SOME 20,000 FANS, all but lost in the vastness of Yankee Stadium, roared their approval of right fielder Roger Maris as he stepped into the batter's box on a warm summer afternoon.

It was a time for heroism, and Roger—pronounced "Rajah" in the Bronx—was hero of the hour, a top choice then for Most Valuable Player and pacing the league in batting, runs batted in, and home runs.

New York had runners on second and third. A hit would put the Yankees in the lead and keep them percentage points ahead of the Chicago White Sox. Instead of heroism, Maris popped to first. But the Rajah could do no wrong. The crowd thundered their applause.

Mickey Mantle followed—to a chorus of catcalls. His line single saved the day for New York, but the upper deck was relentless in its jockeying of a great player who has become yesterday's idol in the \$2 seats.

The 1960 darling of hero-conscious Yankeeedom is Roger Maris, an itinerant up-and-down slugger until he realized his life's ambition: "getting with a winning club." With also-ran Cleveland in 1957 and never-ran Kansas City in most of 1958 and all of 1959, Maris had periods of spectacular hitting, but injuries pulled him down to averages of .235, .240, and .273. A left-handed hitter, he hit 28 homers in 1958 but only 16 last year.

With the Yankees, however, Maris uncharacteristically provided the consistency of hitting that New York woefully lacked in 1959 and early this season.

Maris also packed most of the traditional

Yankee fan appeal. To the bleacherites, here was an "old-time ballplayer," not a walking corporation as exemplified by some modern Yankees like Mantle.

Fandom is in for some disenchantment. Maris is a traditional Yankee in power and spirit, but he also is as modern and as calculating as an electronic scoreboard.

Before a recent night game, Maris relaxed in the players' lounge of Yankee Stadium and reluctantly answered questions during the TV commercials of an ancient Laurel and Hardy film.

"I'm like anybody else. I want the security of a business. I'm going to buy a beverage distributorship when I get the money. I know promotion; I do it for a meat-packing outfit in the winter."

He's much more verbal about plans for his company than about his baseball career and why 1960 was such a banner year. "I'm doing what I always did—swinging away. But things are going right." He lapses into silence to watch Laurel slam a door in Hardy's face.

CHUCKLING on the sofa next to Maris was Mickey Mantle. Of the two "Murderous Ms," Mantle is the more spectacularly built. Maris' 200 pounds are evenly distributed over his six feet. Only his sausage-sized wrists indicate power. Pitchers have learned that those wrists are deadly on low balls, less effective at shoulder height.

Throughout the TV comedy, Mantle and Maris exchanged only chuckles, but there is no sense of rivalry between them, as some fans and sportswriters have sug-
