Study Books Reviewed At Institute

Protestant study books were reviewed and discussed at the recent Mission Institute held in Eastwood Baptist church and sponsored by Medford Council of United Church Women.

Books groups under the theme, "Into All the World Together" by W. Ricky Hogg were presented by Mrs. R. Mayer. She stated that it is a regrettable fact that only 34 per cent of the world population is Christian and that there is need for evangelism in the Western culture. Christian nations have a real work to do if missionary help is to bring results, she said. Sympathetic understanding of the problems of native peoples and respect for their goals and life should be exercised in order to obtain our own Christian goals," she concluded.

Mrs. C. Weidon Kline gave excerpts from young adult and junior books. Speaking on the book "Whose World" by John Wood, she stated that the author promotes the feeling that one wishes to be involved in World Affairs. She also briefed the book "Turning World" by Betty Thompson, in which the author records a world trip. Each chapter of the book deals with material gathered in a different country and is helpful to ward understanding at close hand the world wide Christian movement, it was said.

The story of the "Book of Books" by Grace McGarvan, and "We Belong Together" were also briefed by Mrs. Kline.

The California pianist has received the praise of critics for her rare musical perception, dramatic sense and poetic imagination. As a child prodigy, she delighted audiences.

Following study with Julian Pascal, Josef Lhevinne, Harold Bauer and Egon Petri, Miss Steuber made her orchestral debut with the Los Angeles Philharmonic orchestra under Rodzinski, and she has had some 50 solo appearances with orchestras since that time. She has played 21 concertos with such leading conductors as Klemperer and Wallenstein and has done solo film recordings in Hollywood.

In addition to solo concerts, Miss Steuber has performed sonata and trio concerts with eminent instrumentalists and has had guest appearances with organizations such as the London String Quartet, American Art Quartet, and the Hungarian String Quartet.

Besides appearing in concerts in the continental United States, Miss Steuber has performed in Hawaii, Mexico, and South America.

The artist's presentation in Ashland is sponsored by Southern Oregon college and is open to the public. There will be no charge for admission.

Girl Scouting Opportunities Are Explained

The selections committee of the Rogue Valley Girl Scout council has announced the extension to September 30, of the deadline for applicants for the 1961 Region XL opportunities, according to Mrs. W. W. Stevenson, chairman.

Girl Scouts eligible for these national events must be 13 years old by the time of the event and also qualify on ratings in appearance, emotional poise, attitude, mental alertness, ability to express self, knowledge of Girl Scouting, knowledge of community activities and groups, knowledge of local community, and knowledge of own country.

Two events are offered qualified Girl Scouts. A Spanish language camp will be held at Camp Four Echoes on Lake Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, sponsored by the Inland Empire Girl Scout council, Spokane, Wash. Joan Crawford is a wheel in the soft drink business, Gloria Swanson and Polly Bergen design dresses. Dorothy Lamour has moved into the beauty salon business.

Miss Sothern, self-styled as "the laziest girl in town," heads her own television production company Anso Productions, has a song publishing company, A Bar S Music corporation, heads another company, Vincent Productions handling contracts for repuns for her "Private Secretary" television series, bosses the Ann Sothern sewing center in Sun Valley, runs an Idaho ranch breeding Black Angus cattle, and soon will go into the dress manufacturing business with Moss Mabry.

Mabry is the Hollywood designer who does all the fashions for the "Ann Sothern" show which returns to CBS-television October 6. She also plays the piano,
