

Neutralist Countries Call for Eisenhower-Khrushchev Parley

General Assembly Gets Resolution From 5 Leaders

Proposal Follows 'Summit' Meeting

United Nations, N.Y.—(UPI)—Five top neutralist countries today called upon President Eisenhower and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to resume their personal diplomacy with a conference.

Premier Jawaharlal Nehru of India, President Gamal Abdel Nasser of the United Arab Republic, President Sukarno of Indonesia, President Tito of Yugoslavia and President Kwame Nkrumah of Ghana submitted for immediate General Assembly action a resolution asking the meeting.

The move resulted from a "neutralist summit conference" held Thursday night at the Yugoslav Embassy in New York. It followed an appeal earlier this week from Nasser for the two men to meet and discuss disarmament.

The five neutralist leaders acted as the cold war impasse grew steadily worse. A two-hour meeting Tuesday night between British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan and Khrushchev ended in complete deadlock.

The situation was so serious that Macmillan decided to fly to Washington this week end for a conference with Eisenhower on the Soviet's rough-house tactics in the United Nations and to coordinate allied strategy for the fight ahead.

There were rumors Eisenhower might make a third visit to New York during the U.N. session but there still was no indication he would meet with Khrushchev. They have not met since May when Khrushchev torpedoed the Paris summit conference.

Macmillan and Khrushchev were reported not to have discussed a possible Eisenhower-Khrushchev meeting. Eisenhower has opposed such a meeting until Russia meets certain conditions but Khrushchev has indicated he would accept a meeting.

Arson Suspected In House Blaze

Arson is the suspected cause of a fire that did minor damage to an unoccupied house at 1511 North Riverside ave., last night.

Police and the city fire marshal started investigating the possibility of arson after a gasoline-soaked rag was found stuffed under the northwest corner of the house where the fire apparently started.

Firemen had the blaze extinguished shortly after it was first reported at 7:28 p.m. Damage was confined to one door and a portion of a wall, they said.

The unoccupied residence is owned by M. E. Morse, 45 Perrydale ave., and M. D. Singler, 1270 Ross lane.

A witness told police that he observed a young man run out of the rear driveway of the residence and drive away in a car just prior to the time of the fire.

Police later located a vehicle, answering the description given by the witness, in downtown Medford. The owner of the car was contacted and he denied driving the vehicle last night. A friend of the owner said he drove the vehicle but denied any knowledge of the fire.

The investigation is continuing, police said.

Aides Confess To Make-Up Job On Nixon for Appearance on TV

Chicago—(UPI)—The Chicago Daily News said today Vice President Richard M. Nixon's aides have admitted they made up the presidential candidate for his television debate with Sen. John F. Kennedy Monday night.

In a copyrighted story Thursday, the newspaper said there had been "numerous complaints" about Nixon's appearance on TV Monday night and an investigation was under way to find out whether there might have been sabotage.

But today the newspaper quoted Herbert Klein, Nixon's press secretary, as saying the trouble was television and not make-up.

"Mr. Nixon is in excellent health and looks good in person," Klein said.

He said Nixon used only a light dusting powder on his face Monday night. This does not require services of an expert, he said, and Nixon's staff handles it when necessary.

Klein said Nixon's staff is checking lighting, "which is more pertinent," with an eye to making the vice president look more like himself on TV.

Thursday's Daily News said it wasn't certain who made up Nixon.

Syd Simon, make-up artist who was in the studio on a stand-by basis, said a man carrying a case walked into the studio before the broadcast and maintained he was the make-up man. But Simon did not know his name, the Daily News said.

"We all say a Democratic make-up artist made him up," the Daily News quoted John Hall, business agent of the Make-up and Hair Stylist Union's New York local. "They loused him up

so badly that a Republican couldn't have done that job."

CBS officials at Chicago said a CBS New York staff member, Frances Arnold, made up Nixon Monday night. She denied even getting near the vice president, the Daily News said.

A CBS spokesman told the Daily News the network has received "numerous complaints," and "some people have accused us of making him up to look bad."

CBS emphatically denied any partisan manipulation. Kennedy wore no make-up for the broadcast.

U. S. Closes Big Cuba Nickel Plant

Washington—(UPI)—The United States aimed a new economic blow at Cuba today by closing its \$110 million Nicaro nickel plant there and considering export controls like those on Russia and Red satellites.

The State Department announced Thursday night that the U.S. government-owned Nicaro plant in Oriente Province would be closed down by Saturday because of what it termed "confiscatory taxes and harassment" by the Castro regime.

The Cuban government had delivered an ultimatum after last Saturday no nickel could be shipped from the plant unless special taxes were paid. Thousands of tons of refined ore piled up because the United States refused to pay the levy.

