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Mrs. Cyrus Eaton Unconcerned By People's Thoughts

New York - (UPI) - The woman was fresh from meetings with Castro and her friend Khrushchev and she said firmly, "Neither my husband nor I are concerned what people think about us, as long as we are convinced we're doing the right thing."

She was no "proletarian." She wore a string of matched pearls and diamond rings and she sat in a hotel suite that looked like a movie set.

Mrs. Cyrus Eaton, wife of the Cleveland industrialist, could be any lovely, poised society matron except for reminders in the hotel of the friendship she and her husband have with the Soviet premier.

Since pickets parade with signs calling them "traitors," a policeman checks visitors in and out of their hotel wing.

She Enjoys It - In one room secretaries work over stacks of letters to the Eatons, some pro, many con. But Mrs. Eaton cheerfully observed in an interview today that "I rather enjoy all this—nothing more fun than a good fight for a good cause if you know you're right."

The Eatons' cause is "peaceful coexistence."

"I feel obligated to speak up," the red-haired Mrs. Eaton said with spirit.

"I am such a believer in the democratic form of government, and in the United States' ability to cope with a changing world and maintain its prestige, that I feel it's imperative some voices be raised against the belligerent and inflexible attitude which has characterized this administration the last six years."

"I cannot feel this unwillingness to negotiate is indicative of the will of the American people. The time is short and the hazards multiplying by the minute."

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Statewide Council Formed To Oppose Billboard Measure

Portland - Formation of a statewide council on Highway Regulation to oppose ballot measure No. 15, the billboard control measure appearing on the Nov. 8 general election ballot, has been announced by chairman Ralph T. Holsapple Jr., Portland hotel executive and president of the Portland Hotel Association.

Representing the council in the Medford area are Eugene Farrell, William Schei, J. E. Jorgensen, Warren Kelsae, Ben Hiltzer, Medford, and Ernest Cooper and Mrs. Ruth McClain, Gold Hill.

Eliminates Advertising
The bill seeks to eliminate all present advertising on Oregon's interstate defense highways and to restrict all advertising on 16 other highways to signs advertising businesses within five miles of the signs.

In announcing creation of the council, Holsapple stated that "... most all organized tourist industry groups have taken positions firmly against this anti-advertising bill because they feel it would hurt Oregon's third largest industry by denying tourist businesses the right to advertise to out-of-state motorists driving through Oregon."

Holsapple, past president of the Oregon State Hotel Association, also said most organized labor and business groups have lined up against the bill because it would jeopardize the jobs of hundreds of workers in the outdoor industry and, by crippling the tourist industry, affect the income of thousands of other families as well.

The council chairman said his group and the outdoor advertising industry in general favor regulation of outdoor advertising but feel that prohibition could mean the loss of "... tens of millions of dollars of income to Oregon citizens."
