Deputy Sheriff Wounds Boy, 14, In Shooting Scrape at Corvallis

Youngster Takes Shot at Officer At Youth Home

Wound Said Not Considered Serious

Corvallis—UPI—A 14-year-old boy was wounded in the shoulder by a Benton county deputy sheriff at the children's farm home north of here Monday night after the boy first fired at the deputy, Sheriff C. N. Lilly reported.

The boy, Bruce Butler, was hospitalized with a wound that was not considered serious.

In Self Defense

Lilly said Deputy Sheriff Wayne Yates shot in self defense after routing the boy out of a basement in which he was hiding at the farm home, a charity organization for children from broken homes.

The shooting occurred about 7 p.m. Monday after Yates received word that Butler, formerly a resident of the farm home, was there in a station wagon.

Runs Into Cottage

Butler and another boy were seen to run into one of the cottages. Yates, accompanied by Richard W. Thomas, farm home superintendent and two other men, began a search.

Yates said he found Butler hidden in a basement shower. He said he saw the boy raise an automatic pistol and fire at him from two feet away. The bullet missed as Yates ducked to one side and Yates, who had already drawn his .38 caliber revolver, fired.

Wanted To See Sisters

The boy said he returned from a foster home at Reedsport to the farm home to see three sisters and friends. He said he had taken an automatic pistol and a station wagon. The boy said he had lived at the farm home for three years but was sent to MacLaren School for Boys about eight months ago before being sent to the foster home.

Ike, Macmillan Voice Full Backing For Hammarskjold

New York—UPI—A "great majority" of the African nations support U.N. Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold in the face of Soviet attacks, a State Department spokesman said today.

The statement came after President Eisenhower and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan voiced full support for Hammarskjold and called on the United Nations to get down to serious work on disarmament and other problems.

Support of Ethiopia

Eisenhower received assurances from an Ethiopian spokesman that Ethiopia backs the secretary-general in the crisis created by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's demand that he be replaced by a Soviet-style three-man presidium, or dictatorship.

Nixon-Kennedy Debate Sums Up Domestic Issues

Program Compared To Sparring Match

Chicago—UPI—The two major presidential candidates, in their first radio-TV debate, took summations of their campaign stands on domestic issues directly into the homes of millions of Americans Monday night.

John F. Kennedy, speaking first, said he felt that America was not doing enough at home to keep ahead in a world of great pressures. Richard M. Nixon, speaking second, said he believed America was "ahead of the Russians" but would have to keep working at it.

Voters Determine Winner
It was the "great debate" carried by four major television and radio chains. Whether there was a winner, or will be after the three succeeding debates, will be determined only at the polls in November.

The principals seemed happy with the show.

Nixon: "It was a good sharp exchange of views."

Kennedy: "A very useful exchange of views."

One political observer compared the show to the early rounds of a prize fight with the opponents boxing carefully and feeling out each other's strength without getting into a real slugging match.

Nixon's advisers said they expect to be getting reports within the next few days indicating the impact their candidate carried and how his campaign pitch is being received.

First in History

It was the first time in the nation's history that two presidential candidates had appeared together to debate campaign issues. This one was to be confined to domestic affairs. Of the three to come two will deal with general subjects and the last with international problems.

The only comparable clash between two top political leaders occurred in this same state of Illinois 102 years ago when Abraham Lincoln and Stephen A. Douglas, opponents in a contest for a U.S. Senate seat, debated the issue of slavery on the eve of the Civil War. Douglas won the election.

Neither Kennedy nor Nixon advanced any new programs during the meeting in a Chicago studio of the Columbia Broadcasting System. They repeated many of the same themes at which they have pounded in their aerial campaign swings across the nation.

Kennedy asserted the nation should move ahead faster, while Nixon said the country was ahead of the Russians and had enjoyed greater progress under President Eisenhower than former President Truman.

The candidates agreed they could not discuss domestic issues—the subject of the debate—without touching on their relation to foreign problems.

Kennedy Asks Vote For Party to Have Firm Policy Abroad

Edward (Ted) Kennedy, brother of the Democratic Presidential candidate, last night called for American voters to "elect a party Nov. 8 which will formulate a firm foreign policy and stick with it."

He spoke at a no-host din-

Edward (Ted) Kennedy says being the brother of a presidential candidate is no easy task.

When asked how long he had been campaigning for brother Jack, Ted replied "for 13 months." He said he started active campaigning in October, 1959, concentrating on Maine, scene of the first presidential primary.

Since then his campaigning has taken him across the U.S. twice, with intensive travels through Alaska and Hawaii.

In the next two weeks he indicated he would visit Texas, Colorado, California, and Hawaii, in addition to spending some more time in Oregon.

