Emily Post, 86, Etiquette Author, Dies in New York

New York - (UPI) - Emily Post's philosophy on etiquette was simple. "Etiquette is the science of living," she once said. "It embraces everything. It is the code of sportsmanship and of honor. It is ethics."

This was the thesis for her book, with the title "Etiquette: The Blue Book of Social Usage," which has sold more than a million copies in 80 printings since 1922 and made her name synonymous with good manners.

Thousands wrote to ask about such things as the propriety of doughnut dunking or the correct fork or spoon for a meal.

The lady with the prompt answer is dead. Successful Novelist Mrs. Post, 86, died Sunday night at her Manhattan home following a long illness.

She was a successful novelist before she began writing on the social graces, prompted by a friend's book in 1922 which Mrs. Post felt was full of erroneous advice. She set out to put the record straight and the result made her name a household word.

Thousands of GIs bought her book during World War II, to her surprise. Many were anxious to improve their manners to help them become officers, it was learned. Others wanted to impress new girl friends.

Mrs. Post gave her blessing to doughnut dunking, as long as it was informal. "You wouldn't serve doughnuts at a formal dinner anyway," she said.

Elmo Smith Calls West Berlin Symbol of Free World Battle

By United Press International Elmo Smith, Republican nominee for the U.S. Senate, said Monday night "I was shocked to hear my opponent say that she would not risk a nuclear war to protect free West Berlin."

Smith, speaking at West Linn, called West Berlin "the leading symbol of our fight for the free world today. We would not dare to risk letting it go to Russia by default." He said "Berlin, won with the blood of American youths, must be our line of decision as to whether we will maintain our freedom or become victims of appeasement."

Smith and Mrs. Maurice Neuberger, his Democratic rival, spoke last Friday in Salem to the League of Women Voters.

Main Foreign Policy Talk Mrs. Neuberger, campaigning on the coast, said in a speech prepared for Coos Bay delivery today that the main task facing America's foreign policy is to advance democratic institutions on a unified basis among nations of the free world.

She said "We must effectively organize and unify the strength of the Western world behind our common ideals of individual liberty and political democracy to overwhelm the claims of Communism."

The combined resources of Western Europe and the Western hemisphere "far exceed what the Communist nations can ever hope to match," she said.

Smith, speaking in McMinnville earlier Monday, called for maximum development of research to increase employment in Oregon. He said this was fundamental to his campaign theme of "Peace and Jobs."

Mrs. Neuberger while on the coast also urged acceptance of the plan for a National Seashore park near the Florence sand dunes, a plan advocated by her late husband, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger.

Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) also urged a national seashore in a speech at Florence Monday. "No one's home will be taken away by this project," he said.

The touring Democrats, who also included Attorney General Robert Thornton and State Sens. Monroe Sweetland and Ward Cook, continued to urge voter registration. Democratic State Chairman Robert Straub said he believed that "two out of three" unregistered persons are Democrats.

Thornton defended his record of opinions sustained by the Oregon Supreme court. "Of my opinions going before the court, 69 per cent have been sustained. Only 63 per cent of Circuit Court verdicts have been sustained in that time," he said. State Sen. Carl Francis (R-Dayton) opposes Thornton for attorney general.

David O'Hara, Salem, director of the elections division for some 40 years, announced he would head a committee of registered Republicans and independents to support Sweetland for secretary of state. He praised Sweetland and declared "I have never before publicly endorsed any candidate, Republican or Democrat, for public office."

He listed several bills affecting schools on which he said Smith as a state senator, voted against education. The Oregonian Monday endorsed Smith over Mrs. Neuberger for the Senate.

Big Three Sends Note Protesting Curbs in Berlin

Berlin - (UPI) - The United States, Britain and France sent another note to the Soviet Union today reasserting Berlin's four-power status and protesting anew against Communist travel restrictions in the city.

The note, signed by the Western commandants in Berlin and delivered by French Commandant Gen. Jean Lacomme to Soviet Commandant Maj. Gen. Nikolai Zakharov, also warned the Russians that they will be held responsible for any interference with the three Western air corridors to the isolated city.

Full Rights Retained The Western note replied to a Soviet note of Sept. 13 which in turn answered an allied protest over East German travel restrictions.

The new message stressed that the Western allies retain full rights throughout Berlin, and that East Berlin is not part of East Germany. The East Germans claim all four-power agreements on the city are dead.

East Germany has claimed it can regulate travel "on or above" its territory.