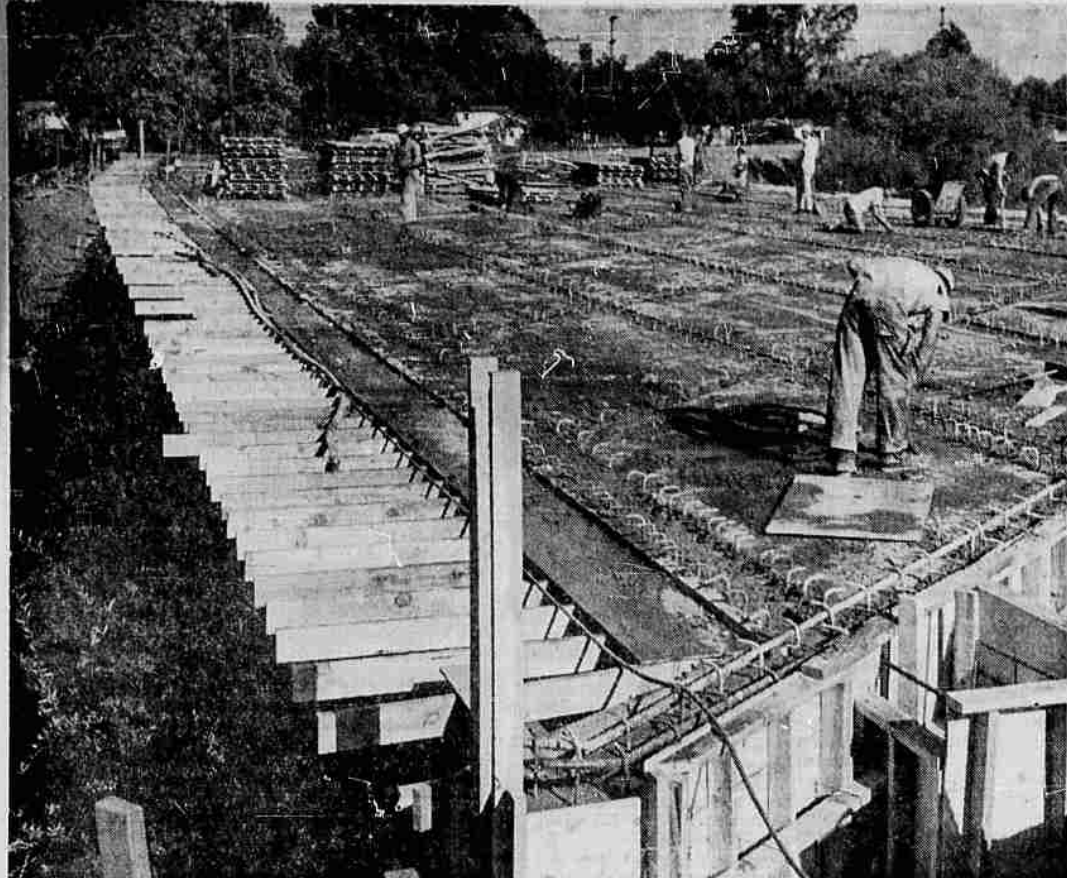
Train Stopped to Extinguish Fire

Ike in Denver for Rites; Lauds Nixon

Denver—(UPI)—President Eisenhower arrived in Denver today to attend the funeral of his mother-in-law, Mrs. Elvira Doud.

The chief executive made the melancholy journey from Chicago to attend final rites for Mrs. Doud, 82, who died late Wednesday night after a lingering illness.

In Chicago Thursday night, Eisenhower gave Vice President Richard M. Nixon his biggest endorsement by describing him as the man best prepared to enter the White House.

The Chief Executive hailed the vice president as a man of vast diplomatic and Cabinet-level experience in apparent contrast to his Democratic rival, Sen. John F. Kennedy.

The President attempted to correct any impressions that he downgraded Nixon's contribution to the Eisenhower administration in a speech to a Republican fund-raising dinner here.

Democrats have been making political capital out of a presidential news conference comment that it might take him a week to think of any

36,092 Register To Vote; Deadline Saturday, Oct. 8

Jackson county Democrats hold a voter registration lead of 681 this week, according to the Jackson county elections department.

Democrats have 17,954 registered voters compared to the county Republicans' 17,273, according to official registration figures. Independents have 858 registered for a total of 36,092.

Deadline for registering for the November general election is Oct. 8. The elections department in the Jackson county courthouse will be open from 8 a.m. to 8 p.m. to handle late registrations, according to state law. Some registrars throughout the county will also register latecomers until 8 p.m. on Oct. 8, it was reported.

