

Burns Fatal To Oregon Missionary

San Diego - (UPI) - A woman missionary died Tuesday night while being flown here from La Paz, Baja California, for treatment of burns suffered in a kitchen fire.

The victim was Wilma Burkey, Brownsville, Ore., a Quaker missionary who suffered burns on 60 per cent of her body when a pilot light on a water heater ignited gasoline which had spilled from a stove.

A Coast Guard plane flew to the Mexican village, 635 miles south of here, Tuesday to get her after the American Consular Service requested help.

Portland Mishaps Take Two Lives

Portland - (UPI) - Two persons were killed in separate mishaps near the middle of the day Tuesday.

Willis Sawyer, 39, was injured fatally when a section of a 10-foot deep sewer caved in on him while he was working in southwest Portland. It took firemen and others about half an hour to free him.

Frank Albergo, 67, a Union Pacific Railroad section hand, was killed when struck by a train in the Albina Yard. There were no witnesses.

State Agriculture Changes in Works

Salem - (UPI) - State Agriculture Director J. F. Short said Tuesday he hopes to submit Agriculture Department reorganization plans in a "package" to the State Agriculture Board Dec. 1.

The board Tuesday approved Short's first recommendation, creation of an assistant director, the department's first.

The assistant will oversee the divisions of veterinary services and animal industry, Short said he had no one in mind and will continue to supervise the divisions himself until a selection is made.

Portland - (UPI) - The League of Women Voters announced Tuesday plans for a political rally in Portland Nov. 2.

A spokesman said the rally will take place in the Lloyd Center Auditorium and will begin at 8 p.m. Candidates for nearly every top state-wide political office are expected to be present.

Beverly Aadland Still Court Ward

Los Angeles - (UPI) - Beverly Aadland, the last girl friend of the late Errol Flynn, must remain a ward of juvenile court despite having reached legal adulthood at her 18th birthday last Thursday.

Superior Court Judge Allen Miller ruled Tuesday that he would not change her current status at this time. He said he would reconsider his decision at some time in the future after hearings to determine her progress.

The decision meant the blonde teen-ager would have to pass up several theatrical offers made on the condition that she would receive her release from court jurisdiction.

Hoffa Deplores Kennedy Remark

Washington - (UPI) - Teamsters Union President James R. Hoffa has charged that Democratic presidential nominee John F. Kennedy "has a police state mentality."

Hoffa's statement was issued in reply to one made by Kennedy in his televised debate with the Republican candidate, Vice President Richard M. Nixon, Monday night.

Kennedy said, "I am not satisfied when I see men like Jimmy Hoffa in charge of the largest union in the United States, still free."

"This statement," Hoffa said, "must have astounded millions of Americans who believe we still live in a free society. Kennedy's police state mentality raises the image of Khrushchev, Hitler, Mussolini and others who took freedom away from those who dared to disagree."

Sore Ankle, 800 Pounds Of Weight Cause Problem

Oroville, Wash. - (UPI) - Josephine has a sore ankle—or thinks she has—and at 800 pounds she's a little underweight for her age. Other than that she's a fine specimen of a pachyderm.

For all the trouble she has caused Basil D. McIntyre, she should be.

The story began Jan. 21, 1958, when McIntyre was building roads in Cambodia and Josephine was a 3-month-old, 209-pound baby.

McIntyre bought Josephine, but province officials ruled she was a "captured elephant" and therefore not eligible for export. McIntyre, not to be stopped, hired a truck to take his new pet from the outlying province to the nation's capital at PhnomPenh.

En route, a sudden stop threw Josephine to the floor, injuring her.

Then she got truck sick. Then she contracted pneumonia. Then her digestion literally stopped and she quit eating. Then she grew too weak to stand.

For more than a year, McIntyre hired private nurses to sit with Josephine around the clock. Finally the elephant was able to walk again and the pair left Cambodia for the United States.

But Josephine still refused to use her left ankle and on their arrival in this country, McIntyre took his pet to the veterinary clinic at Washington State University.

The veterinarians could find nothing wrong and Josephine was discharged—after several nights in which McIntyre had to sleep in her stall because the elephant was frightened—even though she still walked on her front knees.

Now, Josephine is at home on the ranch of McIntyre's brother-in-law, Fred Payne, near here. McIntyre is going to Burma to build more roads.

'Future Status' of Tongue Point Asked

Salem - (UPI) - Gov. Mark Hatfield today asked Defense Secretary Thomas S. Gates to review removal of ships from the Tongue Point Naval Station near Astoria.

Tongue Point, Hatfield said, is one of four "key" military installations in Oregon, including air operations at Corvallis, Klamath Falls and Portland Air Base.

He asked Gates to advise him of the "future status" of Tongue Point and urged that the Defense Department study Oregon's potential for "location of military installations."

Salem - (UPI) - By the end of this week, Gov. Mark Hatfield will have chalked up 116 days of out-of-state travel, more than any other Oregon governor in a comparable period. He has been in office 21 months.

In four years, the late Gov. Douglas McKay racked up 147 days of out-of-state travel. In two years, former Gov. Holmes had 80 days.

Air Force Allots Funds for Baker

Washington - (UPI) - The Air Force Tuesday released \$155,000 for a vehicle storage building and airman's dormitory at Baker Air Force Station in Eastern Oregon.

