

DAG REJECTS PRESSURE TO QUIT; NIKITA RANTS

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Kennedy, Nixon Tangle Tonight In First in Series of Debates

Chicago Will Be Scene of Exchange On Basic Policies
Domestic Issues
Primary Topic

Chicago-UPB - Vice President Richard M. Nixon and Sen. John F. Kennedy confront each other face-to-face tonight before a nationwide radio and television audience in the first of a series of 20th Century debates that will add steam to the presidential campaign.

Their head-on exchange of basic policies, an electronic suggestion of the famous de-

bates of 192 years ago between Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglas, will take place in an air-conditioned studio of the Chicago outlet of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

The hour-long program dealing primarily with domestic issues starts at 5:30 p.m. (p.s.t.) and will be carried by the National Broadcasting Co., American Broadcasting Co., and the Mutual Radio Network, as well as CBS which is serving as host for this first of four Nixon-Kennedy appearances. They will have an audience estimated at between 60 and 100 million Americans, plus millions more overseas via the government's Voice of America and the British Broadcasting Co.

Russian Premier Hosts Cyrus Eaton

New York - UPB - Nikita Khrushchev lunched today with his millionaire friend, Cyrus S. Eaton, and a top-secret roster of capitalist guests behind an Iron Curtain designed to protect the Americans' identity from publicity.

Eaton, who has met Khrushchev in Moscow and is an exponent of peaceful coexistence, had his own security force on hand to keep newsmen away from the Hotel Billmore.

It was Khrushchev's first venture into American society this trip but he had to sneak in a side door under Eaton's security plan. Practically no one saw him.

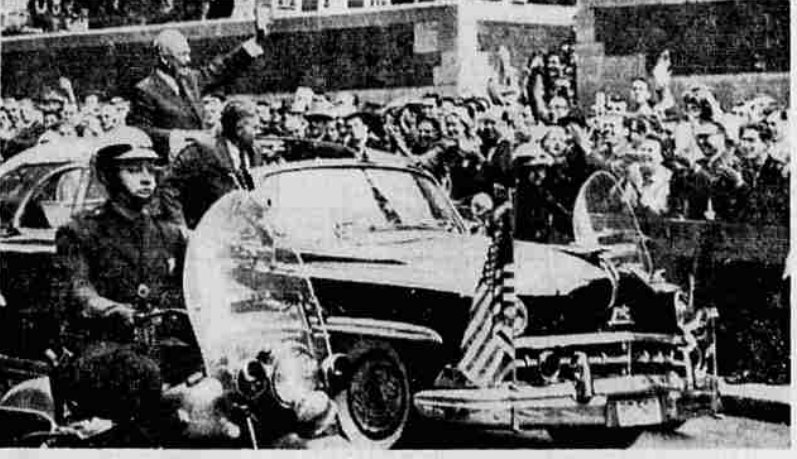
Valley residents joined the tour from Crescent City, Calif. to Nevada Friday morning. The caravan left Crescent City Thursday morning. Stops made included Crescent City point of origin, Cave Junction, Grants Pass, Rogue River, Gold Hill, Central Point, Medford, Ashland, Klamath Falls, Lakeview and Winnemucca. Mayors of each of the cities en route presented keys to their cities. Greetings were exchanged and school bands played at each of the cities. The group appeared on television at Klamath Falls.

The tour stayed Friday night at Lakeview, and Saturday night at Winnemucca. Two buses carried the tour members to Lakeview. Then 22 cars plus the two trucks in the caravan, then including 75 people, traveled the rest of the way.

The group presented a certificate of achievement to the people of Winnemucca for 176 miles of surfacing of the route. Four members said that about 36 miles remains to be paved and a nine mile section must yet be graded across Weaver valley in Nevada.

Construction has already started or is planned on other parts of the highway. One project is construction of a tunnel through Oregon mountain in northern California and straightening of Highway 199 along the Smith river.

Work in Jackson and Klamath counties includes construction along the forest road between Brownsboro and Lake of the Woods.

Pear Harvest To End During Week

Rogue valley pear orchardists at the end of this week will be through picking all pear varieties except Winter Nelis and P. Barry, County Horticultural Agent Clifford B. Cordy said today.

Picking of Bartlett and D'Anjou is completed and most orchards are picking Bosc this week. The Winter Nelis and P. Barry are comparatively small in quantity, Cordy said.

The Bartlett harvest was "fairly close" to the original 23,000 ton estimate, Cordy noted. Estimate on the D'Anjou harvest will be made at the end of this week, he added. Some growers feel the harvest came close to original estimates and other people feel it will fall short, Cordy explained.

The Bartlett estimate is 20 per cent below the average crop yield, Cordy said. Not all Bartletts graded No. 1, although the market generally was "very good," he noted. Freezing and poor pollenization hit the Bartletts hard and the Bosc harder. In the Bartletts, this resulted in a heavy tonnage of low grade pears which were sold for nectar processing. D'Anjous were not as hard hit, since trees of this variety were ready for pollenization during the early warm spell in March-ideal pollenization weather, Cordy explained.

