

Carstensen Inspecting Asphalt Paving Project

County Engineer Robert J. Carstensen today is inspecting what is supposed to be a more economical asphalt paving operation to be demonstrated in Wasco county.

Before leaving yesterday, Carstensen said the county may adopt the foamed asphalt paving operation "if it seems feasible." Although it has been developed over the last eight years this is the first time it has been used in Oregon, the county engineer said.

New equipment required for the new process would cost about \$4,000, but Jackson county could save \$1,000 a month using the new process, he said, or perhaps as much as \$20,000 a year. The county roads department now uses \$100,000 worth of asphalt paving in a year.

Under the present process a volatile chemical called naphtha is required to make the asphalt material solvent and usable. This chemical later evaporates. This means that the county pays for 100 per cent of the road building material and 25 per cent of it evaporates. Two hours must be allowed for the asphalt to cure before a roller can be used.

Under the new process, the same equipment can be used by adding a steam generator and different type of nozzles for applying the asphalt. All of the material remains, and a roller can be applied immediately.

Bids Called for Three Water Main Projects in City

The city of Medford has called for bids on three water department projects, two of them necessitated by construction of the new Pacific freeway.

The bids will be due in the city hall Oct. 18.

One of the projects involves relocation of a 6-inch water main on Table Rock rd. This main now crosses Bear creek at the existing bridge.

City Water Superintendent Robert Lee pointed out that a new bridge will be constructed there when the freeway is built and it will necessitate relocation of the main.

Second Project

A second project involves a cross-town 16-inch main near Biddle rd. The freeway will require relocation of this main from where it now crosses Bear creek approximately 800 feet north of Jackson st. to a new crossing about 150 feet north of Jackson st., Lee said. He pointed out that the new main will be increased to 18 inches in size.

Lee said the third job is for installation of a 6-inch water main on McAndrews rd. from Waverly ave. to Wabash ave. and on Wabash from McAndrews rd. to Spring st., and on College Way.

A fourth water department project is currently being undertaken by city crews. This involves relocation of a 16-inch water main on the Medford Shopping Center property.

Lee said the main will have to be moved from its present route across the property in order to make way for the new department store to be erected there. The shopping center is paying the cost of the relocation, he pointed out.

Reports of Thefts Received in County

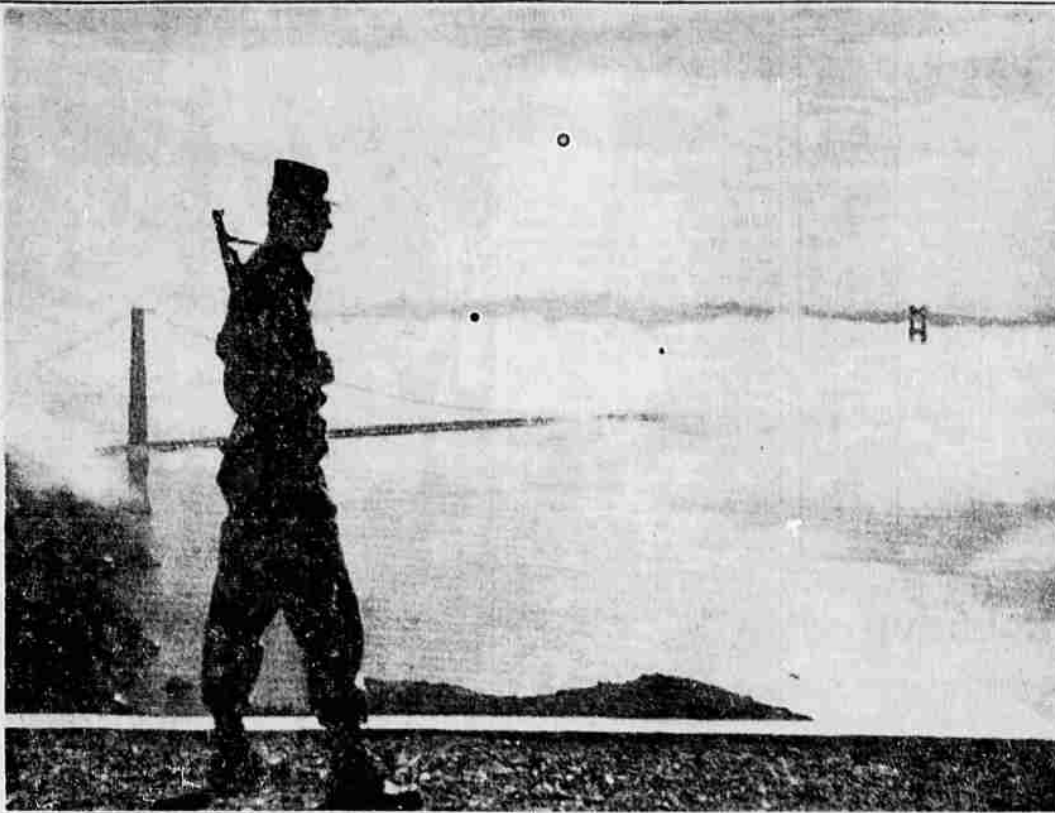
State police and sheriff's deputies received reports of several petty thefts throughout the county over the week end.