The Air Force also released \$34,000 for a water well, pumping station and supply lines at the Burns Air Force installation, according to the office of Sen. Hall S. Lusk (D-Ore.).

In addition, \$315,000 was released for a dam, water pumping station and supply line, roads and utilities at the Mt. Hebo Air Force Station on the Oregon Coast near Tillamook.

Titan Launching Missile Succeeds

Cape Canaveral, Fla. - (UPI) - The Air Force launched a Titan intercontinental ballistic missile today on a 5,000-statute-mile flight over the Atlantic ocean.

The rocket, prototype of a model expected to be war-ready within one year, aimed a heavily instrumented dummy warhead at a South Atlantic target near Ascension island, off the west coast of Africa.

Military authorities said the flight was a success.

A data capsule ejected from the nose cone was recovered in the target area by an ocean range ship.

New York Police report that in 1959 they "extricated 107 persons who were caught in machinery and revolving doors . . . rescued 82 persons on rafts or in the waters of the harbor . . . and released 233 animals from dangerous predicaments.

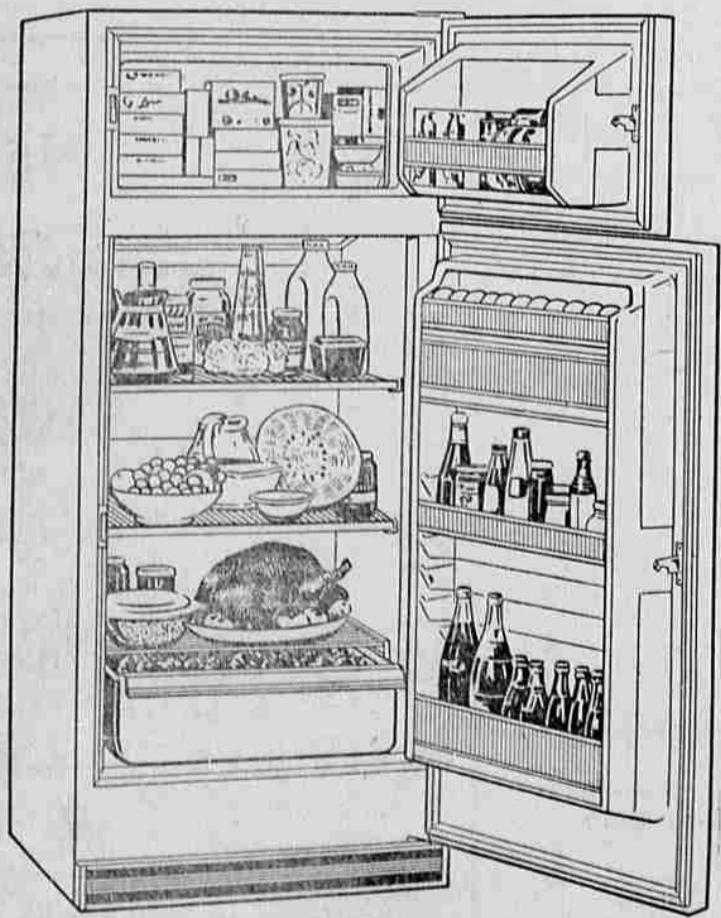

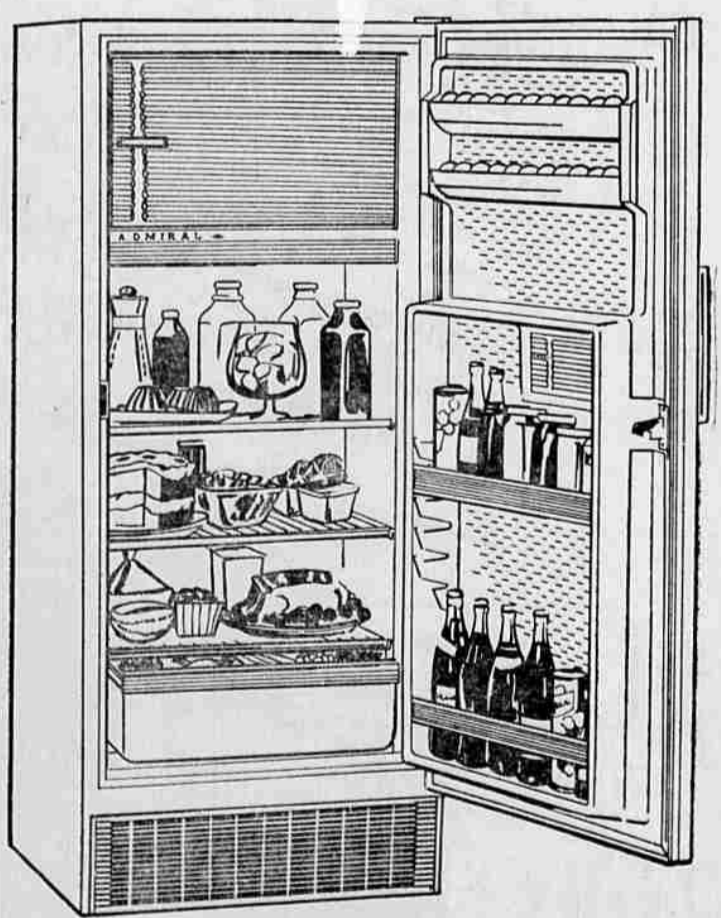
