New York—Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, deriding British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan's speech to the U.N. General Assembly:
"Macmillan said it's the end of Communism. Now I am living my last minutes. Now you can sleep quietly—Macmillan has really reassured you."

New York—A British Foreign Office spokesman, asked whether Prime Minister Harold Macmillan knew that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev had compared him with Neville Chamberlain:
"I am not aware that Mr. Macmillan was aware, but in our country the Chamberlains are very distinguished people."

Russia May Launch Mars Space Probe

Washington—UPI—The Russians may launch a rocket toward Mars in the next few days.
Saturday will be the most favorable date for a Mars shot they can expect for a couple of years. But next Tuesday, the third anniversary of Sputnik I, will be a pretty good day, too.
In recent weeks the Russians have been talking about launching a man into a low earth orbit some time soon. U.S. space experts agree the Soviets have the power and skill to do this.

Japanese Pair Visits New York

New York—UPI—Crown Prince Akihito and Princess Michiko of Japan arrive today for a five-day visit.
Their New York appearance follows a three-day visit to Washington that included an official dinner given by President and Mrs. Eisenhower plus an inspection of the flight center at Langley Air Force Base, Va.
The presidential plane, Columbine III, will bring the royal couple to New York where they will keep a busy pace in their campaign to strengthen U.S.-Japanese relations following the cancellation of Eisenhower's trip to Tokyo last June.
Thursday night, at a dinner for the couple in the Japanese Embassy in Washington, Ambassador Koichiro Asakai mentioned for the first time during the royal visit the political turmoil which prompted the cancellation of Eisenhower's trip.
Asakai called it a "momentary but unfortunate situation."

Safeway Stores To Increase Milk Price

Portland—UPI—Safeway Stores have announced its consumer milk prices will increase one-half cent a quart on all multiple quart and half gallon sales starting Oct. 10.
Increased producer prices effective Oct. 9 was given as the reason. Milk producers selling to Safeway will be paid \$6.02 per hundred-weight. The firm said there was a danger of reduced stocks of high quality milk unless dairymen received an adequate price.

Attorney General Says GOP Should Remain in Office

Portland—UPI—U.S. Attorney General William P. Rogers said Thursday night an administration which ended the war in Korea and maintains peace with honor in the world is entitled "to be entrusted with the responsibility of maintaining peace in the world in the years ahead."
Rogers made his remarks at a \$100-a-plate fund-raising dinner at the Sheraton hotel here. Earlier in the evening he addressed about 400 people at Eugene.
In Eugene Rogers took the tactics of Democratic Presidential Nominee John F. Kennedy to task. Rogers challenged statements by Kennedy that the United States has lost prestige throughout the world particularly in Africa.
Can't Be Loved By All
Rogers said that no nation as strong and prosperous as the United States can be loved by everyone. He said emerging nations in Africa demonstrated respect for the United States by voting with the U.S. in the United Nations.

In Portland Rogers asked whether the leadership of the United States "should be returned to those who made a mess of it before or should we continue the leadership which has made this the strongest and most prosperous country in the world?"
He said "The American people know that the uneasiness of the peace is not caused by the failure of the United States but is caused by the conspiracies and the tirades of the Soviet leaders."

Hatfield Labels Demo Ticket as 'Schizophrenic'

Coronado, Calif.—UPI—Republican Gov. Mark Hatfield of Oregon charged Thursday night the Democrats are on a "something for nothing kick."
Hatfield made the remark in a speech at a fund raising dinner at the Hotel Del Coronado.
The governor said any hope that the Democrats would not conduct such a campaign was entirely removed by the party's presidential nominee, Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts.
Hatfield labeled the Democrats' choice of Kennedy and Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas as a "schizophrenic ticket."

In the field of civil rights they take their stand clearly behind full first class citizenship for every American, yet they make a complete mockery of this by placing a long-time vacillator of civil rights on their ticket," he said.
The governor commented that there are no Mason-Dixon lines either real or figuratively in the Republican party.

"Vice President Nixon and Henry Cabot Lodge don't have two different civil rights speeches, one for New York or California and another one for Texas or Florida," he said.
At a press conference earlier, Hatfield said that the primary interest of the American people was a desire for peace. He predicted the peace issue would swing voters to the Republican side because the Democrats lacked candidates experienced in foreign policy.

MAKES AIRLIFT OFFER
New York—UPI—National Airlines offered Thursday to divert "any or all" of a 45-plane fleet to evacuate Americans from Cuba. The airline operates international routes between Havana and the United States.

Nov. 1 Target Date For Last Section of Eugene Highway 99

Salem—UPI—The State Highway Commission was told Thursday that if good weather holds up, the last section of U.S. Highway 99 to Eugene will be completed by Nov. 1.
State Highway Engineer W. C. Williams said all but six miles of the 22-mile stretch from Halsey road south are finished. The link will open 108 miles of non-stop, four-lane freeway between Portland and Eugene.

Leonard Lindas, chief counsel for the commission, said a State Supreme Court decision this week means disposal of 42 damage suits resulting from the 1948 Vanport flood. The suits amounted to more than \$1.5 million.

Case Ruled On
The court ruled Wednesday on one of the cases, Kernan Livestock Farm, Inc., against Multnomah County, alleging damages from the flood because the commission allowed an underpass to be built on North Denver ave. in Portland.
The decision absolved the commission and Lindas said it will apply to the other 42 cases.

The commission voted to advise the Walla Walla county district attorney that it has no objection to introduction of a bill in the 1961 legislature prohibiting livestock from running at large on the highway between Joseph and Imnaha.
The ban would affect a part of the route and Walla Walla county officials asked for the commission's feelings on the matter.

Similar restrictions are in effect now on several other highways.
Newport Job Approved
An agreement with the city of Newport to widen U.S. Highway 101 within the city was approved.
Total cost is \$175,000, with the city to pay \$43,750 and the state the balance.

The commission also approved:
—Projects in Clackamas, Crook, Deschutes, Douglas, Grant, Malheur, Polk, Tillamook and Yamhill counties for 1961-62 totaling \$1,281,000, plus additional funds for a Malheur county project.
—Traffic signal installations in Klamath Falls, Eugene and Salem costing \$41,300.