Washington—(UPI)—Back stairs at the White House:

A jolly Irishman who probably shuttles in and out of President Eisenhower's office as much as anyone on the White House staff is rounding out his eighth year on the job.

The frequent presidential visitor is Cleveland D. (Cleve) Ryan, the first full-time lighting technician in White House history.

He arranges the lighting for newsreel photographs of the chief executive with heads of state, visiting royalty, cabinet officers and politicians of every rank.

Ryan, a cigar-smoking, black-haired native of Gloucester, Mass., is paid by the four newsreel outfits to handle lights here and on the road.

He has traveled with Eisenhower around the world, to Latin America, Asia and Europe in addition to such domestic hideaways as Augusta, Ga., Gettysburg and Newport, R. I.

Well-liked wherever he goes, Cleve has made many friends overseas. One of his acquaintances from Chile recently visited this city and brought Ryan a jug of wine.

President Eisenhower once confronted Ryan after making a nationwide radio-television address and inquired: "How did I do, Cleve?" Nonchalantly, Ryan put his hand around the President's

shoulder and assured the chief executive: "You did fine."

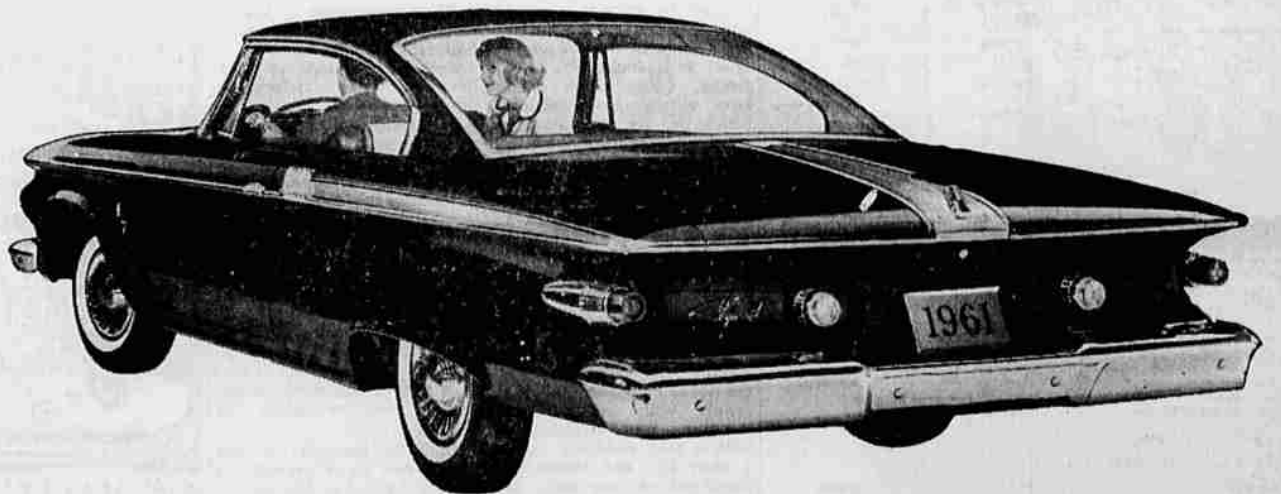
On the road, Ryan lugs camera equipment and dispatches film shipments for his four bosses. He has become so valuable that White House officials insist he go along wherever the President travels.

He frequently confers with Robert Montgomery, television adviser to Eisenhower, on lighting for Ike's radio-TV speeches. And when he's not mingling with world leaders or U.S. dignitaries, Cleve is not above bringing coffee for the camera crews.

Cleve is now bucking for a raise and hints he might quit if it doesn't come through. The betting is that he will get it.

Film Scheduled by College, County Bar

Ashland—Sponsored jointly by the Jackson County Bar association and Southern Oregon college, a half-hour film, "World Peace Through Law," will be televised Oct. 4 at 4:30 p.m. by station KBES - TV, Medford.

Cochairmen of the Bar committee, Frank Van Dyke and Robert Heffernan, urged all southern Oregon citizens who are interested in achieving a lasting world peace through the orderly processes of law view the film.

Charles Ryne, past president of the American Bar association and present chairman of that body's special committee on world peace through law, has endorsed the film which has been obtained through the Oregon State Bar.

Ryne headed the fight for the repeal of the Connally Reservation by which the United States reserves the right to label any international dispute involving itself as a "domestic issue," thus escaping the jurisdiction of the world court at The Hague.

The film advances the idea that the "rule of law is our greatest strength, and lack of it the Communists' greatest weakness," and the United States "must play the role of leader, not follower, in the search for peace."

President Eisenhower has promised that if the Connally Reservation is well received, he will urge all the nations of the globe to accept compulsory jurisdiction by the world court by enlisting the moral and political authority of the U. S. to implement it.

Coordinator Named For Ham Operators

Mrs. Barbara Svensen, 416 Williamette ave., Medford, has been named emergency coordinator for amateur radio operators in Jackson county by the American Radio Relay league.

Mrs. Svensen's new duties call for banding together members of the amateur radio service in the area for emergency radio communication in the event of natural disasters or other emergencies.

Drill periods when hams' local stations may be mobilized under simulated emergency conditions will be organized by Mrs. Svensen. Liaison with local fire and police departments plus civil defense coordination is a part of the amateur's program.
