Yanks Edge Senators 4-2 For 10th Triumph In Row

The New York Yankees are picking up a little something for the Pittsburgh Pirates—momentum!

It's all Casey Stengel's idea. He sat down and figured out that all the Yankees have to do to become the new baseball champions of the world is win their next nine straight games.

They've won 10 in a row already. That leaves only five more to go on the regular season schedule and if they could win the next four after that, they would be free to start concentrating on their 1961 spring training.

Casey says he doesn't expect to rest many of his regulars although the pennant already is clinched, nor does he expect the team to rest on its laurels. He needn't worry. They aren't.

Play For Keeps
Call it a stretch run or a dry run, the Yankees are playing each game now as if

it's the deciding one of the World Series. Monday night's 4-2 victory over the Washington Senators in 10 innings was typical.

Bob Cerv opened the 10th with a double and Roger Maris walked with one out. That brought up Jim Pisoni, but he held everything—Casey wanted a pinch hitter.

He picked Hector Lopez, who in turn picked on one of Pedro Ramos' pitches and singled to drive in the tie-breaking run. Dale Long singled home another just for insurance.

Long homered in the second

inning and the Yankees scored an unearned run in the sixth, but Harmon Killebrew belted his 31st homer with one on in the seventh off rookie Bill Stafford to tie the score. Duke Maas hurled the last two innings, allowed only one hit, and won his third game. The loss made Ramos' record 11-17.

In the battle for second place money, the Chicago White Sox moved into a tie with the idle Baltimore Orioles by defeating the Detroit Tigers, 6-3. The Kansas City Athletics topped the Cleveland Indians, 6-1 in the only other scheduled American league game.

Giants Win

The San Francisco Giants beat the Los Angeles Dodgers, 6-2, in the only National league action.

Minnie Minoso led an 11-hit assault on three Tiger pitchers with a double, a single and his 20th homer of the season for the White Sox. Lefty Frank Baumann gave up eight hits in winning his 13th game against six losses. Bill Fisher was the loser. His record is 8-8.

Knuckelbush Bud Daley of the A's, finally reverting to the form that made him one of the league's standouts before the All-Star break, checked the Indians on four hits for his 16th victory. The Athletics raked loser Dick Stigman and two Tribe relievers for 14 hits, including a homer by catcher Pete Daley.

The Giants' victory over the Dodgers was their fifth in a row and they achieved it by knocking out Don Drysdale with a six-run rally in the eighth. Don Blasingame's triple with the bases loaded off reliever Larry Sherry did the bulk of the damage during the frame. Southpaw Mike McCormick was credited with his 14th victory while Drysdale was tagged with his 14th loss. Frank Howard hit his 23rd homer for the Dodgers.

Giant, Pirate Fans Give NL All-Time Mark

Cincinnati —UPI—New all-time marks for both the San Francisco Giants and the champion Pittsburgh Pirates have enabled the National league to set an all-time attendance record this year.

Including games played through Sunday, the league has drawn a total of 10,395,420 fans this season, beating the previous record of 10,388,470 set in the post-war boom year of 1947. With a week of the regular season still to go, the league is almost certain to reach the 11,000,000 plateau, according to Dave Grote of the NL Service bureau.

Despite a disappointing season, the Giants soared over the previous club high of 1,600,793, set in 1947 when the club was based at the Polo Grounds in New York. The Pirates, who clinched their first pennant in 33 years on Sunday, have eclipsed their previous high of 1,517,021 and still have four games left to play at home.

The Dodgers, with 2,165,378 admissions already accounted for, are certain to break the league's single set by the Milwaukee Braves in 1957.

3 Named To U.S. Squad

New York —UPI—When the U.S. Davis Cup team leaves to compete in the inter-zone matches in Australia later this month, it will be pinning its hopes for success on a trio of youngsters—Chuck McKinley and Earl Buchholz of St. Louis and Dennis Ralston of Bakersfield, Calif.

The three were named to the five-man U.S. squad Monday along with veterans Barry MacKay of Dayton, Ohio, and Bernard (Tut) Bartenz of Dallas, Tex. Their selection was announced jointly by James B. Moffet, chairman of the U.S. Lawn Tennis Association selection committee, and team captain David L. Freed.

Ralston, 18, is the youngest player on the squad, while McKinley is 19 and Buchholz is 20. MacKay, who helped the U.S. gain the coveted Davis Cup from Australia in 1958 and who also played in the losing Yank team in the challenge round at Forest Hills, N.Y., last year is 25. Bartenz is the oldest player on the team at 32.

The team leaves for Australia on Oct. 31 and will play in the Australian state tournament before meeting the Philippines, winner of the Eastern Zone eliminations. The winner will face Italy, European Zone champion, for the right to play Australia in the challenge round, at Sydney, Dec. 26-27-28. Dates and sites for the first two elimination rounds have not been selected.

