

Pittsburgh, New York Clubs Try To Impress Each Other

What are the Yankees and Pirates trying to do, impress each other?

It sure looked that way Tuesday night.

Fireballer R. Y. Duren, making his first start for the Yankees in two years, tied an American league record by striking out the first five batters he faced in a 5-1 win over Washington.

And just to show they're no slouches, either, four Pittsburgh pitchers—Tom Cheney, Diomedes Olivo, Jim Uhl, and Fred Green—fanned a total of 19 in a 16-inning 4-3 triumph over Cincinnati.

The Yankees' victory was their 11th in a row, and although it was credited to Eli Grba, Duren was the stand-out.

Duren, fresh out of the hospital where he was treated for an eye injury, proved to be a pinch hitter for Casey Stengel, who was ready for World Series duty with his strong four-inning stint.

Only three other modern

pitchers, since 1900, recorded five strikeouts at the start of a game. They were Lefty Gomez of the Yankees, Dazzy Vance of the Dodgers and Walter Johnson of the Senators.

Duren was lifted for a pinch hitter in the fifth after giving up two of Washington's three hits. He retired with a total of seven strikeouts.

Grba pitched the next three innings, without giving up a hit, and Bob Turley wrapped it up by setting the Senators down on one hit in the last two frames.

Meanwhile, the Yankees picked up seven hits off three

rookie Washington pitchers—Don Lee, Ted Sadowski and Jim Katt—but made them count. Bill Skowron, appearing as a pinch hitter in the eighth inning, stroked his 26th homer.

The Pirates snapped a three-game losing streak with their victory, and it was accomplished with a lineup made up of rookies and second-line players. Joe Christopher, who had five hits, Gene Baker, who had two, and catcher Bob Oldis, who had a double were the hitting heroes.

Gets Winning Hit

Dick Schofield, filling in for the injured Dick Groat, got the winning hit, a line drive single to score pinch runner Gino Cimoli. Dick Stuart hit a three-run homer.

The victory went to Green, who pitched the top half of the 16th and recorded one strikeout. Before that, starter Cheney struck out nine Cincinnati batters, Olivo fanned six and Umbricht three. The 19 strikeouts was just two below the major league record—achieved against the Pirates themselves.

Elsewhere in the American league, the Baltimore Orioles raked five Boston pitchers for 13 hits in a 17-3 victory over the Red Sox, the Detroit Tigers defeated the Chicago White Sox, 2-0, and the Kansas City Athletics nipped the Cleveland Indians, 5-4.

In the National league, the Philadelphia Phillies beat the Milwaukee Braves, 5-3, on four unearned runs, the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-1, and the Chicago Cubs downed the San Francisco Giants, 3-1.

Yanks Will Replace Weiss With Hamey

New York—(UPI)—They're finally going to break up the Yankees.

The shakeup will be the most thorough one in the club's colorful 57-year history and will take place shortly after the World Series when General Manager George Weiss joins Casey Stengel in retirement.

Departure of the 65-year-old Weiss will be strictly in keeping with a new policy by co-owners Dan Topping and Del Webb to bring "younger blood" into the entire Yankee organization.

Roy Hamey, 58-year-old assistant to Weiss at the moment, will move in as general manager, and 47-year-old Jack



Boston Sox Post Goes To Higgins

Boston—(UPI)—Former Red Sox outfielder Jackie Jensen today announced he will return to baseball next season.

Jensen, 33, made the announcement of his return to the Red Sox at a news conference at Fenway Park.

Boston—(UPI)—A year ago Mike Higgins, the old Detroit Tigers and Boston Red Sox third baseman, was out of a job. He'd been fired as Red Sox manager two months before.

Today he's not only back as manager but just about running the Boston show under millionaire sportsman owner Tom Yawkey.

The chubby, 51-year-old Higgins was elevated to the post of general manager Tuesday in an announcement by Yawkey that included the news that Higgins' predecessor, Bucky Harris, and farm director Johnny Murphy had been fired.

However, Higgins wasn't given the title of general manager. The Red Sox threw out the titles "superfluous," saying a manager has always had the "final choice" in players anyway. The club said Higgins would continue as field manager and also would be in complete charge of Red Sox players, coming and going.

Named to succeed Murphy, former Yankee bullpen ace, has been supervisor of eastern scouting for the Red Sox for the past eight years. Business manager Dick O'Connell was given the new title of executive vice president under Yawkey.

Forbes Field Might Be Series Equalizer

Editors: The following is the first of three dispatches by UPI baseball writers comparing the World Series rivals, the Pittsburgh Pirates and the New York Yankees. Today's dispatch discusses their offense. Subsequent dispatches will compare their defense and their pitching.

New York—(UPI)—Take two and hit to right—that old baseball axiom—isn't likely to do the New York Yankees much good in Pittsburgh.

On paper, the Yankees appear to have a wide edge over the Pirates in power but the vast reaches of Forbes Field, where four of the seven World Series games are scheduled to be played, may prove the "equalizer." Ruth and Gehrig couldn't hit any homers there in 1927 so it's unlikely that Mantle and Maris will hit many this year.