The Democratic registrations total shows a steady growth from 16,420 at the end of the registration period before the 1956 general election. The new total of 17,954 also compares with 17,013 registered Democrats on election day in November, 1958's general election.

The Republicans show a drop in registration earlier going from 17,964 at the end of the registration period for the 1956 general election, to 17,687 on election day for the general election of 1958. The Republican registration lead dwindled over the same period from 1,544 in 1956, to 684 in 1958.

The Democrats gained a lead of six registered voters on April 27, 1960, to lead the county in voter registrations for the first time, as far as anyone can remember. This lead jumped to 184 on May 1, to 162 on May 23, to 186 on June 28, to 207 on July 26, to 314 on Aug. 24 and now to the current lead of 681 registered voters.

From April 27 to Wednesday's current registration totals, the Democrats have increased their registration as follows: April 27, 15,980; May 1, 16,386; May 23, 16,411; June 28, 16,451; July 26, 16,564; Aug. 24, 16,780; and finally 17,954.

Mobile Units

The two organizations have mobile registration booths. The primary purpose of both is registration of voters no matter what political leanings the person may have.

The Republican sponsored booth will be at the corner of Main st. and Central ave. between 10 a. m. and 4 p. m. Saturday, Oct. 1, in downtown Medford.

The Young Democrats, who have conducted an area registration campaign for the past three weeks, will station its mobile unit evenings at different locations.

The unit will be at the B and B Auction yard on Jacksonville highway tonight, and at the Oregon Food Store, Ashland, and Tom Thumb Market at Four Corners on Table Rock rd. Saturday during the day.

Next week the Young Democrats unit will be at Edwards and Beatty sts. Monday evening; at the Shell service station in Jacksonville, Tuesday evening; at Tom Thumb market, Wednesday evening; at the Red Barn Auction house in Phoenix Thursday evening; and at the B and B Auction yard next Friday evening.

In addition, the unit will be in downtown Medford from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in front of Woolworth's Thursday, in front of Stewart and Johnsons Friday, and in front of the Western Thrift store Saturday, Oct. 8.

During the past three weeks, the Young Democrats have registered about 640 people, organization officials have announced. The mobile unit is being worked on a non-partisan basis, and the only sign on the booth is one which reads "Voters Register Here."

Porter Goes to Meeting Place to Make His Stand on Rogue Basin Project Clear

Congressman Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) who had been "disinvited" to a meeting of the Rogue Basin Flood Control and Water Resources Association board, showed up at the meeting place last night and told an estimated 25 persons that "this is a political campaign and I am trying to make my stand clear."

The board had withdrawn its invitation to Porter and cancelled its meeting, scheduled for last night, because of a press release that Porter issued prior to the meeting, which it felt violated the "non-partisan nature" of the association.

Porter, hearing that he was disinvited, said he was going to show up anyway, as scheduled, and talk about the Rogue Basin project to anyone who was there.

Among those attending last night's meeting, held at the Rogue Riviera, near Rock Point, were four of the 16 members of the board of directors of the association and their attorney, Ben Day.

Board members attending were Alva Walker, Ralph James, Bill Jess and Claude Eaker.

Although Porter said last night he was willing to meet with the board at a future date, there was no indication whether or not the board would again invite him to do so.

Porter said he would "make no apology" for the press release, but was "sorry if there was any misunderstanding." He defended what he said is "my right" to make his views and position clear during an election year.

Porter hopes to introduce a bill to construct Agate dam in 1961 and the Rogue Basin project is not scheduled for presentation to Congress until early 1962. The Agate dam would be located northeast of Medford on Dry creek and would be primarily for irrigation purposes.

Porter emphatically denied any disinterest on his part in the Rogue Basin project. He said that he has done all he can on the project for the time being, and he has received assurances from the corps of engineers that work is proceeding as fast as possible.

He defended his support of the Agate dam bill by saying: "The Agate bill is a good bill... why shouldn't I work for it?"

James asked Porter if he thought the Agate dam bill would hurt the Rogue Basin project. Porter replied that it is his opinion and the opinion of the engineers, that "right now, we do not think it would hurt. If I thought it would hurt the big project, I would be against it. That's always been my stand on it."

Porter said: "We (southern Oregon) have had lots of projects in the past and there is no reason why we can't have lots of them in the future—we need them."

Concerning the Rogue Basin project, he said, "there hasn't been anything else that could have been done or should have been done."

Porter read portions of a report on the progress of the Rogue Basin project, prepared by his administrative assistant and dated Sept. 15. The report pointed out that completion of the Rogue Basin study was held up temporarily pending completion of temperature and flow studies by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife service.