Politicians To Attend Dedication

The Citizens for Kennedy Johnson headquarters will "officially" open at 122 East Eighth st. today at 4:30 o'clock, with the arrival in Medford of Edward (Ted) Kennedy, youngest brother of Democratic Presidential Nominee John F. Kennedy, and Congresswoman Edith S. Green, Portland.

Following the opening ceremonies, a no-host dinner at the Jackson hotel is scheduled at 6 o'clock when Kennedy and Mrs. Green will speak. Robert Duncan, Medford, speaker of the state house of representatives who is seeking reelection, will be master of ceremonies.

Mrs. Green, who is seeking reelection from the third congressional district, and Kennedy will leave Medford shortly after they speak, for Klamath Falls.

Television sets will be placed in the Pioneer room at the hotel so those attending the dinner may remain and view the first debate between John Kennedy and Richard Nixon at 9:30 a'clock.

Yreka Boy Hurt When Struck by Boat Near Dam

A 16-year-old Yreka, Calif. boy was seriously injured Sunday at Savage Rapids dam on the Rogue river when a boat operated by a Medford man struck him.

The attending physician at the Grants Pass Josephine General hospital this morning said the boy, Michael William Moore, 925 Pioneer st., Yreka, Calif., suffered a broken right arm and an injured nerve. He also suffered cuts and bruises to his chest and possible broken ribs. The doctor reported his condition as good.

State police said today they are investigating the accident which involved Henry Charles Stamper, 44, of 310 Mary st., Medford, ski-boat operator.

State police said today the Yreka boy was in the water near a dock helping his sister mount water skis when the mishap occurred. The Stamper boat, towing 17-year-old Theodore H. Stamper, son of the boat operator, bore down on the boy and his sister and ran almost directly over him.

Stamper said he saw the boat, but did not see the people in the water until a passenger in his boat shouted a warning. By then he was too close to avoid them, he said.

State police said they understood the boy and his sister are deaf-mutes. The boy was taken to the hospital by L. B. Hall ambulance.

Owner Frightens Burglars From Store

Ashland - A safe-cracking at the Ashland Groceria was thwarted early yesterday morning when the store's owner, Phil Windsor, returned to pick up some groceries.

Ashland police said Windsor and a friend stopped at the store, located at 300 East Main st., about 12:25 a.m. The would-be safe crackers had gained entry through a skylight and had punched the dial off the safe but had not succeeded in opening it.

Left behind was a blue cloth bag containing a sledgehammer, two crowbars and other tools. Windsor said that nothing was missing from the store.

Small House Burns At Modoc Orchards

Central Point - A tenant house at Modoc orchard occupied by a pear picker couple and their three small children was destroyed by fire Saturday night while the family was at a movie in Medford.

Central Point rural firemen said that Mr. and Mrs. B. Mendez and their youngsters lost all their possessions. Contributions of food, clothing and camping equipment have been made by neighbors and others and the family is housed in another cabin at the orchard.

The fire was discovered about 8:50 p.m. and was coming through the roof when first seen. Firemen said that the house was completely involved in flames when they arrived. It was speculated that the fire started in the kitchen.

Try To Orbit Moon Fails; Another Attempt Planned

Cape Canaveral - UPB - America is planning another \$10 million attempt to put a satellite into orbit around the moon this year despite its "annoying" sixth lunar probe failure Sunday.

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In seven lunar probe tries, the United States has yet to rack up a full success.

Dr. Adolph Thiel of Space Technology Laboratories said the Atlas-Able's failure was traced to a malfunction in the three-stage rocket's second stage - a section that had run up a string of 15 successes in previous space shots.

Eisenhower Given Rousing Welcome In New York City

Chief Executive To Meet World Leaders

New York - UPB - President Eisenhower made a triumphant entry into New York today with 750,000 lunchtime greetings cheering his return to talk with world leaders gathered here for the United Nations meetings.

The crowds, obviously tired of the siren-led whisking of foreign leaders' motorcades through New York City over the week end, were glad to stand up and shout for their own chief of state.

Not To Attend UN

Although Eisenhower will not again attend the United Nations General Assembly now in session, he had scheduled conferences with important heads of state whose support of Western policies in the U.N. could be of immeasurable help to the United States.

Eisenhower left Washington this morning by air and stopped at Philadelphia for two short speeches before taking off in his plane again to land at Newark Airport. He rode in his bubble-top car from Newark to New York City.

In Philadelphia the President attacked advocates of deficit spending as "political cowards" and said such spending would endanger U.S. security more than military weakness.

Thrust at Democrats

The Chief Executive declared that "nothing can more surely weaken our nation at home and abroad than such irresponsible spending."

His remarks was a thinly veiled thrust at Democrats. Eisenhower used the same language to denounce Democratic-backed legislative proposals during the last Congress.