Toss out this seeming edge

in power and the two teams are much closer in offensive ability than they appear at first glance.

The Yankees have hit about 70 more homers than the Pirates. But the Pirates' team batting average is about 15 points higher than the Yankees and the Bucs have scored a few more runs than New York.

Key Hitters

Mantle and Maris, of course, are the two key men in the Yankee attack. When they're hitting, the rest line up as a powerful supporting cast that features streak-hitter Bill Skowron, dangerous Yogi Berra, line-drive-hitting Hector Lopez, a solid cast of pinch hitters including Dale Long, Bob Cerv, Elston Howard and Johnny Blanchard and the singles hitters, Bobby Richard-

son, Tony Kubek, Gil McDougald, etc.

The Yankee offense was the strongest in the American league yet faltered at times because neither Mantle nor Maris has hit on an even plane this year. For all their power, the Yankees have not had a trenchant, day-to-day slugging leader all season.

Their most consistent hitter is Lopez.

The Pirates' offense lacks the shock-power of New York's but has been steadier and more resourceful over the 26-week period of the season. It is led by Roberto Clemente and Bob Skinner with vital consistent support from Don Hoak, Bill Mazeroski, Dick Groat and Bill Virdon. Dick Stuart adds a dash of power when hot and manager Danny Murtaugh has a

hitter at catcher whether he uses Smokey Burgess or Hal Smith.

The Yankees are not a base-stealing team but they are fleet and run the bases well. They will take advantage of an outfielder with a poor arm. Mantle is so fast that he steals almost at will but he utilizes his speed more in stretching hits than in stealing bases.

The Pirates aren't a base-stealing team either but they're pressing with hit-and-run all the time and Clemente, Hoak, Mazeroski and Virdon are aggressive runners quick to take advantage of defensive lapses.

Mantle may be a dangerous home-run threat batting right-handed in Forbes Field but the most dangerous Yankee

there figures to be Lopez, Skinner, Burgess and perhaps even sub-first-baseman Rocky Nelson will be the Pirates to watch at Yankee Stadium where left-handed pull hitters have an inviting right field target.

For this reason, the rival managers are likely to serve a steady diet of left-handed pitching at Yankee Stadium and use the right-handers more freely at Forbes Field.

Dodgers Seeking To Clinch 4th

Los Angeles—(UPI)—The Los Angeles Dodgers set as their goal today clinching fourth place in the National league and helping first baseman Norm Larker win the batting championship.

By defeating the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-1, Tuesday night, the Dodgers moved 3 1/2 games ahead of the fifth-place San Francisco Giants and fixed their magic number to retain fourth at two games.

The victory also gave the Dodgers a new National League strikeout record of 1,081 men fanned this season, breaking the mark of 1,077 they set last season.

For tonight's contest with the Cardinals, Johnny Podres, 13-12, goes against youthful fast ball hurler Bob Miller, 4-2.

Larker boosted his batting average to within a fraction of a point of .325 Tuesday night by getting one hit in two official trips to the plate. And manager Walt Alston said he would do everything possible to help Larker get the batting crown.

Dick Groat Still Cause Of Concern

Pittsburgh—(UPI)—Manager Danny Murtaugh was understandably concerned today about Dick Groat and hoped the injured captain can take his place at shortstop when the Pittsburgh Pirates meet the New York Yankees a week from today in the World Series opener.

Groat made his first appearance in the lineup in three weeks Tuesday night when he ran for Bob Oldis who had doubled in the 13th inning.

Groat slid into third base on Gene Baker's infield out and was not certain afterwards whether he used his left wrist as leverage to get back on his feet.

"I'm not sure how I got up—probably from the left side," Groat said in the dressing room.

Hit By Pitch

Groat's left wrist was fractured Sept. 6 when it was struck by a slider thrown by Braves pitcher Lew Burdette.

It was Groat's understudy Dick Schofield, who won the game in the 16th inning Tuesday night with a single to right. The hit off pitcher Cal McLish sent home pinch runner Gino Cimoli with the run that provided a 4-3 victory.

Murtaugh plans to use Groat in the week end series against the Braves as a test.

"If it doesn't work out, I'll have to keep that kid Schofield at short."

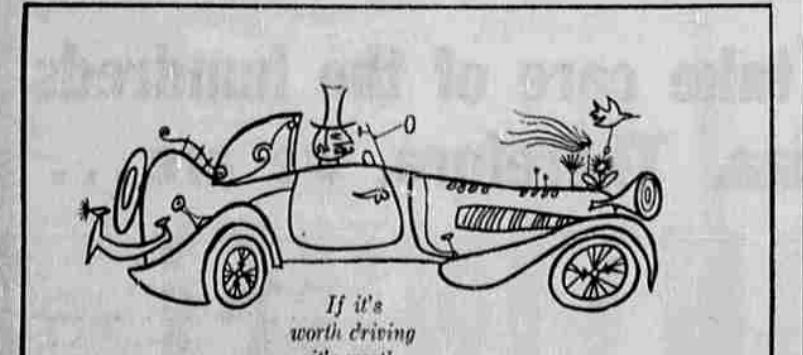
AAU clubs throughout the state will choose the Oregon winner.
