fainted so long and often Thursday night, is Mrs. Charlene Tarvin who works at the library.

Her fainting spells at the Footlighters are nothing less than hilarious. Her husband, Thayer Tarvin, directed the play.

Mrs. Tarvin - Miss Tinkham on the stage - was born and raised in Jackson county, and lives in the Jacksonville area. She works in the evenings to do her rehearsals.

Her husband who was director of "Suds in Your Eye," worked six weeks at it.

Hero of Play

Then there was the hero, Charles Sites. His part was quite well and professionally done throughout the performance.

He was Danny Feeley, the nephew of Mrs. Feeley. It was extremely doubtful for a long time as to whether or not Danny would choose the right woman.

Conchita - the bad one - was after him. Everything turned out for the best at the end.

Mrs. Lawrence Ware-Conchita - said the cast was so large it presented problems. It was the largest cast she had ever seen done. She has been here a year. Her husband came from Portland Dental school, and has been practicing in Medford a little over a year. He was one of the two policemen in the play.

Mrs. Ware said all of the cast had full-time jobs during the day, made up from people of all walks of life and all sorts of work. It is taxing to appear for longer periods than one week. The next play will probably be staged in November.

No Past Experience

Conchita, herself, has had no previous experience on stage. This was her third play for the Footlighters. No one has to have experience, and anybody is welcome who would want to join the cast.

Over 20 people were in "Suds in Your Eye."

"The love of the theater is the sole motivation," Mrs. Ware said. It is a lot of hard work. But it gets in the blood when performance is before a live audience.

Conchita is 23, and her husband 25. There are young, and old, and of all ages. Even there are high school students who take and enjoy their parts.

Mrs. Max Wimmer and Buchter have been important to the little theater movement.

"The group is harmonious and welcomes new people," Mrs. Wimmer said. There is more to it than just acting. The desire to see the play succeed is the strongest feeling.

Oral auction bids will be received by the Forest Supervisor or his authorized representative at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Post Office Building, Medford, Oregon, beginning at 2:00 P.M., October 28, 1980, for all merchantable timber marked or designated for cutting on an area embracing 431 acres, more or less, within Sections 8, 17, & 18, T. 30 S., R. 12 E., W. 1/4, surveyed in the Little River National Forest, Jackson County, Oregon. The estimated volumes are: 160 M board feet of Douglas-fir, 840 M board feet of ponderosa pine and western white pine, 270 board feet of white fir & other species. The minimum acceptable bid per board foot is as follows: Douglas-fir \$38.45, ponderosa pine and western white pine \$25.70, white fir and other species \$11.10. This includes the following rates, per M board feet for stumpage (including deposit for sale area betterment): Douglas-fir \$32.35, ponderosa pine and western white pine \$19.60, white fir and other species \$5.00 and \$6.10 for slash disposal for all species. Sealed bids will be publicly opened and posted at the office of the Forest Supervisor, Medford, Oregon, at 2:00 P.M., October 30, 1980. All those who submitted a satisfactory sealed bid will be permitted immediately to continue auction bidding. A money order, bank draft, cashier's or certified check in the sum of \$2,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied to the purchase price, refunded, or retained for application to any claim for damages, according to the conditions of sale. If required by the purchaser, contract terms will permit felling of timber in advance of payment up to the value of the performance bond. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the auction, the bidder must immediately confirm the oral bid by submitting it in writing on a Forest Service bid form. The right to reject any and all bids is reserved. Forest Service bid forms for use in submitting sealed bids and full information concerning the timber, the conditions of sale and the submission of bids should be obtained from the District Ranger, Union Creek Ranger Station, or the Forest Supervisor, Medford, Oregon, before bids are submitted.