Stickles Is Promising 49er Star

San Francisco —UPI—Monte Stickles, 6-4 and 240 pounds, may turn out to be the hero of the 1960 San Francisco Forty Niners.

The ex-Notre Dame All-American, picked by the Forty Niners as their No. 1 choice in the draft last year, is making believers out of some of the guys who thought that Monte never would make it big in the big time.

"Everybody told us we were making a terrible mistake in drafting Stickles as our No. 1 man last winter," says head coach Red Hickey. "But I was of the opinion that a man that big who could move as fast as he does, could play football."

Right now Stickles looks like a shining light in what might be a tough season for the Forty Niners. Against the New York Giants on Sunday he caught eight passes for 116 yards. That wasn't out of this-world, but it was the workmanlike way in which Stickles accomplished the feat that struck seasoned observers.

Faked and Ran
Monte faked and ran like a seasoned pro. On top of that, with his bulk and speed, he just bowled over would-be tacklers and it usually took two or three men to bring him down.

Stickles has had a hard time convincing coaches and fans that he is a great football player. At Notre Dame it was reported that he never "gave his all" for the Irish. And then he went to the All-Star game and ended up playing on the second string — although admittedly suffering from a pinched nerve.

"We were somewhat worried when a coach from the All-Star game told us that Monte would never make it," said Hickey. "They said he didn't know how to cut or run or receive. But I was certain he could play for us."

Playing a lot from the "right end" position in the Hickey offensive, Stickles has been a revelation. He joined the club late because of the All-Star game, but learned the plays rapidly.

The Forty Niner scouting reports admitted there were claims that Stickles was a hot-head. But so far he has proved to be one of the coolest men on the field. He hasn't tried to punch anyone — and, obviously, no one has taken a swing at him.

Bevos Plan Settlement On Lawsuit

Portland —UPI—The Portland baseball club today was ready to drop its suit against the major leagues.

The Pacific Coast league team's board of directors on Monday approved a formal letter to PCL President Dewey Soriano saying they would accept \$42,500 from the majors in settlement of the suit.

The money would include \$22,500 from the minor league assistance fund for last year and \$20,000 for 1960, money Portland would have been eligible to receive had the Beavers not been suing the majors.

A tentative agreement to settle the suit had been worked out between Soriano and Portland Team President Arch Kingsley here at the PCL meeting last week. The board of directors approved it 5-1. The letter to Soriano asks an answer from Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick not later than Oct. 14.

Portland sued the majors in the summer of 1959 for \$1.8 million, charging a monopoly in baseball. Two court rulings have gone against the Beavers.

There's a move we've been told about which may gain headway in the next few weeks. It's this—an effort to move the state Class A-1 football championship game from Multnomah stadium in Portland to some other gridiron, like Hayward field (Eugene) or Parker stadium (Corvallis) if a Portland team is not one of the finalists.

On first consideration, we are for such a shift. We know that many fans just couldn't go to the Medford-Jefferson finale in 1958 and 1959 because of jobs and the long travel distance to Portland. And, we feel that it should be made convenient for fans to support their team in a titular game.

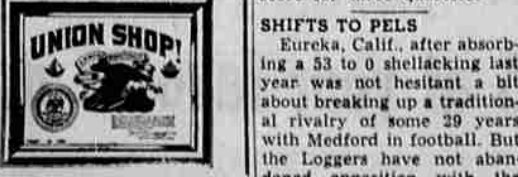
But, our next thought is that local backers of an effort to switch the game site, even with their confidence in the powerful Medford Black Tornado, should not be presumptuous. We recall that a couple of years ago a good number of Marshfield fans decided not to come to a state quarterfinal game at Medford. They were saving their money for a trip to Portland for the finals. Well, Medford beat the Pirates and some Coos Bay people were made a laughing stock.

Klamath Falls ambitions to return to football prominence in the Southern Oregon conference suffered a rude jolt at the claws of the Bruins. At the same time, Ashland blazed further indication that its own gridiron fortunes are on the upswing. The Pelicans, obviously were overrated in the polls which ranked them No. 3 in the state last week. But, that fact takes nothing away from the determined, workmanlike, sparkling Grizzlies who earned their victory well and have the statistical evidence to prove it.

CHIEF THREAT
Outcome at Ashland last Friday makes the Grizzlies the chief threat to the conference and District 6 A-1 throne held by defending state champion Medford. It's too early to really judge how the two clubs actually measure up to each other. The Black Tornado looks the stronger, most "experts" would agree. But, on the strength of last Friday's skirmish in the Lithia City, the Big Wind might just have its hands full when the two schools meet on Oct. 28 at Ashland.

We think back to 1957 when the Tornado was hard pressed to beat Ashland 15 to 6 and to 1958 when Medford, although it went on to win by a handy 27 to 0, could not score for three quarters.
