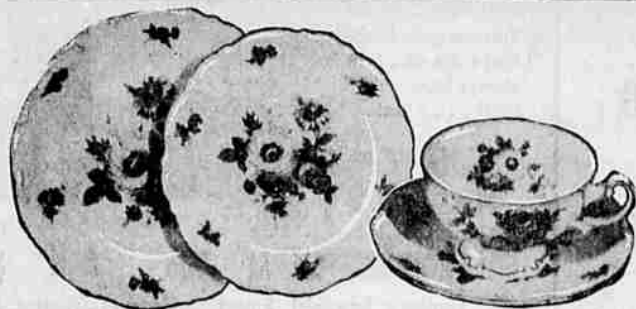

'Queen for a Day' Kingpin Started as Drummer With Band

Hollywood—Jack Bailey, kingpin of the "Queen for a Day" TV show, moves into his 16th year of crowning housewives in a career that began when a housewife crowned him.
The housewife was his mother, Belle, and the occasion was Jack's return home after a night at a firehouse jam session.
"I was only about 9 years old," Bailey recalled in his dressing room.
"One night I visited the fire house to listen to the Hampton Coronet band rehearse — that was back in my home town, Hampton, Iowa. The band was made up mostly of farmers who got their kicks putting on the uniforms and blaring away.
Drafted as Drummer
"That particular evening the bass drummer failed to show up, so they drafted me. It was after 10 o'clock when I got home.
"That was bad enough, but when mother got a whiff of all the tobacco smoke in my clothes she gave me one of the worst whippings of my life."

Undaunted, Bailey stuck with show biz (such as it was) to become the idol of some 10 million feminine viewers on his daily program.
Jack became the band's permanent bass drummer, although he was so small a playmate had to carry the big drum in parades while Jack flailed away as best he could.
Heads Hampton Parades
"You know how the bass drum always follows the rest of a parade? Not in Hampton. I always appeared at the head of the town parade."
Jack completed dressing and dashed onto the Moulin Rouge stage where he was wildly greeted by several hundred females.
Most men would cringe at the thought, but not Jack.
"I love it," he said after the warm-up. "Every day we have a little drama, some comedy and a lot of fun on the show. It's new and different all the time."
Bailey doesn't play the bass drum anymore. But he's still a novelty. Who else in show business would have the courage to select a single female as "Queen for a Day" from among hundreds of aspirants?

That Old 'Devil-Fish' Is Harmless as Soda Straw

Monstrous in size and appearance, the manta ray just doesn't live up to its name of "devil-fish." Readers of fiction thrill to the wild tales of man's desperate encounters with this so-called "devil-fish" of the ocean depths, and in their imagination they picture a vicious creature with tearing teeth and a ferocious temper.

When we realize the size of this great ray we are almost tempted to believe some of the wild tales we have heard about it; we even want to invest it with the ability to stalk its prey. Such, however, is not the true case.

He's Harmless

This big, flat fish is as harmless as a soda straw. The only possible protection the big "monster" possesses is its great weight; it might throw itself on a small boat and crush it. It would do this only if it was wounded or goaded into sheer desperation by harpoons or gunfire.

Manta rays have been recorded that weighed 3,000 pounds and measured 22 feet across the "wings." The body is brownish in color, with a darker fringe on the margins of the body. The skin is covered with small, rough tubercles. The manta ray has teeth, but only in the lower jaw.

The most unusual characteristic of these rays is the peculiar development of the cephalic fins enlarged into two long ear-like appendages on the head. These are not found in any of the other rays.

The tail is rope-like, without the spine with which the sting-ray is equipped. The manta gives birth to living young, which are usually liberated in shallow water during the summer. Although the mantas are most common in

tropical waters, they range as far north as Rhode Island.

The manta is hunted for sport along the Mexican coast, where boats, carrying men with harpoons cruise off-shore on lookout for a basking manta. The big creatures float for long intervals on the surface, apparently enjoying the feel of the sun on their broad backs. With reasonable care the hunting boat can approach within a few feet before the big ray notices its enemies' presence.

Futile Trip

As soon as the harpoon is firmly imbedded, the rope is attached to the boat cleat and the big manta starts on a futile trip to lose its tormentors. The boat is towed, sometimes for miles, until the big ray is utterly exhausted. When it comes to the surface, it is shot with high powered rifles.

All of which requires about as much bravery on the part of the hunters as playing a good fast game of checkers.

The scientist knows the manta ray as "manta birostris," the fiction writer and the fisherman as "devil-fish." Probably the most accurate and descriptive name of all is "swimming barn-door."