Kennedy also humorously recalled two of his most trying moments as a campaigner. The first came in Wisconsin when he was called upon to don a pair of skis and catapult down a ski jump.

The second harrowing experience was equally as breathtaking, as the citizens of Montana put Ted on a bucking bronco. "I lasted 5 1/2 seconds," he reported.

In closing she called for placing religious issues aside, with emphasis given "to the real issues confronting us today."

Prior to his speech, Kennedy was presented an honorary membership to the Jackson County Young Democrats club. Gene Mills made the presentation.

Robert Duncan, Medford, speaker of the state house of representatives, was master of ceremonies.

Kennedy and Mrs. Green left immediately after the program for Klamath Falls and another speaking engagement.

Nasser Calls for Talks Between Ike, Khrushchev

United Nations, N.Y.—UPI—President Gamel Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic called today for a personal meeting between President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to start the world today complete disarmament.

Khrushchev told newsmen later he was willing to meet with British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan but he evaded saying whether he would meet Eisenhower.

Nasser, a neutral leader in world affairs, said he was taking the initiative in demanding such a meeting because the big powers "do not alone have the right to speak about peace and war." It was the first major demand by an emerging neutral "third force."

Nasser also demanded admission of Communist China to the United Nations and asked that pro-Soviet Premier Patrice Lumumba of the Congo be returned to power.

Nasser did not take sides over the Soviet and Communist satellite demands that Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold be fired and his post abolished in favor of a three-man presidium. The United States and Britain appeared to be winning their pro-Hammarskjold fight.

Soviet Makes Proposal
The Soviet Union countered this by announcing today they would seek to add leading neutral nations to the 10-nation disarmament committee whose talks in Geneva were wrecked by a Communist walkout last June. They were India, Indonesia, the U.A.R., Ghana and Mexico.

The presumed members were the United States, Britain, France, Canada and Italy for the West and Russia, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Romania and Poland from the Iron Curtain countries.

The General Assembly was developing into a momentous battle for the uncommitted nations of the world and the United States appeared to be banking on Hammarskjold's personal popularity in this cold war struggle.

President Eisenhower and Macmillan announced today they gave full support to Hammarskjold. Later, the State Department said a "great majority" of the African nations back Hammarskjold.

While Ennon "greets" U.S. and Macmillan were meeting in New York with world leaders, Khrushchev called a Communist strategy session of his satellite leaders from Byelorussia, Ukraine, Albania, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary and Poland.

Delegates Roar Approval
Nasser received enthusiastic applause when he began speaking, with Khrushchev applauding in flamboyant fashion. The entire assembly broke into a roar of approval when he called for the Eisenhower-Khrushchev meeting.

Khrushchev, who has taken the position that any meeting with Eisenhower was "up to the President," was reported extending his New York visit by as much as two more weeks. One reason might be his desire to be available for any top-level talks.

However, Eisenhower has remained stonily aloof and high government sources have indicated he was not interested. In the past there were reports he would not meet Khrushchev until the Russians release two RB47 pilots shot down over the Barents sea.

When Nasser finished a tremendous ovation went up and Khrushchev and Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko leaped to their feet to lead the applause.

With Khrushchev sitting in the General Assembly hall and Eisenhower represented by U.S. Ambassador James J. Wadsworth, Nasser said:

"We suggest that the General Assembly recommend that the two great leaders should, under the standard of the United Nations, meet either by themselves or together with whom you select among those who are present here in order for them all to put under the aegis of the United Nations, guiding rules for a new attempt toward disarmament."

Temperature Sets New High in City
A new record high temperature for Medford for Sept. 26 was established yesterday when the mercury rose to 85 degrees at the weather bureau's station at the Medford airport.

Previous record high for Sept. 26 was 84 degrees in 1935, the weather bureau said.

The bureau forecast slightly cooler weather, with variable cloudiness through Wednesday. The expected high tomorrow will be about 85 to 88 degrees, the weather bureau said, after an expected low tonight of about 55 degrees.

Washington—UPI—The city of Eugene, Ore., has been advanced \$15,400 by the Community Facilities Administration for preliminary planning for sewage facilities to cost \$546,688, the office of Sen. Hall S. Lusk, (D-Ore.), said today.

He said of the Elmo Smith-Maurine Neuberger contest for the Senate that "Gov. Smith could win if the Republican organization works as hard for him as he is doing for himself."

U.S. Army authorities announced yesterday that Bobby G. Watersbee, a soldier who formerly lived in Central Point, was killed last week in an automobile accident near Bordeaux, France.

The Army said Watersbee, who was stationed at the U.S. military base of Bussac-la-Forêt, near Bordeaux, was killed when the car in which he and three other soldiers were riding struck off the road and struck a tree. The others received only minor injuries.

Watersbee's parents now live in Pasco, Wash.
