

Castro Wooing American Negroes To Strengthen Objective in Cuba

City Police Report Three Accidents

Three minor traffic accidents, including a hit and run accident, were reported to Medford police Monday none of them resulting in any apparent injuries.

The hit and run accident occurred sometime Sunday night or Monday morning when an unidentified vehicle struck and damaged a car belonging to John Paul Lewis, 714 Pennsylvania st., while it was parked in front of Lewis' residence. Minor damage was done to the left door of the vehicle, police said.

State police cited Harry LeRoy Collins, 70, 1637 Stewart ave., for going the wrong way on a one way street after Collins' vehicle sideswiped a parked car in front of 828 North Central ave.

Both city and state police investigated the accident. City police said damage to the parked vehicle was negligible.

The third accident occurred about 9:46 a.m., when vehicles operated by Jesse Richard Waldo, 47, Modesto, Calif., and Kenneth Dean Peterson, 29, of 1724 Stratford ave., collided on North Central ave. between Third and Fourth sts. Damage to both vehicles was moderate, and police cited Peterson for improper lane change.

13 Convicts Killed In Colombia Riots

Bogota, Colombia — (UPI) — Troops and police were called out late Tuesday to block an attempt by 1,800 dagger-wielding convicts to seize control of Bogota's La Picota prison.

A Justice Ministry spokesman said the ministry has been unable to find out where the convicts obtain the knives with which they were armed. Thirteen convicts were killed and 22 persons were wounded in a brief but bitter battle at the prison. Several of those wounded were guards, two of whom were reported in serious condition.

Seeks Name Change

Premier Seeking To Recoup Lost Tourist Dollars

Editor's note: Cuba's Fidel Castro has launched an all-out campaign to capture the American Negro's backing for his revolutionary cause. What is behind his campaign? What does he hope to accomplish? What are his future plans? UPI's Latin American news editor deals with these questions in the following dispatch.

New York — (UPI) — Fidel Castro has carried his Cuban revolution into the United States to try to win the American Negro to his cause.

People here who know Cuba and Cubans spell out Castro's objectives thus:

—He is wooing the American Negro to strengthen his faltering hold on the Cuban masses, predominantly Negro.
—He is trying to recoup lost tourist dollars by selling the American Negro on Cuba as the ideal discrimination-free vacation resort.

—He wants to strengthen his bid for Afro-Asian support of Cuba's campaign for a seat on the United Nations Security Council.

—He is seeking to harass and embarrass the United States.

To all practical effect, the Cuban revolutionary government operates today from the Harlem district of New York.

Not only is Castro Cuba's premier there, but his foreign minister, economy minister and army chief are with him. **Hotel Move Planned**

Castro's "settling down" in Harlem is hardly accidental. The facts show it to be de-

liberate and preconcerted.

On his arrival here last Sunday Castro was housed at the midtown Shelburne hotel. However, the facts disclose the Harlem Hotel Theresa deal was negotiated 24 hours earlier.

Castro loudly proclaimed he was leaving the Shelburne because it demanded a \$10,000 bond against damages and unpaid bills, and too high room rates.

Yet his representatives in New York had previously accepted the bond demand, a customary one in the hotel business. His present rate for 40 rooms at the Theresa is \$840 a day as compared to the \$400 a day he paid at the Shelburne.

He rejected a U. S. offer of free rooms at the Commodore.

In other words, Castro knew what he was doing and where he was going even while "mounting a show," as the Cubans say, at the United Nations and threatening to sleep out in the open.

Propaganda Program Rolls
The moving parts in Castro's massive propaganda buildup for the shift to Har-

lem have fallen in smoothly since.

He has praised the "democratic spirit" he has found in Harlem, implying that this is a quality found only in the American Negro.

Castro's personal newspaper, *Revolucion*, has given front page display to "democratic" Cuban delegation members eating in what the paper describes as "exclusive Negro" restaurants.

The ultimate effect of the Castro campaign for American Negro support can perhaps be summarized in the remarks of one New York Negro leader, William Rowe. Rowe and Joe Lewis, the former boxing champion, at one time had Castro's public relations account in the United States. They gave it up when he turned anti-American.

Says Rowe, a former New York City deputy police commissioner:

"No one is going to drive a wedge between Americans. The Negro's fight for equality in the United States is a fight between brothers; no outsider had better step in between."

Wall Street Chatter

New York — (UPI) — The nearest major support lies in the 525 area of the Dow-Jones industrial around 50 points below current levels according to Martin Gilbert of Van Alstyne, Noel & Co.

This does not necessarily mean, he says, that the market will immediately recede to that zone and it is conceivable that it may stop somewhere in between.

Gilbert feels that the 525 area is the only level which stands out as a strong one but that averages are capable of fairly wide fluctuations in the interim.

Standard & Poor's says to buy General Dynamics as a "stock for action" on the idea that 1961 earnings could rebound to about \$4 or \$5 a share, now that airline losses have been written off.

Thomson & McKinnon points out that some chartists who regarded the lows of the Dow-Jones industrials as the "magic 600" prior to last week's break, are now referring to the same area as the "tragic 600", terming it a formidable obstacle to any further rally.

Bache & Co. recommends a switch out of American Can Co. since that firm's earnings have stood still for a decade. The house continues to like Van Ralte, strong recently on the basis of an 80 per cent stock dividend and a slight boost in the cash rate.

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
