Final World Series pitching assignments, whether spark-plug Dick Groat will be available to the Pirates and close races for the batting, home run and RBI totals will be decided on a week end that wraps up the major league baseball season except for the World Series.

Both managers Casey Stengel of the Yankees and Danny Murtaugh of the Pirates are providing pre-Series tests for their prospective starters in the big show starting next Wednesday.
Stengel gave Whitey Ford his final outing Wednesday night and is following tonight through Sunday with Art Ditmar, Bob Turley and Ralph Terry. Murtaugh is firing Vern Law (20-8) tonight and will follow Saturday and Sunday with Bob Friend and Vinegar Bend Mizell.

Pirates Go To Henley Saturday

Phoenix—"We know we've got a real challenge in making the trip and playing in the daytime."
Coach Jack Woodward was speaking of Phoenix high's football trip to Henley to meet the "dangerous" Hornets in the Rogue league struggle. The teams are billed for 1:30 p.m. kick-off Saturday at Henley.

The Hornets, third in the loop for the past eight years, are figured strong contenders this time for the title despite a gloomy forecast at the start of the slate by Coach Len Weber. Eagle Point's Eagles are not being discounted in the race but a good number of pickers feel that the Phoenix-Henley fray may be the key to the title.

Hard and Long
Phoenix players have been working hard and long this week on about all phases of the game. "I do believe the players are set mentally," Woodward stated. The Pirates are defending champs.
Pirate observers were visibly impressed when they saw Henley trounce Merrill last week end. The Hornets used an unbalanced split T attack and stayed on the ground. Henley's passing is reported an important part of its offense. But the Klamath county A-2s did not pass once, knowing they were being scouted.

Bob Jacobs, inspirational playing end will miss the game for Phoenix because of a trip to California with his parents. Other Richey is being moved from the backfield to take the flank. Because Rick Seymour has a neck sprain, freshman John Granby, 180, may start at guard on offense. Woodward said Granby will get first defensive call.

Other Starters
On offense are Bob Dickinson, end; Rick Richey, guard; John Kerns and Harry Gay, tackles; Terry Hanson, center, and Gerald Sloper, Jerry Moore, Dave Johnson and Mike Conbruck, backs.
Monty Combs and Gary Colfax will be the defensive halfbacks and also see backfield duty on offense. Other likely to see much service are Fred Tycksen, Ralph Gysin, Dave Westfall, Jerry Johnson and Tim O'Mara.

Henley has a nucleus of nine lettermen and is bolstered by some good sophomore and freshmen talent. Bert Allbritton and Gary Beber are a pair of fine passing quarterbacks and Bob Chapman and Calvin Casebier are all-league ends. Chuck Blofsky is a strong-running fullback. Another end is Kent Gooding, a 6-7, 190-pound sophomore. Reiling, a sophomore halfback, has great speed. The Hornets have a hefty in Leo Lufi, 210-pound tackle.
Henley has beaten Lakeview which trimmed Redmond.

Yank Golfers In Front by 20

Ardmore, Pa.—UPI—The United States, paced by par-busting collegian Jack Nicklaus and poised for the third round with a 20-point lead, threatened today to make a romp out of the World Amateur golf championship.

Even rain failed to dampen the magic in Nicklaus' clubs as the 20-year-old National Open runnerup tacked a three-under-par 67 Thursday to his record 66 in the opening round.

Teammate Deane Beman, the National Amateur champion, caught Nicklaus' par-breaking habit to match him with a 67 in his second tour of the booby-trapped East course at the Merion Golf Club. The two 67s, plus Bob Gardner's 71, gave the Americans a 413 total at the halfway mark of the 72-hole tournament featuring 126 players from 32 nations.

In second place was Great Britain-Ireland, one of the pre-tournament favorites, with a 433 total fashioned from a 218 Wednesday and a 215 Thursday.

From the way the sales of semi-autos has been going, it figures that most of us will be ducking lead whether we're walking or sitting.

ARSENAL TYPES

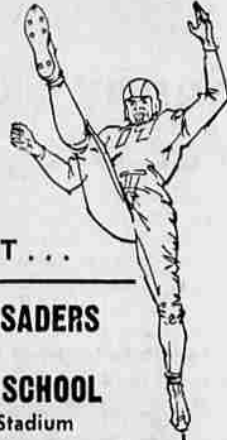
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Beaverton Teacher Cleared in Verdict

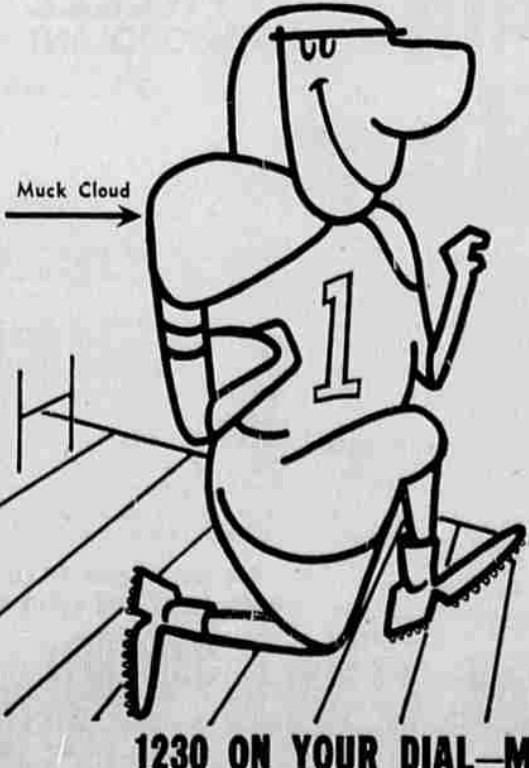
Hillsboro—UPI—A \$200,000 damage suit against a Beaverton High School physical education instructor has been dismissed in Circuit Court here.
