

# Red Raider Mentor Promises Surprises

Ashland-Surprises are on hand for the followers of Southern Oregon college football this Saturday night when the Raiders meet Whitman college on Fuller field at 8 o'clock.

Word from the Raider encampment has a realignment in the Rogue Raiders' backfield in one back spot and possibly the quarterback position.

Coach Al Akins is not giving out any of the details for another day or two so that he can try out the combinations he is experimenting with in an effort to strengthen the offense.

**New Formation?**  
"We may even come up with a new offensive formation," hinted Akins as he searched for a way to get his ball club in the winning column.

"One of the reasons we are not revealing our plans is that we must get used to them ourselves," Akins continued, "and we must get into top shape for the opening of the Oregon Collegiate conference season the following week end when Portland State college comes to town."

A pair of ends, Howard Hartman and Harold Haugen, will be on the sidelines this week end nursing injured knees as Gordy Carrigan and Dave Hughes take over.

"We will probably go the same as last week in the front line," the Raider mentor mentioned as he reviewed the

films. This would mean that Jess Munyon, Tony Brauner, Neil Green, Willie Garner, and George Moses would fall from right to left tackle.

In an effort to get an idea on the starting backfield, Akins continued to evade the exact issue, and only continued to promise a surprise.

## MAC Won't Delay Sale Of Stadium

Portland—UPI—The Multnomah Athletic club plans to sell its plant, including Multnomah Stadium, as soon as it can find a buyer.

That's what Harold M. Phillips, president of the club, said Wednesday in reply to a request by Mayor Terry Schrunk that the club defer any action on sale of the property for another two years.

Phillips said the door would be left open for talks with city officials on any interest Portland still might have in buying the property. MAC last July offered to sell out to the city for \$3.5 million.

Phillips said MAC might lose as much as a quarter million dollars in taxes if it deferred action on sale of the property for two years. He said the club has accumulated more than one million dollars toward a building fund which is exempt from federal taxes, provided it is used in construction within three years of its collection.

Schrunk said he was "a bit shocked" at the MAC for signifying its intention to dispose of the property without a "proper waiting period" for adequate study, planning and appraisal by the city.

Schneider also said that 18 hunters have been firearms casualties already this year, four of which were fatal. Last year there were 75 hunting accidents, 15 of which resulted in death.

Western TV heroes were blamed in part. The number of hunters who carried sidearms increased and 24 of the 75 accidents were caused by these weapons.

## Game Man Warns of Hooligans

Portland—UPI—State Game Director Phil Schneider today warned deer hunters to be on the lookout for what he termed "woods hooligans" who have already caused considerable damage to hunting areas.

He said damage was caused in the Baker and Pendleton area by hunters who shot insulators from high tension lines, putting the lines out of service. And some 200 families were without electricity for a day when an over-anxious nimrod blasted the control cable near Rieth with a shotgun, cutting 40 of the 51 pairs of wires. The control cable between Pendleton and Baker also was damaged by a shotgun blast.

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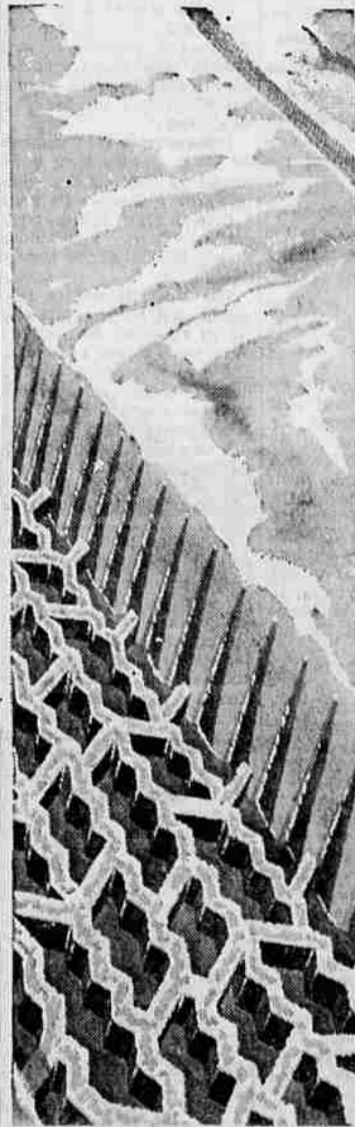
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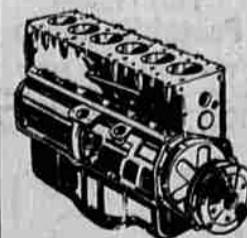
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