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Fund Drive Starts; To End Tomorrow

Ashland - The Ashland-Talent United Fund's "two-day blitz" campaign was launched this morning with a 7 o'clock breakfast sponsored by the Ashland Elks club.

By 11 o'clock the Elks had been awarded the Fund's first plaque of the year. All full and part time employees of the club made 100 per cent donations based on the "full share giving" plan, one hour's pay per month for 12 months.

Two firms, Wiley and Reinhold Insurance agency, 369 East Main st. and Provost Furniture company, 357 East Main st., earned certificates when all their employees donated and the total exceeded 80 per cent of their full share.

The drive, scheduled to last throughout today and tomorrow, was opened with the ringing of church bells and tooting of whistles in Ashland. Sixty volunteer workers and division heads immediately started on their rounds to help the Fund achieve its \$21,968 goal.

Russia Promises Tuesday as Big Day in History

New York - UPB - The Russians set off a wave of new speculation today by announcing that they plan to mark Tuesday as an important day in the history of the world.

No one seems to know quite what they are up to, but the result has been a spate of guessing that includes everything from the possibility they may shoot a man into space to the disclosure they may already have one there or on the moon.

May Be Propaganda

Or they may just be playing another one their propaganda games to fit into the hoopla surrounding the current visit to the United Nations General Assembly of Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev and his Communist satellites.

For days now, Radio Moscow has been pointing to Tuesday, Sept. 27, as a day to be watched.

Last week amateur radio operators in Cleveland, Ohio, received messages from Radio Moscow telling them to pay attention to Tuesday. The Russians said they are going to make it "a day in the history of the world."

2 Die, 8 Injured In Garibaldi Fire

Garibaldi, Ore. - UPB - Two small children were killed and eight persons injured when fire flashed through a one and one-half story frame residence at this coastal town about midnight Sunday.

The victims were identified as Cindy Martin 3, and her brother, Mitchell, 5. The coroner's office said they were the children of a Mr. and Mrs. Ray Martin.

Attendants at Tillamook General hospital gave the parents' names as Beldon and Jane Martin. They were among the injured.

Also hurt in the sudden fire were Julia Martin, 3 months; Chris Erickson, 4; John Erickson, 6; Eric Erickson, 7; Pete Erickson, 18 months; and Joyce Erickson, 26. None of the injuries was serious.

Hospital attendants said the home is owned by the Martins. Mrs. Erickson and her children were visiting. Mrs. Erickson and Mrs. Martin are sisters.

An official who said the cause of the fire was not immediately known, quoted a witness as saying: "All at once the whole house was afire."

The two victims were trapped in an upstairs bedroom, the coroner's office reported.

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Soviet Premier's Anger Astounds World Diplomats

Secretary-General Receives Ovation

United Nations, N. Y. - UPB - Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold today rejected Soviet pressure to resign in a speech that sent Premier Nikita Khrushchev into a deafening rage that sounded like an anvil chorus.

Most of the delegates at the General Assembly gave Hammarskjold a tremendous ovation but Khrushchev led the Communist delegates in a display of anger that astonished the world of diplomacy and caused Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru of India to stare in disbelief.

The choleric Khrushchev, sitting near the back of the chamber, began pounding his desk the moment Hammarskjold finished his unscheduled speech in which he rejected Khrushchev's suggestion the secretary general's job be abolished.

The Soviet foreign minister took his cue from his leader and joined in the demonstration. They were followed quickly by the Communist satellites in a rhythmic thump that jarred the modernistic tables and lasted until the applause died away.

Hammarskjold said he would rather see his office "break" while upholding impartiality in world affairs than "drift on the basis of compromise." It was the closest the U.N. leader could come in diplomatic fashion to a slap at the man who wants to fire him.

He already had won the support of the Western nations and most of the neutralist African and Asian countries who were appalled at Khrushchev's suggestions. Nehru was one of the first "big" neutralists to rally to his support and had met with Hammarskjold just before the speech.

Khrushchev appeared pleased with the commotion he was causing and finally broke into a wide grin.

Hammarskjold was followed by Argentine Foreign Minister Diogene Taboada who gave his full support to the secretary general.

Leave Meeting Early

Khrushchev, Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko and other Russians walked out of the assembly during the Taboada speech but the walkout appeared to have no special significance. The Russians apparently were returning to their headquarters for a previous engagement.

Prime Minister John Diefenbaker of Canada threw his support to Hammarskjold and said Khrushchev's reorganization plan was "an absurd proposal which would reduce the United Nations to ineffectuality and indecision."

Diefenbaker accused Khrushchev of staging "a gigantic misrepresentation." He said President Eisenhower had opened the door to international conciliation and that Khrushchev "tried to shut that door."

He scoffed at Khrushchev's proposal to end colonialism and asked, "might I ask how many human beings have been liberated by the U.S.S.R. since the first war? Do we forget how one of the postwar colonies of the Soviet Union (Hungary) sought to liberate itself four years ago, and with what results?"
